

## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN



Dear friends,

Pastors should come with a user's guide.

I know this from personal experience. Once, many, many moons ago I played timpani in a small Easter ensemble at my home church, Emmanuel Presbyterian Church, in Bedford, Texas. After what I'm sure was a dazzling performance, I left that service filled with the Easter spirit...so much so that I forgot all about taking that timpani with me such that I could return it to my high school the next day.

So, I did what anyone would do. I called the pastor to get him to open up the church so I could remove the drums. On Sunday night. On Sunday night, the day of Easter worship.

I was honestly surprised at the surly response I received. It was something along the lines of "You want me to do WHAT??" paired with several other creative, unprintable anatomically based suggestions of what I might do with said timpani.

Of course today I have a good sense of why he responded the way he did. What I did was the equivalent of calling your accountant on April 15<sup>th</sup> and seeing if they wouldn't mind coming over and helping you move some stuff you've been meaning to get to for a few weeks. Time and place, Ken, time and place...

But I didn't know that at the time, mainly because I didn't know much about pastors. And I'm guessing a lot of you are in the same boat. Being a pastor is a wonderful and strange job, and there are as many ways of inhabiting the role as there are people. I had a pretty good sense of how to do this work before the pandemic. We found a new rhythm during the lockdown. But this strange hybrid season has been tricky. Am I physically in the office? When? Is it ok to email me, call me, or set up a time to meet? And what kinds of topics can I be helpful with anyway? Do I personally feel comfortable meeting people in person or traveling to see them either in a public setting or at their home? Can I visit you if you are in the hospital or care facility?

These are good questions. Here's a stab at giving you a very limited user's guide to Pastor Ken during this phase of the pandemic.

**Office hours:** I am coming into the office now on a limited basis. Most mornings I take the girls to school and then lead morning prayer from my home, and starting in February I will generally be physically present in the office on Mondays from 11-5; Tuesdays 11-2, and Wednesdays from 11-5. I do have some standing appointments at the office during these times, so if you want to make sure you can meet with me, please send me a note to schedule. If those hours don't work for you, feel free to reach out anyway- I can often be flexible.

**Can you email me, text me, and set up a time to meet with me?** Of course. Sometimes, if I know there is something particularly challenging for you, I will proactively reach out to you, but if you know you would like prayer or counsel, please let me know you'd like to meet. I'll do my best to make that happen.

**What kinds of things can we meet about?** Pastors tend to have three kinds of conversations with folks. First off, what most pastors are best at is listening. So often we encounter folks wanting to give us advice or who hope they can help put us on the right track...which looks suspiciously like their track. How rare it is to bring up something you're chewing on with one who is listening with curiosity rather than working on solutions immediately. Most of the time I find we aren't even sure what we're thinking or feeling until we begin to talk about it anyway. So, one of the best ways to use a pastor's time is to be contemplating something and use this space to sound out your ideas without a ton of expectations or a need to arrive at an action plan. Second, pastors are a bit like Swiss army knives- we often know a little bit about a lot of things. You may have a need and know you need outside help, but you may not be sure where to turn. One of my favorite things is to sit with a person and be with them as they discover what they are

really needing to work on and then pairing them with the right health care provider or mental health specialist. Third, pastors are ALWAYS happy to talk with you about questions you have regarding your experience of God, the interpretation of a troubling Biblical passage, the workings of the church, or to pray. Although, I will issue a warning if you would like to talk about something you think the church should be offering that it isn't...many pastors including this one will probably want to know just how much time and energy you are willing to expend in making such an offering happen. The more you are willing to lead, the more interest and support you will find.

**Do I feel comfortable seeing folks in person?** Absolutely. I'm fully vaccinated which means two shots plus a booster currently. I feel comfortable seeing folks in my office without masks or meeting offsite. I am more than happy to chat on the phone or meet on zoom as well.

**Can I visit you in a hospital or care facility?** This has been one of the hardest challenges of COVID. I cannot visit you in a hospital setting. I have been able to visit some people in some senior care/rehabilitation centers, but this is on a case by case basis. Some folks allow for it, but most still do not, understandably. I suspect these things will shift as the pandemic ebbs and will, hopefully, morph into an endemic.

## TPC 2022 BUDGET

As the Treasurer for the last several years, I want to put the budget for this year in context so that all members of the congregation have a clear picture of where we stand financially.

**The budget process.** We begin developing the budget for the following year in September by asking the Session to submit projected expenses for their areas of responsibility in the year ahead (e.g. personnel, building & grounds, administration, mission, etc.). The totals of the expenses are presented to the congregation at the start of the Stewardship campaign, typically with an "ask" of increasing pledges by X%. After the conclusion of the campaign, the Finance Committee takes the total of all received pledges and considers that as a firm base for our income. Other sources of income (non-pledged income, per capita contributions, prior year surplus, and facility rental) are estimated and added to the pledged amount. This sum is then compared to the amount that Session has requested.

For 2022, the gap between Session requests and total estimated income was too large. The primary reason is that the amount of pledged income was noticeably lower than in past years. The erosion of the number of pledging units has been a multi-year fact; however, the drop this year was larger. There are several reasons for this:

- as evidenced by all the pictures on the Memorial Wall in the sanctuary, we have lost many members, some of whom were substantial contributors;
- members have moved out of the area due to job opportunities;
- members have retired from their professions and altered their budgets;
- we are a community of faith that depends on personal interaction and the pandemic over the last two years has fractured group and personal interactions;
- people have lost contact with the church due to closure of the church caused by the pandemic.

The requirement to have a balanced budget led the Finance Committee to recommend:  
a series of reductions to Session's requests,  
eliminate any cost of living pay increases,  
consume the entire 2021 surplus, and  
take the unprecedented action of dipping into reserves.

While we have, at times, used the general fund prior year surplus to balance the budget, we have seldom used other financial reserves beyond that to balance. **We did so this year.** We all need to understand that this is **not sustainable**. We cannot keep "eating our seed corn" and remain financially viable. We know that future capital expenses are looming. Without the general and capital reserves set aside for these expenses, we compromise our ability to carry out our primary mission.

**Family Promise Tualatin Valley** had over 500 referrals in 2021! This is more than double what we had in the previous year. 2021 was a year of growth. The staff doubled from a year ago to 10 employees. We opened the cold weather shelter in November and have a full program of 21 households now. FPTV provides housing and food for these people and gets them case managers to procure the services they need. We recently found out the cold weather program will be open into April instead of March.

The shelter program currently has 14 households. In 2021 Tualatin Presbyterian Church provided over 228 volunteer hours and 5040 meals to 58 adults and 61 children. We also provided Christmas presents for families consisting of coats, gloves and hats and a personal gift. We helped 40 families enter stable housing and 90% of them have been able to remain in their homes. In addition to the shelter folks, we have been able to help many others with rental assistance to keep them from losing their housing and provide items and services so they can continue to be housed.

All together FPTV donated over 45,000 meals!! This is a huge accomplishment and we couldn't have done it without YOU! We have logged over 1500 volunteer hours from individuals from 15 different churches and civic organizations.

TPC will continue to provide meals in 2022 and we appreciate the donations to allow us to contribute to this mission. Our next opportunity to donate food is March 28, 2022.

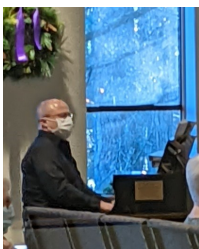
## **FOUNDATIONS OF CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP INNOVATION GRANT**

Last spring, the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship Grant committee produced four sets of windows for Advent, Lent, Easter and Ordinary time. An idea for a fifth set of windows – The Miracles of Jesus was considered by the grant committee as well, but the team was not able to find a suitable artist to design the windows at that time.

Sarah Beck, Director of Family Ministries, applied for a \$3,500 grant offered by Duke Divinity, Foundation of Christian Leadership program to design and implement a creative project in the church. She wrote the grant for “Post-Pandemic Art Expression through the Miracles of Jesus.” Jeff Cameron agreed to work with Elie (George) Inglesby to design and create images of the five miracles of Jesus: Turning Water Into Wine, Healing the Paralyzed Man, Calming the Sea, Feeding the 5,000, and Raising Lazarus from the Dead. Jeff Cameron also took responsibility for formatting and printing the five windows. Elie is currently a sophomore majoring in illustration at George Fox University.

In the sanctuary and narthex we are hosting an art exhibit of works created during the pandemic, as well as, a wall of remembrance to honor those we've lost during the pandemic.
