

TUALATIN SCHOOL HOUSE PANTRY

On Saturday, January 23, at the women's ministry brunch Mike Shiffer spoke about the Food Pantry where he has been an organizer and volunteer for many years. He is

currently President of the Food Pantry Board.

Some the facts Mike shared...

The first food pantry in Tualatin was opened more than 30 years ago at a local Seventh Day Adventist Church. In an effort to serve more needy neighbors, more often, the Tualatin Food Pantry transitioned to the Tualatin School House Pantry in 2004.

The Pantry started in the basement of the old Tualatin Elementary School on Boones Ferry Road, then moved to two portables on the school property before finding its current home at Rolling Hills Community Church, located at 3550 SW Borland Road. The pantry has been there 12 years.

On average this pantry serves 550 to 700 families each month.

The pantry has 120 regular volunteers and one parttime paid staff person.

The annual budget is \$140,000 of which 74% is spent on direct services to clients.

Over 80% of the pantry's financial donations come from individuals and local businesses. The remainder comes from grants and other organizations.


Linda Moholt and Mike Shiffer co-founded the Tualatin School House Pantry 12 years ago.

No one has ever been turned away because there was not enough food. The pantry primarily serves families living in Tualatin, Durham, Lake Oswego and West Linn.

Current needs include: peanut butter, canned fruit, specifically peaches, pineapples and mixed fruit. Also needed are condensed soups (that you add water to), specifically chicken noodle, canned corn and vegetables. Non-food items needed include TP, diapers (all sizes) and women's hygiene products.

Referring to the slogan printed on his shirt, Mike concluded his presentations by saying, "Thank you for helping to feed my soul."
