A MESSAGE from Pastor Ken

Greetings all,

What a spring! I realize Oregonians might be used to the explosion of cherry blossoms and riot of bulbs all erupting from the ground, but this is all extraordinary for me. Before moving here I actually wondered whether I would even notice winter much because of all the color from the evergreens. I realize now how profoundly the land changes around here from what Shakespear might have called the bare, ruined choirs of oaks and maples surrounding us to a world more akin to Whitman's live oak with it's joyous leaves of dark green and rude, lusty look that reminded him of himself. What a time of transformation. What a time for Easter.

Ever wonder how Easter came by it's name? Well, interestingly enough the term 'Easter' comes from the Tuetonic (German) goddess of spring, Eostre, which is another name for the Middle Eastern deity, Astarte. Eostre is associated with rabbits, eggs, and another fertility symbols- hence the Easter bunny we know and love. And mainly, Eostre is connected with the change from winter to spring and from death to life. Now, I know hearing about Eostre can be a little disconcerting, but I actually find it deeply helpful. The medieval church made the connection between Christ's transformation and with the change we see in the world around us, and it invites us to see Easter as a time for personal change and growth as well. Now is the time to think about change. Now, is the time to clean out our closets, clean out our lives, to allow new things to birth in our souls, and let old parts die- now is the time for change.

For those of us contemplating change this season, let me relate some fantastic words I remember from a colleague of mine giving a lecture regarding negotiating change. My friend happened to be a rock climber for much of his earlier life, and shared a few climbing fundamentals that translate well into life lessons for the rest of us.

First off, an experienced climber never starts out a climb unless she knows she has the strength and the endurance to finish safely. Sometimes this means a climber will train for months simply to scale a difficult and novel mountain face. Inexperienced climbers on the other hand, he noted, are famous for

starting up a climb quickly, only to find themselves dangerously weak and in pain when they reach closer and closer to the top. Their lack of preparation puts themselves and others at risk- a risk that patience could prevent.

Second, an experienced climber only moves one limb at a time when searching for a new foothold. Change takes place- but it takes place slowly and surely. At every point on the journey upward, at least three points will be grounded, while only one is allowed free to explore the rock face for a hold. When you watch new climbers, one of the first things you notice is how they try to climb like they walk- with both their hands and their legs moving at the same time. Because a two point base does not provide the stability necessary for sustainable progress- young climbers may make progress faster at first, but they also tend to fall more as well. Apparently, in rock climbing as in turtle racing, slow and steady wins the race. ©

Finally, as important as strength training is, as important as good technique is, no climber in the world will succeed for long unless they have good gear and a support team they can trust. Clean and dry ropes, and an alert and caring support team all keep each other safe- it takes more than one person to make progress over a long period of time. It takes a team.

So, as I think about change this Easter seasonwhether we are discerning we need to let something new take root in our souls, or whether we need to allow some ancient anger and bitterness go somehow; I think my friend's wisdom here is helpful. When negotiating change, we do need to make sure our minds and bodies are strong enough to carry the change through- or we might consider waiting until a time we are stronger. When negotiating change, we should focus on one, small, aspect of our soul at a time- too many moving parts at the same time can only be distracting. And, and maybe this is most important- we should make sure when we're negotiating change that we are surrounded by folks who will care about us and be there to keep us from falling too far.

I wish you all strength for the journey this month.

One other note this month: I know you've heard me talk about the Taco Bell boycott over the years and last month I talked about how the people of the church can affect change through their denominations and religious organizations. This last month, the boycott ended. Yum! Corporation, who owns Taco Bell, negotiated a deal with the Immokalee workers in Florida who started the campaign. Last week instead of a rally at Yum! Headquarters in protest, there was a celebration of the new contract at 100 Witherspoon, the national offices of the PC (USA). I may get frustrated with the church because of how slow some things happen (just 50 years ago women were ordained by the PCUSA), but things are happening (women are serving in pulpits around the country). We have opportunities, as people of faith, to share our concerns with the wider church and see things change. We may not be able to turn water into wine or raise Lazarus from the dead like Jesus did, but we are able to do amazing things in our lives. Like raise our children in loving homes, work for the rights of all people and be Christian in our daily lives at work, play and in the home. Nobody said being Christian was easy, but at times like Easter we can celebrate our hope in Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Thanks for being a reminder of that hope in my life.

<u>Summer Mission Trip 2 Mexico</u> June 17th-27th

We will be partnering with Westminster Presbyterian Church in Medford, Oregon for our 2005 Mission Trip. Three additional Presbyterian churches and one Lutheran church will also be traveling with us as we work with AMOR Ministries in Tijuana, Mexico. I encourage you to visit <u>www.amor.org</u> for additional information on their organization.

The AMOR mission trip is a short-term mission trip based on serving the local church in Mexico. while creating cross-cultural understanding through direct exposure to the Mexican culture. We do not want our group to just build a house in a developing nation. We want our students to understand the conditions of poverty through immersion. We will build an 11'x22', two room home with a slab floor, stucco-finished exterior, two windows, and a door. The house is a simple design, built according to the standards of the community so that a group without skilled labor or power tools an still complete the project. Our project may also include a double house for larger families, schools, churches and medical clinics, but these are dependent upon the needs of the community and the total number of mission trip participants in our group. We expect over 100 participants to travel with us this summer.
