



A Message from Pastor Ken

Play a game with me for a moment. Let's say that you and I agree to meet in Portland tomorrow, only we forgot to talk about where or when we want to meet, and neither one of us is able to use our cell phone. So now let's say it's tomorrow and you wake up in the morning, and you head downtown. Where do you decide to go- and when do you want to be there? Seriously, pick a place and a time in your head. Do it now.

Believe it or not this is an actual game played hundreds of times all organized by a Nobel prize winning economist Thomas Schelling. Schelling chose the somewhat larger playground of New York, but he would send groups of people into the city with no ability to communicate and the sole goal of meeting up. And believe it or not, even in a vast city like New York which offers a nearly inexhaustible number of meeting locations and times- over and over again the players stumbled onto what became known as "Schelling points," or mutual agreements that for some reason just seem obvious to us.

In Schelling's New York version of the game nearly every participant picked the time of high noon. And then they tended to divide into thirds with a third of them meeting in Grand Central Station, a third meeting at the Empire State Building (thank you *Sleepless in Seattle*), and a third of them meeting in Times Square. And amazingly, with no ability to communicate at all, every time Schelling ran the game at least some of the players were successful.

These Schelling points, or unspoken meeting places, are crucial to a culture's ability to function. If you are speeding down a one lane road in Eastern Oregon, for example, and a big truck is headed your way, you don't have the ability to communicate with the truck driver about which way to swerve- you just have to decide. Fortunately, assuming the truck driver didn't just return from his English vacation, you will both swerve to the right without even thinking about it.

Schelling points also offer people within a given society a feeling of connection and relationship. Nearly anyone who lived through the experience can tell you exactly where they were and what they were doing when they learned that John F. Kennedy had been assassinated or when they saw or heard the news about the twin towers in New York City. These terri-

ble events now function as Schelling points for entire generations- a gathering place where otherwise very different people can find common ground.

One of the main functions of the church today is that it offers Schelling points to an increasingly disconnected people, bullied by a polarized political environment, bewildered by technology that is changing at a dizzying rate of speed, and fragmented with social media that gives us the ability to create insulating bubbles around ourselves where we tend to hear ideas and opinions in keeping with our own.

The seasons of the church offer particularly powerful Schelling points. A mom I know from day care who doesn't attend church at all but is interested asked me two weeks ago what I was giving up for Lent. I looked at her quizzically, and she said with embarrassment: "You give things up at Lent, right? I mean I don't know. Oh, I shouldn't have said anything." And I smiled saying, "Oh no, you're totally right. That's exactly what a lot of people do during this time." And it led to a really interesting conversation- all because this person who never participated in Lent in her entire life at least knew what it was about. It offered us common ground. A meeting place.

This Easter we will see the same thing. We will see a lot of faces you don't recognize, or some you haven't seen for a long time. And the temptation is so strong for good church people who show up often to feel smug or even annoyed at finding someone sitting in what Adele Pelletier has called our "assigned seats." And when you feel that way, just remember whose house it actually is- neither mine, yours, or theirs. The house is the Lord's. And in our increasingly tribalized culture where we're able to communicate with one another less and less- I'm giving thanks for one of the few meeting places we have left.

And if, for whatever reason you aren't able to make it to Easter, then I'll be happy to meet you at noon at Pioneer Square. That is where you were going to go to meet me, wasn't it? See you there. ☺

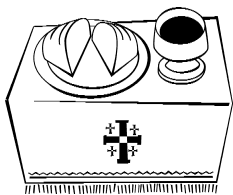


A Local Opportunity to Bring Joy

The groups usually meet in homes, but they have also met in restaurant, parks and at the church. The dinners are simple: the host supplies the main course and the other group members supply side dishes, dessert and drinks. Each group decides the times that work best for all to gather. After four months, the computer software generates new groups.

TPC Memorial Garden

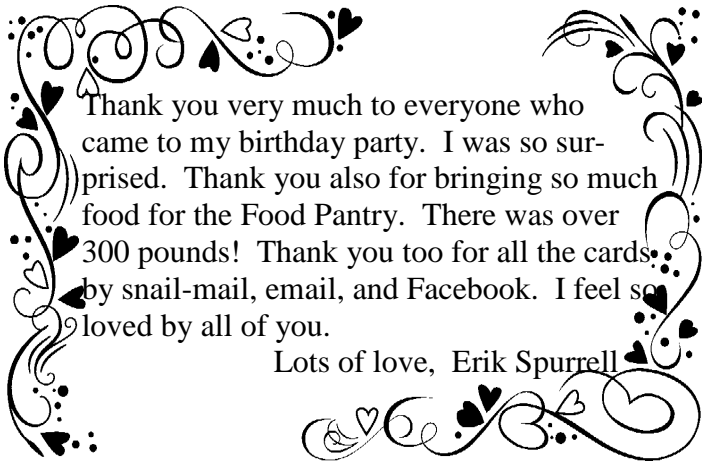
On the east side of the church grounds is our Memorial Garden. It was established in 1987 when the church was first built and has been gradually growing larger in size since then. There are two types of markers in the garden. The granite tiles in the flat boxes are specifically for the names of church members, adherents and their immediate family members and are located in the upper tier of the garden.

There are river rocks scattered in the “River of Life” area of the lower garden and these may be requested by active members of the church in memory of relatives and loved ones who are not members of this church. The river rocks have first names only engraved on them while the granite tiles have the member’s name and the year of their birth and death. The cost of a tile is \$200 and a rock is \$20.

With Easter and spring approaching, we hope you will take a moment to stroll through the garden, reflect on names listed there and enjoy our Memorial Garden. The three newest granite tiles commemorate deaths of our members Jaci Smith, Marian Larson, and Trudy Voogd. Trudy was a member several years ago who was very active in the choir and moved to California just as we were starting the garden; she prepaid for her stone as this church was very dear to her heart.

You may prepay for a tile for yourself, if you wish, as Trudy did, and your request will be honored. Request slips are in the church office.
