Women's Ministry is thrilled to announce our second (annual) retreat tentatively scheduled for fall 2024 at Menucha in the Columbia River Gorge. Our first retreat, held in the fall of 2022, was made possible through a generous \$5,000 Strengthening Ministries grant courtesy of the Foundations of Christian Leadership (FOCL) at Duke Divinity.

The \$5,000 grant was a testament to the Women's Ministry's commitment to nurturing and strengthening the fellowship and spiritually of its members. The grant committee facilitated the planning and execution of the retreat, providing the necessary resources to make the spiritual gathering a reality and this fall we hope to recapture the same enthusiasm and hope for the future of our church going forward.

Leading the last transformative retreat was Marianne Borg, the founding chair of the Marcus J. Borg Foundation. Marianne brought a wealth of experience and insight to the event, having served as a Episcopal priest for 18 years at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Portland. Her leadership offered a spiritually enriching experience for all attendees, as she drew from her deep well of knowledge and commitment to fostering spiritual growth through poetry, discussion, prayer and the lilies of the field in the Gospel of Matthew.
