



## God's Sign Language

In her thought-provoking book, *Speaking of Sin: The Lost Language of Salvation*, The Reverend Barbara Brown Taylor suggests that "recovering repentance" is the central focus of the season of Lent. The word repent, means "to turn around"- that is, to change direction—not just to reverse course and head off without purpose or destination, but to turn around and walk with God, who in Christ, is forever turning toward us.

The word Lent, comes from the old English word for "spring." This six week season before Easter not only refers to what is happening in the natural world but also to what is happening in the spiritual world, when "the hard, buried bulbs of our souls come into full flower."<sup>1</sup>

## **PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT**

TPC's Church Information Form (CIF) has been approved by TPC Session and by the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry. Our information is now included on the web site for the Presbyterian Church USA (PC USA), where ministers seeking a new call search for appropriate opportunities.

Your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has begun receiving Personal Information Forms (PIF) from interested ministers. These PIF's are essentially the resumes for prospective pastors, but are created in a common format to ensure that all necessary information is included. At their meeting on Monday, February 23, the PNC began reviewing PIF's to determine our interest level in a given candidate.

Thus far, we have only received PIF's directly from pastors. Another key step in the process will be the computer match. Through this process, PC USA matches our CIF with appropriate PIF's from pastors in their database. Once the computer match has been completed, we expect our list of prospects to grow many fold.

The process of reviewing PIF's and evaluating the top candidates will continue for the next several months. Through careful and prayerful appraisal of various candidates, your PNC believes we will ultimately be able to recommend the call of the right new pastor to shepherd our congregation for many years to come.

TPC contributed **\$212.71** to the **Souper Bowl of Caring** on Souper Bowl Sunday. 9,299 organizations around the country have called in their totals. \$3,277,735.00 has been raised for charity so far.

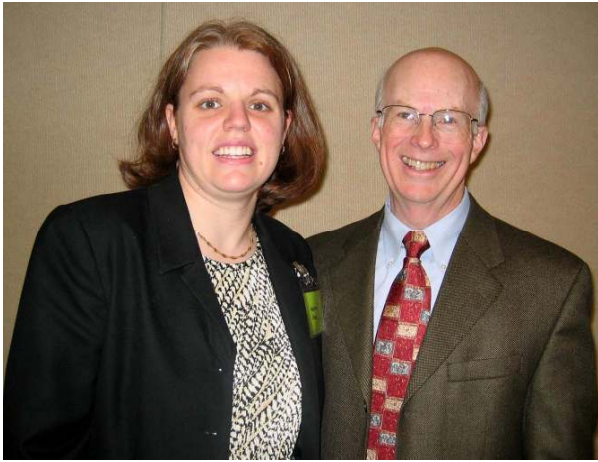

You say I need to be independent. You demand that I tie my shoes and zip my coat. You push and push never stopping to think how I feel.

I have been trying to zip my coat and tie my shoes since I was four years old. Everyone has tried to teach me. Everyone complains that I should have learned this before. No one understands. I would love to tie my shoes and zip my coat all by myself all the time. I would also love to talk with my voice, run, jump, and be a regular kid. My disability prevents me from doing the things I want to do. It makes my body move like Jell-O. I can't always get my body to move like I want it to. I get very frustrated yet you don't understand. You say I am not focused, not trying, not doing what I did yesterday. You don't understand that if I could do it I would. I hate being the one who needs help. I have learned that people value you less if you need help.

Everyone needs help with something. People just like to believe they are independent. So please think about the things you need help with like understanding homework, car repairs, programming the computer, tax forms, getting a ride somewhere, cleaning your gutters, being on time, finding things you lose, and many other things. You aren't as independent as you think.

Please give me the help that I need when I need it. It is hard to always feel bad because I can't do certain things. You need to see independence differently.

Independence can be very isolating. I want to be interdependent. I need you and you need me. There is strength in recognizing you need others. Be careful about thinking you are great because you are able to do things alone and how superior it makes you feel. Some day you will learn the hard lesson about independence.

### TREASURE SUNDAY

Excitement was in the air as Robin, April, Erik, David, Michael E & Michael R (and their families) joined TPC for worship last Sunday. Of course April's favorite part was getting to sit next to Ted Lambeth, her most favorite volunteer. Now that these Treasures, all Tualatin residents, have

experienced worship and TPC warmth they may be willing to come back to worship again. Thanks to the many volunteers who support the Treasure Night outreach program.

### *What is a Treasure?*

A "Treasure" is an individual with a developmental disability (Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Autism, Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, brain damage from an accident, etc.). Treasures come from a variety of ethnic and religious backgrounds, financial statuses, ages (12 and up), and living situations (i.e. group homes, private homes, or supported living arrangements). Most of our Treasures live in Tualatin, Sherwood, and Tigard.

### *What is a Treasure Night?*

A "Treasure Night" is a designated Tuesday of the month for each participating church when volunteers and Treasures get together to sing songs, play games, study a Bible lesson, pray, make crafts, and eat creative snacks. It is a great opportunity for Treasures to interact with others with similar disabilities while building strong friendships.

### *When and where are Treasure Nights?*

Currently Treasure Nights are operated by six churches in Washington County, utilizing over 300 volunteers to serve over 250 Treasures and their caregivers. Treasure Nights are held from 7-8:30 pm once a month on a Tuesday night at each hosting church: Tualatin Presbyterian, Hillsboro Presbyterian, Sunset Presbyterian, Calvary Chapel of Aloha, Beaverton Foursquare, and Westgate Baptist.

### *How can I help?*

\*Help identify Treasures: if you know of an individual with a developmental disability, please share information about Treasure Nights and the other services of QWO.

\*Help with our Treasure Night: as a volunteer you can help by providing snack or transportation; lead a prayer, craft, game or song; help with set-up and clean-up.
