A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN



Dear friends,

I trust your 2020 is off to a good start? My decade has not gone...exactly the way I was planning.

Many of you know this already, but in case some folks have missed the details, on December 16th I was headed out to the coast. Around 8:30 PM on Highway 130 that winds and bends its way along the Nestucca River, a deer jumped down into the road in front of me. Just reacting, I swerved to the left. Unfortunately, the road was turning sharply to the right, and I was unable to correct and went down over the edge heading towards the river.

Fortunately, I hit a large fir. (How often do we consider it fortunate to hit a tree?) The tree crushed the right front end of the car locking the vehicle into place at a 90 degree angle. Had the tree not been there I would have likely turned over and rolled into the river below. Less fortunately, the impact of the tree crushed the car around my left leg, pinning it tightly. I had no head injury or damage to my organs. Nothing was bleeding. The impact broke my right wrist, and my left leg was not budging.

I was so far below the road level, cars passed but they could not see me. So, for the next eight hours I worked to free my leg. Many of you have written to me how frightening this must have been. All I can say is that night I didn't feel afraid, and I didn't feel alone. I felt cold, pain, and a pressing sense of urgency to get out of that situation. I don't believe I have ever been so focused in all my life.

And around 5:45 AM the next day, I was able to finally pull my leg free. Only, in the process of freeing it, I wound up breaking it. And the doors and windows of the car were jammed. So, the next task was kicking open my sunroof with the one good leg I had left. After this, I was able to squeeze through and drop down to the ground falling away from me. Somehow, I managed to climb up the bank, lifting myself up using my good leg, and then collapsing my body onto my broken one. After I made the road, I started to limp towards town. Several cars passed without stopping. I made it about 1.5 miles before a guy stopped and let me climb into his truck where I stayed until the ambulance came.

What to make of all this? It's hard to say, really. While I appreciate well intended comments like God putting that tree there and things like that, the truth is people die in car accidents every day. And I have a hard time making sense of a God who places magical trees for some, while letting others, letting children, die. Still, it's actually my job to ask where God was in all of that. My honest answer is I don't know. Right now I don't entirely know. What I do know is I'm grateful for the abilities I had that night to extricate myself. I'm grateful my injuries weren't worse- a slight in any of the variables could have meant a very different outcome for me. And I'm grateful for all of you- your notes, your prayers, and your understanding and love. Is God in all of that- for me the answer is absolutely.

This wasn't the way I was planning for 2020 to start out, but you know what? Our plans are just that-plans. And they are subject to change. So, as you begin your year and make your plans, may you hold them gently. May you give thanks for what is good and let go of that which does not bring you joy. Instead of giving others advice, may we just lift them up to the light trusting that they are well able. And when the plan falls apart, as it surely will, may your senses be alert to who and what is being placed in your path as a blessing, until a new plan becomes clear.

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Here is a poem I wrote after this experience- it's for all of us when we experience significant change.

THIS IS YOUR LIFE

This is your life. You don't get another one. You drove off the edge of everything you ever knew lying sideways below the bank. Others pass by and cannot see you. They will not stop. You can blame yourself. It doesn't matter. You can blame the deer, the gods. It doesn't matter. You can wait here and hope help will come, but you are the one you've been waiting for, your strength the strength that counts in this place, your voice singing the one song you hear in this pressing darkness. It will hurt. There is no escape from the pain. Your choice whether to lie here in the uncaring night, the anxious alarm signaling to no one, or begin the excruciating work of breaking yourself freea work that will kill you and bring you back from the dead, a stranger now to those who thought they knew you, unwelcome to the ones who longed for your return. Because we don't walk back from the land of the dead the same. We arrive limping carrying on our shoulders a dangerous, new, unpronounceable name. This is your life. There isn't another one. What will you do? Time to choose.

It will be helpful to share the leadership for this study so we invite you to prayerfully consider signing up to lead a week or two.

Our final 6-week DVD course, Amy Jill Levine's *Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi*, will take us through the second week of June (our traditional time to break for summer sabbatical).

FELLOWSHIP DINNER GROUPS

We are about to begin the winter phase of Fellowship Dinners, so this is a good opportunity to begin participating, if you haven't been.

Fellowship Dinners are groups of 7 to 9 people who meet four times in four months for a meal and fellowship. The hosts provide the main course and others bring side dishes, dessert, etc. Sometimes games or activities are included. Each group decides the times that work best for all to gather. While most groups meet in the evening for dinner at someone's home, a brunch has sometimes worked best and other venues, like restaurants or TPC, are also used.

The winter phase goes from February through May. After each four-month phase, the computer comes up with new random groups. This computer algorithm avoids forming groups that put folks together who have recently been together. This gives everybody the chance to connect and know even more people in the church. New church members will find this a great way to get better acquainted and longtime members find it a way to expand their relationships with other church members.

If you were participating this fall, you are automatically signed up for the winter phase, and you don't have to do anything to continue. If you wish to opt out of the winter phase, please do so by January 19th. Current and recent participants may sign up or opt out by replying to the email you received in early January. TPC joined 19 other local congregations to work together on the common goal of making a difference in the lives of those who are less fortunate. Guests in the Family Promise program are not chronically homeless, but have been affected by a job loss, medical bills, or other circumstances that have caused them to lose their home. Guests are willing to do the work necessary to get back on their feet.

The intensive case management provided to families has made it possible for 56 people (34 children and 22 adults), who were previously living in cars,

tents or sheds, to find housing. Amazing! FPTV has only been in operation for nine months!!!

It has taken a village to make Family Promise successful at TPC and much of that success lies with the dedication of TPC's Host Coordinators, Derrilyn Bayha and Pam Bowen. They are two of the strongest Host Coordinators of all the Family Promise congregations, and families love to stay at TPC because they know that the volunteers will be well-trained and things will go smoothly. Many thanks to the 30 to 35 people who volunteered each quarter when TPC was the Host Church.

I look forward to more positive Family Promise experiences in 2020, as we put our faith into action helping to end homelessness, one family at a time.
