



Something New for Lent

Ash Wednesday, which is March 5th this year, ushers in the season of Lent—a period of forty weekdays and six Sundays, concluding with Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. At 7:00 p.m., Ash Wednesday, we will gather at TPC for worship and enter into this season to reflect on what we need to keep, what it is we need to change, and what it is we need to turn around so that God can be fully present in our lives.

The word “Lent,” comes from the old English word *Lenten*, meaning “spring.” The Reverend Barbara Brown Taylor reminds us that Lent is “an invitation to a springtime for the soul . . . forty days to remember what it is like to live by the grace of God alone and not by what we can supply for ourselves.”

Often the question is asked, “What are you giving up for Lent?” While following this practice may result in shedding a few unwanted pounds, I would like to suggest instead that you take on something new this year by taking part in one of the Lenten Simple Supper Study Groups. These small groups will meet in various members’ homes to share a simple supper and a Bible study based on 2 Corinthians 3-5 called, “Clay Jar Christians in God’s Service.” This study prepared by Dr. Darrell Guder is a timely guide on what it means to be “ambassadors for Christ.”

Come experience this “springtime for the soul” each week, beginning with the Ash Wednesday through Holy Week.

LENTEN AND EASTER INFORMATION

Shrove Tuesday - Then and Now

The day before Ash Wednesday is Shrove Tuesday, sometimes called "Fat Tuesday." Centuries ago Christians often stuffed themselves with food before beginning 40 days of fasting for Lent. In those days, many Christians used up all the food containing fat, including dairy products. Because so many foods, including pancakes, used those fat products, many churches had huge feasts. A lot of people ate until they could hold no more — the beginnings of all-you-can eat dinners. Today many congregations still keep at least a semblance of the tradition. In communities around the world, churches serve pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. But today the purpose is to have Christian fellowship, not to devour everything in sight.

Spring Cleaning

March 5th, 2003, is Ash Wednesday. From that day until Easter we will be into the 40 days of Lent. Lent hints of spring, a time when the earth begins to awaken from a winter's nap, and new growth bursts forth all about us. More personally, it is an opportunity to enter into springtime for our spirit. For centuries Christians have used the 40 days of Lent to seek spiritual growth. Sincere repentance, a changing of heart, casting off old sinful practices and seeking to commune with our Creator help us go in the right direction. Spending serious time in silence and prayer focuses our attention. Reading spiritual literature, becoming more knowledgeable about the New Testament, meeting in small groups with other Christians to share personal stories of faith can all be immensely stimulating. Joining with others to serve the helpless and hopeless can strengthen our spiritual life. Lent is a time to let God do "spring cleaning" within us. It's our opportunity to allow God to help us toss out the "stuff" that hinders us, and then freshen up the "new creature" we are meant to be as followers of Christ.

Make a Snack to Share With a Friend

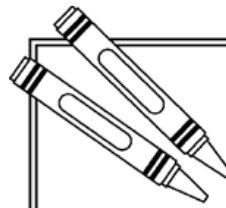
You will need:

- 🍲 large bowl
- 🍲 small bowl
- 🍴 spoon
- 🍴 fork
- 🍲 4 cups toasted oat cereal
- 🍲 1 can (6-1/2 oz.) peanuts*
- 🍲 1 cup raisins
- 🍴 1/4-cup margarine
- 🍴 1 package (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 🍴 plastic sandwich bags

How to make the treats:

- Mix the cereal, peanuts* and raisins in the large bowl.
- Melt the margarine in the small bowl using a microwave oven. *(Please ask an adult to help with this step.)*
- Pour the margarine over the cereal mixture.
- Use the fork to lightly toss the mixture until it's coated with margarine.
- Sprinkle the chocolate chips into the mixture and toss again.
- Spoon the mixture into the bags and share them with friends for a snack.

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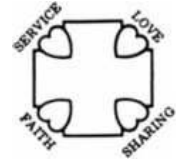

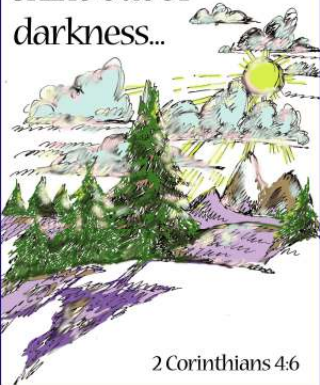
