

We must raise a minimum of \$40,000 before construction begins. Everyone who has bought the "first house" or "new car" knows how tough it can be to make a substantial commitment for something you really want. To raise \$40,000 in two years will require an average commitment of \$1 a day from every adult member of our congregation. Is a new church worth a dollar a day to us? 
- April 19 , 7:30 PM Maundy Thursday Family Worship at the Prindiville Home. Lord's Supper will be celebrated in a simply and very special service.

Our dollars to One Great Hour of Sharing help carry out emergency relief and work in areas of hunger and self-development here at home and in more than 70 countries.
