A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Greetings all,

Last year around this time I read a great book written by the historian, David McCullough, titled "Brave Companions". It is filled with small capturing some of vignettes the most fascinating men and women in 19th century America other than the ones you've heard about- like some guys named Lewis and Clark for instance. ⁽ⁱ⁾ One of my favorite stories that McCullough captures is the life and exploration of Louis Agassiz. Born in Switzerland in 1808, Louis Agassiz traveled to America, established himself at a little school (at the time) by the name of Harvard University. He became one of the most famous scientists of his day championing the belief that in the past, the earth had suffered several cataclysmic ice ages, a view we still hold today.

In one of the more dramatic images from Agassiz's life, McCullough describes that to get more and more proof for his ice age theory the scientist had to take larger and more daring risks. At one point, Agassiz found himself literally at the end of his rope. Agassiz had descended a harrowing 120 feet into a crystal blue well in one of the world's largest glaciers in Aar in the Swiss Alps. Only by clinging to the very end of his lifeline, Agassiz was able to collect the final data that convinced the world of his theories, though nearly freezing to death in the process.

Now, I think what I love about this story is the contrast between Agassiz's safe life at Harvard and his kind of Indiana Jones-like life literally on the edge. I love this story of Agassiz having to push himself to go all the way to the end of his rope, because only there, only at this uncomfortable and risky place, was he able to find and learn what he most needed to gather. I love this, because it reminds me of us here at TPC. It reminds me of myself. On the one hand like Agassiz's life at Harvard, life here at

TPC is really quite good, isn't it? Yes, we're dealing with some building issue, and we have to work on improving some of our programs, but on the whole life is good. The pastoral transition is going well, and the congregation responded with amazing generosity during the stewardship drive this year enabling the session to pass a balanced and more ambitious budget for 2005. So much about the ministry at TPC is positive and comfortable and there is very little need to change to keep this being a great place. But on the other hand? Well, the other hand is that week after week we find ourselves confronted by the Gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ that almost always asks us to climb down our rope a bit and stretch and grow in ways that aren't always easy. Some weeks we may find we are like Peter, called to leave the safety and comfort of our 'boats' in order to meet Jesus out there in risky waters. Some weeks we are more like Mary, called to ignore the negative criticisms of those around us and to sit at Jesus' feet stretching our minds and learning new things. And some weeks we'll be called to be more like Paul, a man driven to bring this amazing message of God's love to suffering people who absolutely ached for this message that we are saved only by God's amazing grace- grace alone and nothing else. Like Agassiz pushing himself to the limit, week after week we, too, hear the Gospel message calling us out of our comfort zones.

Now what's really wonderful here about Agassiz's adventure is that this isn't an either/or kind of story. It's not as if Agassiz's life at Harvard was negative or bad and his life at the bottom of the Aar glacier is where he should live all the time. No. The truth is Agassiz needed both Harvard and his time on the edge to be productive. He required the seclusion and comfort of Harvard to study his findings and to write and communicate his ideas to the world. And he needed his time in terms of parking as well as the seating in the sanctuary. Some of our members actually saw visitors come and leave when they didn't see enough open space to feel comfortable. Start praying and thinking

about whether adding another service in the fall or spring of 2005 might be something towards which the Gospel is calling us. Finally, we do a great job at TPC feeding our sheep. We put a great deal of effort into providing solid worship, fantastic fellowship opportunities, and programs for our children and youth to learn and thrive. I wonder, can we continue to improve in these areas, at the same time that we begin to think about being more of a what a great place this is? Are there needs in our community that we can help meet if, like Agassiz, we're open to stepping out of our comfort zone?

I'm not sure about the answers to any of these questions. It will take all of our hearts together to discern where God's spirit leads. What I do know for sure is that it is truly an honor and a privilege to be your pastor. Melis, Will, and I continue to settle in, and it's exciting to begin to see creative possibilities with you. I think we're doing a great job, and I'm looking forward to see what new things God will be doing in our midst in the years ahead.



The Nix family enjoys travel, theater, dining, entertaining friends, and spending time with their 8-year-old grandson.




