

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Well, MUCH is going on at TPC these days! Along with the usual business at the start of a new year (approving the annual budget, pastoral terms of call, the annual report to General Assembly, AND the nominating committee) the session of TPC also continues to burn the candle at both ends working with Dr. Corey Schlosser-Hall to hone in on our vision and strategic initiatives for the future.

After our December meeting with Corey, we were tasked with exploring our community. What do folks love about our community? What would folks like to see changed? Half of the group was assigned to ask the congregation these questions; half the group explored these questions among the broader Tigard/Tualatin/Sherwood community.

We learned some really interesting things. Namely, we learned folks are pretty happy- both within the church and among the community. In the church people feel welcome to be themselves and appreciate the many positive ways the church lives, worships, and engages in the world. In the larger community people feel safe and enjoy living in our beautiful corner of the world. However, there is plenty of room for improvement. In the church some would like to see more diversity in our gathering and outreach. Some would like to see different musical expressions during worship or a different worship service altogether. Many, including the leadership, believes as we have grown we need to improve our ability to communicate- that often the left hand doesn't know what the right hand is doing. In the larger community there is a sense that we could be more connected- yes, people feel safe, but they also report not knowing one another very well, and there is a longing for a stronger sense of community.

So, we heard all of these thoughts and feelings, and we are now spending some time in three groups praying and discerning some possible next steps. I want to underline the fact that we are praying and discerning right now- we will not make substantive decisions without further engaging the congregation and hearing your thoughts about where we sense God is leading us. However, this is a pastoral note- the happiness we report at TPC can be dangerous. God is always calling us to grow and change as a body. Happiness can often mask complacency- good can often be the enemy of great. I suspect some of the ways God is calling us to move will be uncomfortable at first, and I will invite you to prayerfully consider now how discomfort isn't always a bad thing.

We decided because we've committed to Family Promise this year, we need to be careful about how much extra we want to engage and settled on three study groups. One group is exploring how we can communicate better with one another and the community around us. A second group is exploring the possibility of a second worship expression. And a third group is looking at how to integrate these new possibilities while keeping a close eye on shepherding all of the many excellent ministries and programs we already have going. (We have quite a few balls in the air at this point.) J Please pray for the session, our church, and our community. We are excited about what the Holy Spirit is doing in our midst!

CATCHING THE STORY OF STORY-CATCHER JOHN CASEBEER

It is my pleasure, as Parish 2 Deacon, to offer a slice of the story of John Casebeer. He is a dedicated session member and is always interested in capturing the stories of TPC members. In light of his enthusiasm for catching stories, I thought it only fitting to capture a piece of his. John and I worked together on the story below.

Peggy Gibbons

John grew up in Anaheim, California; his birth was a surprise to his parents who were in their 40's. His father was the pastor and they lived in the parsonage across the street from First Christian Church. His brother and two sisters were 8-20 years older, so in many aspects he grew up as an only child. When John was 22 years old, he graduated from Pacific Christian College and Cal State Fullerton with a degree in Communications, which was the only subject he felt made any practical sense. John loved being in drama at school beginning in 8th grade. He gave up a small dream of being an actor when he was chosen as the lead in a play at college. The trouble was the script required him to kiss a female classmate, who was just a friend, many, many times. When he realized acting required acting, he quit. Being an Elvis impersonator for some previous years he still needed to create and to perform, so he started a rock band. His band days ended after two years, coinciding with the death of his father and a divorce.

After working lots of different jobs John found a good fit with a young company called Federal Express. He tried becoming a manager, but was rejected twice because he had too much empathy for his employees. After going back to school to check out becoming a lawyer or salesperson, he found that outside sales provided the stage where he could really love and serve a multitude of people all over the Western U.S., Canada, and Asia. After having the unique pleasure of visiting thousands of businesses and meeting thousands more people, after 37 years at FEDEX he retired in 2016 as a Senior Executive of International Sales.

Adulthood really began for John around age 24 when events coincided to form the wake-up call he really needed. After giving up hope of ever finding a person to love again, he walked into a business by mistake and saw Kathryn. They have been married almost 38 years.

A couple of years after moving to Tualatin in 2004, Kathryn began attending St. Francis Catholic Church in Sherwood. On weekends John and Kathryn would help with the church's landscaping needs. One dark and rainy Sunday night, John was attending Mass because it was some holiday, and Father Tom was reading a Psalm. For the first time in John's life he heard someone really speaking about a real God. The Psalmist's words sounded like God was really there, really hearing, and the Psalmist knew he was speaking to the I AM. He left that night with a small hope in his heart and soul, which said, "God might listen, God is beginning to feel real to me."

In August 2010 he walked into TPC and sat in the back row with Dorothy Butts and Marian Smith. Unexpectedly he really liked the preacher and the feel of the place. He also began to attend Adult Edge, where to his astonishment real people discussed real topics with real opinions. Ken's fantastic sermons inspired him to read again. Even as he was trying to reconcile the horrors of real life with a God of love, TPC provided a safe place where he was finding himself and the God he never knew, surrounded by people he truly loved.

According to John, to really understand his current life and how he ended up living in Tualatin and his by-chance arrival at Tualatin Presbyterian Church, the timeline would begin in 2010. John believes that small decisions, by-chance conversations, unlikely paths crossing, initially miniscule moments of connection, eventually fit together to create the most startling and simple revelation. God was with him every moment and evermore.

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UNDERSTANDING PER CAPITA AND WHY IT MATTERS TO CONTRIBUTE

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate and share in the work of the wider church. The term "per capita" refers to each member. Congregations are asked to contribute to the administrative costs of the regional and national church based on the number of members enrolled. Our Per Capita for 2019 is \$35.50 for each member.

The regional district, called Presbytery of the Cascades, receives \$21.33 of that amount. This money funds (among other things)

- Staff and committees which provide resources to pastors and elders
- Warm Springs Presbyterian Church as it provides humanitarian and spiritual services on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation
- Presbytery meetings where commissioners from our 96 congregations discuss and adopt policies that further our common mission in Oregon.

The Synod of the Pacific receives \$5.22 from each member. Our Synod consists of 11 Presbyteries covering Oregon, Idaho, California and Nevada. The Synod (among other things)

- Funds projects that help presbytery leaders understand our emerging spiritual context
- Offers low cost loans for Energy efficiency projects on church properties

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) receives \$8.95 from each member. The General Assembly (among other things)

- promotes international and ecumenical dialog and partnership,
- provides legal services and advocacy (a minister in this presbytery received legal help to secure a visa so he could keep serving his congregation)
- holds conventions and conferences where Presbyterians come together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

At the Stated Session meeting on January 15th, Session approved the following: The 2019 TPC General Fund Budget of \$402,565, unchanged from the budget presented to the congregation at the January 13, 2019 Meeting Before the Meeting after worship.

The 2019 pastoral terms of call for the Rev. Dr. Ken Evers-Hood for submission to the congregation for approval.

Session also discussed and approved:
The Session representatives to the nominating committee Craig Bowen and Russ Carlin.
For the annual Oregon Non-Profit Corporation registration, Judy Nix as President, Rick Crall as Secretary and Registered Agent.
Approved a special arrangement with the Tualatin Valley Preschool for reduced rent for the remainder of the 2018-2019 school year.
Session also received a presentation by Eagle Scout candidate Andrew MacHaffie for a project to enhance the Memorial Garden.

The next regular Session meeting will be Tuesday, February 19, 2018.

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THE CLERK OF SESSION WOULD LIKE SOME HELP

OVERVIEW: The clerk of session is a ruling elder who is elected by the session. At TPC the clerk serves a one-year term that can be renewed. The clerk is an officer of TPC and a non-voting member of session. It is a volunteer position.

In my opinion, the best part of the clerk's job is the role of representing the congregation and session in the liturgies of the blessing of new members, and in baptisms and ordinations. Most of the rest of the clerk's work is behind the scenes and invisible to most of the congregation.

Over the years, the clerk's work has grown such that there is too much for one person. This year, we want to create a task force, or committee of volunteers, to spread the workload. The organization and structure of this group is evolving, and will depend on the insight, skills and suggestions of those who volunteer to help. Below is a list of things that the clerk does. If you see something in this list that interests you, you may be a candidate to help.

Duties of the clerk are:

Attend, record and prepare minutes of session and congregational meetings.

Write and submit a summary of these meetings for inclusion in the monthly TPC newsletter.

Maintain the official TPC membership rolls

Prepare statistical reports for the Presbytery.

Compile and print the annual report to the congregation.

Do the annual membership roll review.

Maintain the Session calendar.

Assist in the preparation of the monthly session meeting agenda.

File reports on behalf of the congregation with the local Presbytery office.

Complete the annual presbytery review of records (minutes and statistics

Communicate with other churches regarding membership transfers, as needed.

Record ordinations, baptisms and other records pertaining to members.

Coordinate the session's representative to deacons' meetings.

Keep the church's operations manual up to date when Session takes actions that affect the manual.

Currently, I am in the process of getting all our church records into digital form so that they are accessible and searchable on a computer, and that's a big task.

HEALTHY RECIPE from Susan Fee

Mexican Chicken Soup

Relish—mix together:

½ C chopped fresh cilantro

½ C chopped green onions

1 tsp grated lime rind

3 oz. crumbled queso fresco

1 diced, peeled avocado

Spice Blend—mix together:

2 ½ tsp chili powder

2 tsp cumin

1 ½ tsp ground coriander

1 tsp dried oregano

1 tsp cracked black pepper

½ tsp kosher salt

Soup:

1 Tbsp olive or avocado oil

1 roasted chicken skinned, boned and chopped

2 C chopped sweet onion

1 red, yellow and green bell pepper chopped

1 Tbsp minced garlic

2 C fresh corn kernels

32 oz. chicken broth

28 oz. can fire-roasted crushed tomatoes

2 Tbsp fresh lime juice

In a bowl, toss the chicken with 1 ½ Tbsp of the spice blend. Heat the oil in a Dutch oven. Add onion, bell peppers, garlic, and salt. Sprinkle with remaining spice blend. Saute 8 minutes or until vegies are tender. Stir in chicken, corn, broth, and tomatoes; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes. Stir in lime juice. Serve topped with relish.
