A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN



Dear friends, it's almost February as I write this- 2021 somehow got off to a very fast start! And I'm excited to see what 2021 brings. At our annual congregation meeting in January I shared a little bit about what I see ahead for us, and I thought I'd just take a moment and say a bit more...

The most significant change we're anticipating in 2021 is restarting in-person worship. We will need to deep clean the facility before we are ready to safely return. But even after this, we still don't know what kinds of modifications we will need to observe. Will we need to socially distance, which will limit our seating capacity? Can we serve food and beverages in the same informal way, or will we need to shift this? And so many other questions we just can't answer until we get a little bit closer and learn more from our local experts. My personal guestimate is mid-September or October before we are safely prepared to reopen, but I am confident this will happen in 2021 and we will be ready!

Related to physically re-opening but distinct- we are also working on a plan to continue live-streaming our worship service when we are able to physically return. This requires at least three things: equipment; people; and a mental and emotional shift on the part of TPC. As I write this some physical changes are already being implemented. The back wall of the sanctuary is being painted a color that will allow my, uh, pasty complexion, to be a BIT more photogenic. (It's possible the phrase "lipstick on a pig" may have been mentioned, but remembering back to my porcine companion who squealed when I kissed her-I'm taking this as a compliment…) Other physical changes will be put into place to livestream our service taking great care to avoid interfering with the worship experience we had come to appreciate and expect. The emotional shift is simply to acknowledge that even when we're back together- the church isn't the building but the people. Some of our members may continue to worship from home. A more far flung community joining us via the web will continue to be present with us in worship. And, based on conversations with colleagues, I am already planning ways to honor and include these other attendees who are just as much a part of TPC as those of us lucky enough to live here.

Another vital shift in 2021 is we will be welcoming a new music director. I held off on immediately re-hiring after Gary moved to support his wife, Michelle, in Lake Oswego, because it wasn't clear what skills we would need. While we want all of the traditional skills- leading worship, directing the choir, and overseeing the music program- we weren't sure what else we needed this person to be able to do. Given the hybrid nature of worship for the foreseeable future, we now have a better sense for the technical skills we also desire, and we are hopeful to hire someone wonderful within the next two months.

Speaking of new people, we also have to identify and welcome a pastor (or pastors) to cover for my sabbatical this summer. Again, thanks to the grant from the Lily Foundation, TPC will not have to pay for pastoral coverage out of our budget. But we still have to find someone to shepherd the congregation for three months. Because we will still be social distancing, it's possible this person may not need to live here, however, we will still plan for pastoral care on the ground here as well. It's also possible instead of one person, we may hire more than one in order to hear from more voices. It isn't clear just exactly what the Spirit has in mind for us yet, but we are moving quickly to address this as the summer is rapidly approaching.

Two other opportunities I'm excited about. We have been working on shifting our deacons from being a board mainly responding to challenges in our lives like births, deaths, and significant illnesses to being more of a team positively focused on supporting us in our day to day walk. Last year we offered Holy Friends, a deacon led group in which a small group of people worked together to focus on their own growth. This year, they will be offering themselves for short (no more than 30 minutes) meetings inviting you to consider how you would like to grow in 2021, who and what is supporting you in this work, and what obstacles might be in your way. This is not mandatory. (No one HAS to grow!) It is a gift we are

offering for you to sit down with yourself and decide how you want to focus. I will be conducting these interviews with all of the officers, and then you will be hearing from your deacons. This year our intention is to hold one round of conversations between February and March and then another in September and October to see what you've noticed and learned about yourself. I hope you take advantage of this opportunity!

Then, in Lent I will be hosting a six week Lenten Bible study at 7 PM beginning Ash Wednesday. I will be hosting this on Zoom, and all are welcome and encouraged to join. Lent is a wonderful season to pause, reflect, and center yourself for Easter and the year ahead.

And of course morning prayer continues every morning during the week at 9 AM- it's been a gift of a community I didn't even know I was needing until we had started it. And there's always room for more!

ANNUAL PER CAPITA

UNDERSTANDING PER CAPITA AND WHY YOUR CONTRIBUTION MATTERS

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all the nearly 10,000 congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate, and share in the work of the wider church. The term "per capita" refers to each member. Congregations are asked to contribute to the administrative costs of the regional and national church based on the number of members enrolled. TPC's Per Capita for 2021 is \$10,549 or \$36.50 for each member.

The regional district, called Presbytery of the Cascades, receives \$22.33 of each \$36.50 paid. Examples of how this money is used include-

• Staff and committees which provide resources to pastors and elders

• Warm Springs Presbyterian Church as it provides humanitarian and spiritual services on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation

• Presbytery meetings where commissioners from our 96 congregations discuss and adopt policies that further our common mission in Oregon.

The Synod of the Pacific receives \$5.22 from each member. Our Synod consists of 11 Presbyteries covering Oregon, Idaho, California, and Nevada. Examples of The Synod spending are-

• Funding projects that help presbytery leaders understand our emerging spiritual context

• Offering low-cost loans for energy efficiency projects on church properties.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) receives \$8.95 from each member. The General Assembly utilizes funds to-

• Promote international and ecumenical dialog and partnership,

• Provide legal services and advocacy (a minister in this presbytery received legal help to secure a visa so he could keep serving his congregation)

• Hold conventions and conferences where Presbyterians come together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

Your contribution matters to the Presbyterian Church and directly to TPC. Per Capita payments (\$36.50 per member) can be paid by check or online. FAMILY PROMISE OF TUALATIN VALLEY UPDATE

The year is off to a good start with 3 families already into housing in the first month of the year!

A question that Pam, Derrilyn, and I often get is how long do we work with graduate families. While we are still providing some follow-up care to families that have been in the program two years, the goal is to continue to provide post graduate assistance for twelve months. During that time, the case manager is checking in at least monthly and providing connection to resources if the family has needs. Within this post graduate time, they are eligible for up to \$500 of rental assistance and for up to \$200 of utility assistance should those needs arise. Always the goal is to keep a family in housing and that has been the case with those families FPTV has worked with.

We continue to get calls regarding furniture donations, so to clarify again, the Family Promise Move In Program consists of the move in baskets provided by TPC and containing a nice supply of cleaning products, kitchen towels, etc. The furniture program is scaled down to include beds (queen and twin only), linens, towels, dishes, flatware and kitchen utensils. As always, it takes a village to make programs of this magnitude function effectively, and we are so grateful for the support of our TPC family. You truly are solving homelessness, one family at a time.

Something that sounds oh so easy, but hard to attain.


Items needed currently include: canned vegetables (all varieties), hearty soup, peanut butter, canned meats and canned pasta.
