

# Easter Story Cookie Recipe To be made the night before Easter

You will need:

1 cup whole pecan or walnuts 1 tsp vinegar 3 egg whites pinch of salt

Bible

1-cup sugar zip lock bag (3) wooden spoon tape

Preheat oven to 300° F

Place nuts in the baggie and let the children beat them with a wooden spoon to break them into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested, He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. **John 19:1-3** 

Let each child smell the vinegar. Put 1 tsp vinegar into the mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross He was given vinegar to drink. **John 19: 28-30** 

Add egg whites to the vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. **John 10: 10-11** 

Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it and then brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. **Luke 23:27** 

So far the ingredients are not very appetizing. Add 1 cup sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. **Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16** 

Beat with a mixer on high speed until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. **Isaiah** 1:18 and John 3:1-3

Fold in the broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto a wax paper covered cookie sheet. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. **Matthew 27: 57-60** 

Put the cookie sheet into the oven, close the door and turn off the heat. Tape the oven door to seal it shut. Explain that Jesus' body was sealed into the dark, cold tomb. **Matthew 27: 65-66** 

GO TO BED! Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. **John 16: 20 & 22** 

On Easter morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie. Notice that cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! On the first Easter, Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. **Matthew 28: 1-9**

### **PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE**

Your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has been hard at work reading and evaluating more than 100 Personal Information Forms (PIF's) from prospective pastors. These PIF's are like resumes but are prepared in a uniform manner to ensure vital information is included on a consistent basis.

In addition to the standard information generally found on resumes (work history, education, references), a PIF contains written statements relating to areas from Theological Issues to comments on the characteristics of the "ideal" church to fit the candidate's interests, style and temperament. Each member of your PNC carefully compares statements to our congregation's definition of TPC as is found in our church mission study and reflected in our Church Information Form (CIF).

Having evaluated all the PIF's that have been submitted, your PNC has identified the top 20-30 matches. We are now having conversations with references listed by these candidates and will be narrowing the list to a manageable number for telephone interviews. At the same time, we are requesting sample sermon tapes from our top candidates so we can listen to their preaching styles.

The next steps of the process will include personal interviews and, later, attending worship services that are led by top candidates. This process may be lengthy, but it's also quite inspiring to read pastors' statements, to talk to their references and to hear their sermons. We all feel fortunate to become acquainted with so many wonderful people, who have been called to ministry.

With careful and prayerful consideration over the coming months, we expect to call a permanent pastor who will shepherd TPC for many years to come.

### What will our new pastor look like?

When you imagine our new pastor, whom do you see? Older? Younger? Male? Female? With kids? A single person? According to Christian Century, most churches seeking a new pastor want a married man with a family who will "help out" in the congregation – even today! Our Pastor Nominating Committee was warned early on that those churches who end up making poor choices for their new pastor do so by sticking to outdated, preconceived ideas about the "type" of person best for their congregations. Leaders across dominations also "tend to be exasperated" at search committees who say they want a pastor to "grow the church", but really only want someone to come in and learn the "ways of the old school" and carry them on.

The average seminary graduate in the last several years is in his or her 40s. In one major denomination (United Methodist), one-third of pastors are single (never married or divorced) and half of seminarians are female. A typical recent graduate of the Presbyterian seminary in San Francisco is now an Associate Pastor at First Presbyterian in Portland. She is a woman in her late 40s, married to a local attorney, who went to seminary a few years ago with her 8-year-old daughter in tow. Her "experience" includes graduating from college in the 70s, raising a family and spending her adult life as an active lay leader in a Presbyterian church.

Good pastors are available in all colors, all ages and in either sex. They have life experiences, which have broadened their worldview and deepened their understanding of people. They adeptly plan for family time and for personal space, sharing the belief with their congregations that personal growth and study makes them better at what they do. Following Jesus' example of calling us each by name, your PNC is searching for the person or persons who by God's grace will be the pastor meant for TPC.

The butterfly is a symbol of new life and is often associated with Easter. Make your own butterfly.


You will need:


