


TANZANIA 2017 - By Dr. Craig Bowen

We have traveled to Tanzania three times in as many years to provide medical eye care. Though there are similarities, each venture in this country has been unique. The landscape is as broad and beautiful as are its people. Our clinic sites in the northeastern portion of the country provided opportunities for us to not only dispense needed care but to experience humanity across culture and language hurdles. We served two distinct populations: one younger and healthier with access to at least some human services and the other older, in poorer health, located far into the bush with little to no care available. The aid we provided ranged from examinations, to diagnosing and treating disease and infection, to removing foreign bodies from the eyes. We dispensed non-prescription sunglasses, prescription eyewear, eye drops for dryness and irritation, as well as medicines.

A four year old patient of ours presented with an eye turned inward toward her nose. We diagnosed her with accommodative esotropia, related to uncorrected farsightedness. With the glasses we dispensed, her eye turned straight with her other eye. Continuing to wear her glasses will allow near full function of that eye over time.

Last year we had the opportunity to help a blind lady in great pain, all four of her lids had rolled inward raking her comea with every, even slight movement of her eyes. We spent near an hour epilating (pulling) all of her lashes, By the end she was out of pain and we hoped that by removing the stimulus her lids would relax and remain in proper position. We had the fortune to see her in clinic this year, and though still blind, our treatment was successful! She had returned to thank us for the treatment she received last year.





These are just two stories of days worth of tales. We could not have had the impact we did without the assistance of innumerable individuals and organizations. We were able to purchase diagnostic equipment, received donations of glasses and sunglasses, accepted money which will provide cataract surgeries, along with the well wishes of many. Totaling the numbers of all that we dispensed divided by the patients we saw gives us what we call 'Percentage of Help', it's 144%! We cannot say thank you enough to those who made a difference by helping us in so many ways but we'll start with this one: 'thank you'! In Swahili: 'asante sana'!

NEW ADULT EDGE STARTS APRIL 15

Starting Sunday morning, April 15, Pastor Ken will lead a six-week study of Adam Hamilton's DVD series, *Christianity and World Religions:* Wrestling With Questions People Ask. Similar to the Fall 2017 DVD class on *Christianity's Family Tree*, these sessions require no advance preparation. Each week we will watch a short video presentation, followed by class discussion facilitated by Pastor Ken.

The author of the series, Adam Hamilton, examines Christianity and four major world religions: Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, and Judaism. Hamilton wrestles (and we will, too) with tough questions: Why are there so many different religions? How should Christians view other religions? How is God at work in other religions? What is the fate of those who earnestly pursue God through other religions?

Adult Edge is TPC's version of Sunday morning adult education with an innovative vibe. The class is discussion-focused and question-friendly—a safe and thoughtful space to explore contemporary theology, spiritual practices, and social issues. Sometimes taught by Pastor Ken and sometimes facilitated by class volunteers, Adult Edge uses a variety of learning techniques: books, DVDs, and lecture—but the real richness comes through shared conversation. The class meets downstairs in the Adult Education Room at 8:30 AM. Childcare is available: the nursery opens at 8:30 AM for younger children, and there will be supervision for older kids.

Thus, there is a staggering amount of pathology and blindness, much of which could be lessened by wearing non-prescription sunglasses. If you have sunglasses that you no longer use, TPC has a donation box in the hallway near the restrooms. Eye ware of any kind is also collected.

Give us strength, courage and wisdom, empathy, compassion and connection. Help us to be brave, patient and loving. It is in your name we pray and all the kids say Amen.



SARAH BECK'S CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

Sarah started with four empty containers. She poured some vinegar into each container. The vinegar represented Jesus's teaching.

Powdered milk was added to the first container. It did not mix well with the vinegar. Some people curdle like this powdered milk. They complain about how hard it is to follow God and they never grow.

Baking soda was added to the second container. It resulted in fizzing. Some Christians have lots of fizz when they first hear Jesus's words, but there is very little follow-through.

Oil was added to the third container. The two liquids did not mix. Some people never learn how to mix Jesus's words into their lives.

Water was added to the fourth container. What happened? The water became part of the vinegar. In the same way, we can be Christians who become so much like Jesus that people see him when they look at us.

"This is what it means to live a Christ-like life. And when I'm asked, where do you see God? I don't have to look farther than two feet in front of me, because I see him in each of you."
