

## A NOTE FROM PASTOR KEN

Who likes to be told no? Who wants to find out they have to do more with less? Who enjoys constraints?

Fascinatingly, in *A Beautiful Constraint: How to Transform Your Limitations into Advantages and Why It's Everyone's Business*, authors Adam Morgan and Mark Barden argue constraints are a blessing rather than a curse.


Constraints, which they define as “a limitation...that materially affects our ability to do something,” come in four flavors. There are foundational constraints, where an organization lacks something most people believe is fundamental to success. There are resource constraints where people or money are lacking. Time is the third constraint, and I think everybody knows something about that one. Finally there is a method constraint, where we are limited by having to do something in a certain way.

Before Zappos very few people believed anyone would want to buy shoes you can't try on and feel on your feet. But due their incredible customer service, free shipping, and free returns, Zappos turned a foundational constraint into a flourishing organization. I didn't realize this, but Southwest started out with four planes back in the 1970's. Then, they had to sell one of them, causing a severe resource constraint. Their desire to do more with less is what spurred them to innovate and come up with their unique unallocated seating plan. That innovation allowed them to prepare a plane in ten minutes compared to the hour it took all the other airlines. That, plus their sense of fun, made Southwest incredibly successful. A company I have never heard of, Aravind, had the ambition of offering quality eye surgery to poor Indians. To accomplish this Aravind had to find a different method to distribute care. Aravind's founder developed a surgical assembly-line modeled after McDonalds of all places. The efficiency Aravind achieved allowed the company to carry out an enormous number of operations at a thousandth of the cost and with a fraction of the complications seen in traditional hospital models.

*A Beautiful Constraint* is a business book, but it's easy to see the principle in action throughout the scriptures. The story of creation is a story of God creating constraints, separating day from night, water from land, and so on. These lines being drawn against the free-for-all of chaos creates the conditions for radical diversity to emerge. The people are forged by constraints. The Jewish people are known by their adherence to the law, a set of constraints freeing them for service. Even Christians with a less positive view of the law still lift up the ten commandments as a faithful way to live together as a people. The Apostle Paul, being constrained by being only one person, had to find ways to communicate to the various communities he helped start. His solution: letters. Paul's letters represent the earliest material in the New Testament and give us a vital glimpse into the formation of the early church.

Constraints are easy to identify in our lives, too. The signs of the great Snowpocalypse are still melting in the church parking lot as I write this. The snow brought a massive constraint to us. Schools were cancelled. Businesses closed. We were unable to worship together on Sunday, January 8<sup>th</sup>. As some of you know from my social media whining, I found the constraints offered by the snow to be anything but beautiful after the first few days. And yet, as I look back, the snow forced me that Sunday morning we couldn't hold worship to do something I had never before considered: broadcast morning prayer using Facebook Live. I honestly thought it would be easier than it was, but in the end I figured it out. And we reached way more people than I would have ever guessed, leading me to ponder a regular vespers service or some other possibility.

And I'm left wondering about you. What are the constraints in your own life? And if, like me, you initially find these constraints a burden, I wonder if, with some effort and creativity, there might be a way of reframing what might appear at first to be a limiting curse as something that could lead to a legitimate blessing?

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## PROJECT LINUS

The Portland/Vancouver Project Linus chapter, including the Red Cross, are the national organizations that meet once a month at TPC.

Over the last 16 years, our Project Linus chapter has given 47,543 blankets to children who are traumatized, seriously ill or in need of a new comfort blanket! The blankets are knitted, crocheted, or sewn out of fleece, or flannel, made by volunteers – including youth groups as service projects, church groups like our Loving Stitches, Girl Scouts, and at Expos and fairs.

In January, we gave a total of 1070 blankets to the following groups: Evergreen Memorial Gardens, Salmon Creek NICU, Doernbecher Children's Hospital, various DSHS offices, Randall Hospital, CARES NW, and Innovative Services NW.
