



Dear friends,

Well another Lenten season is upon us. If you grew up in a liturgical tradition you might know Lent is the forty day season leading up to Easter marked by simplicity, even austerity depending on the church. To many this is a season of preparation and contemplation, making us ready for Easter. As a part of this preparation you might hear folks ask one another whether they are giving something up for Lent. One of my friends down in Austin was on their local public radio about a week ago talking about how he's going to try to give up TV for Lent...and how the thought of it is already making him nervous. Or you might hear some of our more creative cats buck this tradition a little bit and say rather than giving something up, they are preferring to take something up- and they are committing to doing something positive like volunteer at the food pantry or to daily prayer.

I think this business of giving things up and taking things on may, depending on the person, be just the ticket. I do. If you feel this will help you get ready for Easter, I say bring it on. But I have to confess (it's Lent, so it's OK to confess) that I'm personally growing more and more disenchanted with this tradition. As a pastor it seems to me more and more the case that the greatest burdens we seem to be carrying as people are not our imperfections- but our inability to accept and receive God's grace poured out for us *despite* our imperfections. That's kind of a tortured sentence, so let me repeat: it seems to me more and more the case that the greatest burdens we seem to be carrying as people are not our imperfections- but our inability to accept and receive God's grace that's poured out for us *despite* our imperfections.

Well, I'm not sure repetition really improved that, so I'll spell out what I mean a little more clearly. While I think it is great to keep spiritual disciplines and to volunteer, the way we talk about Lent sometimes makes it sound like preparation for Easter means making ourselves a little more perfect, as if the more perfect we are, the more lovable we become. And while this is indeed the Gospel according to St. American Idol, it really isn't the Gospel according to Jesus Christ. Or is it?

Whenever I start talking about grace, the belief that God loves us freely and not because we've earned it, people always start quoting the fifth chapter of Matthew at me quoting Jesus saying, "Be perfect, therefore, just as your Father in Heaven is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)

Now, while quoting Jesus is always a low blow in my opinion, I have to admit it isn't an easy verse, is it? Be perfect? As perfect as God?? (And at this point, I often like to get a really unintelligent looking expression on my face and say something thoughtful sounding like, 'Wuh?') And all of a sudden I begin to understand why this Lenten tradition of trying to tidy ourselves up a bit before Easter is so powerful for so many of us. As much as Protestants talk about grace, I think there's part of us that really doesn't believe it- a part of

us that thinks what we are taught by the world is more true: that the more perfect we are the more lovable we become.

But here's the thing. Here again the words we use conceal as much meaning as they reveal. In this case it isn't Greek that helps us out, but Latin. Christ does indeed invoke us to be 'perfect'. But what does this mean? Most of us feel like we have a pretty good handle on the meaning of 'perfect': it means to be flawless, to make no mistakes. And to be sure this is certainly how the word has come to be used. But it isn't how it started out. The word 'perfect' comes to us from the Latin words 'per' and 'facio', meaning most literally, 'to be thoroughly done, or completely done'. To be perfect in the most literal sense doesn't mean to be flawless or without mistake, it means to be whole. Those of you who remember being tortured in high school English may well remember learning about the perfect tense. The perfect tense doesn't refer to the best tense, or the tense without error- no, a verb in the perfect tense refers to action that was completed in the past. The action is done, it is finished, it is whole.

Now seeking wholeness is a completely different thing than seeking moral perfection. When we seek wholeness our task is to learn how to see ourselves more clearly, to see the parts of ourselves we like, and the parts we don't. And while seeking wholeness is no excuse to act out of our darker aspects, it is learning to accept these aspects as part of the people we have been made to be. Seeking wholeness is quite simply the process by which we experience in our hearts what our heads know to be true: that we, our whole selves, are made in the image of God.

"Be perfect as your Father in Heaven is perfect." Be perfect? Absolutely. Not in the sense that we can somehow avoid making a mistake or act like an idiot from time to time, but in the sense of knowing and trusting that all that we are, even our rougher edges, is known by God.

So this Lent you still may want to give something up or start some positive habit. This may be exactly what we need to do this time of year in order to remind ourselves of God's presence in our lives. But it won't make you any more perfect or any more lovable than you already are. And I know that may sound like bad news- but really, it's the best news of all. Because then we, like Paul, may know in our bones that "by grace we have been saved through faith, and this is not our own doing but a gift of God; not the result of works- so that none may boast." And in my book Easter is way more about grace than it is about not watching TV for a few weeks or riding ourselves of the evils of chocolate. But thankfully, that decision is up to you- not me. May you have Holiness this Lenten season, and more importantly, may you have wholeness.

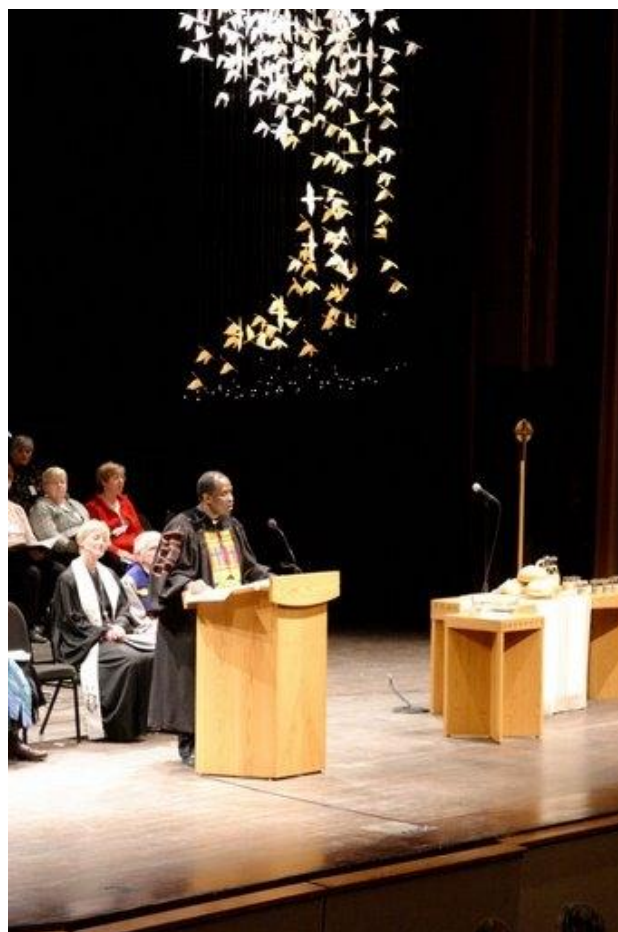
ART TEAM REQUESTS SEASONAL BRANCHES

What's This About Per Capita? HOW TUALATIN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FITS IN

Tualatin Presbyteriana Church and about 118 other Presbyterian churches and fellowships are members of the **Presbytery of the Cascades**, an organization that supports the activities of their member churches. We have a very basic connection with the Presbytery of the Cascades as it was the people at Presbytery who initiated this church. They hired The Rev. Thomas G. Nelson and they arranged for The Rev. Philip Martin to help us start Tualatin Presbyterian Church.

When Thom Nelson left, the people at Presbytery worked with us to find The Rev. Dick Wiggers who acted as our Interim Pastor while we searched for a new pastor, The Rev. Ken Evers-Hood. When we have questions and are in need of help, the people at Presbytery are there to offer assistance. They act as our safety net.

Eleven presbyteries, the Presbytery of the Cascades being one of them, combine to form the **Synod of the Pacific**. Synod has been good to us as well. They provided the loan that allowed us to build the original building and a second loan to enlarge the building. (We still owe them money.)

Sixteen Synods combine to form the General Assembly, a group that meets annually or biennially to work cooperatively on international peacemak-

ing, ecumenical relations, mission and issues of justice.

Tualatin Presbyterian Church benefits from our relationship with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). We, in kind, need to support the efforts of these groups. That's why we pay per capita. This year is it **\$22.55 for each communicant member**. The \$22.55 is distributed as follows:

Presbytery of the Cascades	\$11.23
Synod of the Pacific	\$5.17
General Assembly	\$6.15

How Much Has TPC Paid in Per Capita?

In January, 2009, TPC paid \$6,095.95 in per capita. Session does not include per capita in the annual TPC budget. For this reason, each member is asked to pay his/her own per capita expense. To date \$1,378.95 has been paid by TPC members; \$4,717.00 remains to be paid.

Who Pays Per Capita? Two examples follow.

1. How much per capita do Rob and Jennifer Ayers and their son and daughter pay?

They pay for two, Rob and Jennifer. Per capita is not owed on their two small children.

2. How much per capita does Meg Lewis-Price pay?

Meg pays for two, herself and her college-aged daughter who went through communicants class and affirmed her faith before the congregation. Meg does not pay per capita for her 13-year old son and daughter.

HELPING EACH OTHER

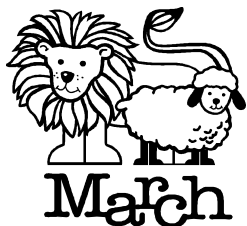
