JAN AND BUD BENDER

What a fun ride I had hearing stories of Jan and Bud Bender, a delightful and caring couple! The farm where Jan was raised in Hood River is 350 acres of apples and pears, cold storage, packing and shipping still owned and run by her family. They had their own beef cattle to keep three families' freezers full. The three sisters rode horses and participated in 4-H. Jan says "you can take the gal out of the country but you can't take the country out of the gal". She still likes to can fruit and make pickles. Bud would say he benefits from her love of baking pies!

Bud grew up in Salem where his dad was a teacher and his mom was a stay-at-home mom. The Benders met at Oregon State University where Jan pursued a Home Economics degree and Bud a Community Health degree. While at OSU Bud had the opportunity to sing with the Choralaires. They toured Europe with stops in England, Scotland, Denmark, Germany and a home stay on Fedje Island in Norway which was a highlight.

Bud started his career as a Nursing Home Administrator in South Dakota with the Evangelical Lutheran Good Samaritan Society. During those years in SD their beautiful daughter, Chelsea, was born. It was while on a countryside drive that young Chelsea exclaimed "Mommy, Mommy, look at the mountain" as they passed a pile of rocks, that they thought it might be time to move back to Oregon.

It was during a second opportunity with Good Samaritan in Dodge City, Kansas, that Jan decided that she wanted to pursue a career as a chiropractor. She found out that she could take prerequisites such as organic chemistry and biology for free at a community college in Dodge City! The Benders moved back to Oregon in 1991 and Jan eventually began her 4-year doctoral curriculum at Western States Chiropractic University. Jan credits Bud and Chelsea for her success. Jan feels strongly that physical pain has an emotional component. During her twenty years of working with patients in her downtown Portland office, she has treated the whole person and has ongoing, meaningful relationships with her patients. Her Office Manager has been with her for nineteen years. That says a lot! When asked how she would describe herself, she would like to be foremost an "Encourager".

Bud is a leukemia (AML) and stem cell transplant survivor. He feels blessed by God every day that he not only survived, but that his sister Merna shared her stem cells with him, he had/has the ongoing support and prayers from his TPC family and that his positive attitude stayed intact which helped him through his "Amazing Journey!" Currently he works as a Personal Worker for four men with developmental disabilities, helping them with every day tasks such as grocery shopping, errands, gardening, trips around the region via car and bus/max, hikes, serving heals to the homeless, folding bulletins...whatever the client wants to do. Never a dull moment, and what joy he experiences with his clients and friends.

Bud loves to putter around in the yard. Here at TPC he is a Stephen Minister, helps with Tuesday's Treasures and is a member of our choir. Jan has always been a cross-stitcher and seamstress. Now she is trying to teach herself to knit. She is a member of PEO and attends a book group. They both love to travel and play the piano! Their two grandchildren (Cassidy age 2 and Liam age 5) who live in East Portland are a special part of their lives. 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TPC - A BRIEF HISTORY - 35th anniversary of its chartering

In November 1981, the Presbytery of the Cascades called the Rev. Thomas G. Nelson to be the organizing pastor of the Tualatin-Wilsonville New Church Development.

The first worship service was held January 6, 1982 in the living room of Rick and Barb Crall.

Land (3.14 acres) was purchased in the spring of 1983 at Siletz Street and Boones Ferry Road for \$120,000.

The Presbytery formally chartered Tualatin Presbyterian Church as an organized congregation in February 1985. The Rev. Thomas G. Nelson continued as pastor. By 1986 the church had moved to the Historic Community Church at 10100 SW Boone's Ferry Road.

Church construction on the Siletz and Boone's Ferry Road property began in 1987.

The sanctuary was dedicated on March 6, 1988.

In 2002 a remodel of the sanctuary and narthex and an addition of the two floors housing the kitchen, church office, rest rooms and downstairs classrooms brought the building into its current configuration.

The Rev. Dr. Dick Wiggers was designated interim pastor to succeed The Rev. Thomas G. Nelson in 2002. The Rev. Dr. Ken Evers-Hood was called to serve as pastor in September 2004.

Today Tualatin Presbyterian Church has about 300 members and continues to grow.


