For it's almost 2021 And apologies to the bard but by the pricking of My two thumbs And it better be the case that something WONDERFUL this way comes



## ANNUAL PER CAPITA UNDERSTANDING PER CAPITA AND WHY YOUR CONTRIBUTION MATTERS

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all the nearly 10,000 congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate, and share in the work of the wider church. The term "per capita" refers to each member. Congregations are asked to contribute to the administrative costs of the regional and national church based on the number of members enrolled. TPC's Per Capita for 2021 is \$10,549 or \$36.50 for each member.

The regional district, called Presbytery of the Cascades, receives \$22.33 of each \$36.50 paid. Examples of how this money is used include-

- Staff and committees which provide resources to pastors and elders
- Warm Springs Presbyterian Church as it provides humanitarian and spiritual services on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation
- Presbytery meetings where commissioners from our 96 congregations discuss and adopt policies that further our common mission in Oregon.

The Synod of the Pacific receives \$5.22 from each member. Our Synod consists of 11 Presbyteries covering Oregon, Idaho, California, and Nevada. Examples of The Synod spending are-

- Funding projects that help presbytery leaders understand our emerging spiritual context
- Offering low-cost loans for energy efficiency projects on church properties.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) receives \$8.95 from each member. The General Assembly utilizes funds to-

• Promote international and ecumenical dialog and partnership,

• Provide legal services and advocacy (a minister in this presbytery received legal help to secure a visa so he could keep serving his congregation)

• Hold conventions and conferences where Presbyterians come together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

Your contribution matters to the Presbyterian Church and directly to TPC. Per Capita payments (\$36.50 per member) can be paid by check or online. #### FAMILY PROMISE OF TUALATIN VALLEY UPDATE

Tualatin Valley What a month December was for Family Promise of Tualatin Valley – As the CARES funding was winding down, the Family Promise case managers were pulling out all the stops to make sure

every family was either into housing, at one of the Extended Stay units managed by FPTV, or were occupying one of the two apartments St. Anthony's Catholic Church has provided for our families. TPC provided all the furniture and household items for six moves this month, and all furniture is almost out of TPC's basement. Every donated bed made its home with a family. What an endeavor Judy and her team (mostly Bob!) had making that happen. This furniture ministry has been such a blessing for the family recipients, and Family Promise is ever grateful that TPC let them use the space—who knew it would organically grow as it did! However, it is a hopeful note that our church facility is returning to normal. In the future, Family Promise will provide families with a scaled down move-in items such as queen or twin beds, linens, and kitchen supplies (dishes, pots, pans and utensils) and maintain those items in a couple of storage units.

Other Christmas notables, a tree farm donated a small live Christmas tree to every family. Suburban Door's Mr. & Mrs. Santa Claus delivered the church-donated presents to every program family, and TPC dedicated the Christmas Memorial fund to Family Promise.

The year ended with over 6,000 bed nights provided to people who needed a safe, clean place to sleep—not to mention 18,000 meals! So many comments were made by program families that not having to worry about food was such a blessing.

Thank you, TPC, for your unwavering generosity and support to make a difference in the lives of others.

#### MASK UPDATE

The money that we collect goes toward buying protective masks for the farm workers of Clackamas County. This is part of a project that Bridging Cultures, a non-profit with which I am affiliated, provides for the needs of the farm workers, especially during the Covid pandemic. This is in partnership with the Oregon Health Authority. The OHA has limited funds to provide for the needs of each farm worker so our help enables Bridging Cultures to provide more cloth masks (reusable) to all of these workers on the front line of agriculture. Bridging Cultures (BC) has reached 54 farms at this point and distributed 1,825 masks (both disposable and reusable). When they give out these masks and other PPE, they provide information about contagious diseases and other available resources. At the same time BC helps to coordinate testing events at the different farms. BC has never had enough masks to satisfy the need but they are grateful for the masks we provide. The farm workers and farmers are most grateful for these masks. The farm workers have said that they thought that nobody cared about them and their health (and their families') and now they know that people do care about them. It means a lot!
