Dear friends,

Are you feeling experimental? I hope so.

One of the perennial challenges all churches face is how to communicate information well. Except for high days like Easter and Christmas, we've been using worship as a space to make announcements ever since I've been here. There is a good reason for this. More of us gather together at worship than any other time. There are some disadvantages, however. One of the primary challenges of announcements is we never quite know how many we'll have. On mornings when a bunch of folks jump up it can have a significant impact on our time together.



Starting in May I'd like to try something. I'd like us to try placing the announcements at a new time. During the welcome I will be more than happy to lift up and amplify an announcement in the bulletin or an upcoming event on your behalf. I'd love it if you emailed me about this before the week, but I'll probably be nice enough to talk to you on Sunday morning. Probably. ☺ Then, **after the postlude**, we will leave the standing mic on and whoever would like to address the body can line up to do so.

There are some nice things about this. First, you don't have to worry about talking with me about making an announcement. Just jump up there and let her rip. Second, you can be as long as you like. People might not stick around, but that's actually an advantage. The people who stick around will be truly interested. The single greatest advantage is really for us as a community. Putting announcements after the postlude stewards our time together. And these days few things are more valuable than our time.

We will have a survey linked to our website, and I invite you to give us feedback using that survey. I fully acknowledge there might be disadvantages we don't know about yet. But that's why we try things. If it doesn't work, we can always go back to "how it's always been done." But if it does work, we'll improve how we spend our time together on Sunday mornings.

**Mike and Mary Shiffer
A Lifetime of Giving**

Mike and Mary are unique individuals. Both native Oregonians, they grew up in Portland. Mary remembers where Mike sat when they met in their eighth grade math class. They were friends at Marshall High School, but it wasn't until Mike invited Mary to their senior prom, Royal Splendor, that things really became official. They were a couple.

After high school graduation, it was time to earn some college degrees. Mary left the state to attend The College of St. Teresa in Winona, Minnesota. The college did not measure up to Mary's expectations so after one semester, she returned to Portland and enrolled at Portland State University where she later earned her bachelor's degree in elementary education. Mike, too, was college bound and he studied at Lewis and Clark earning a degree in mathematics. He was one of five math students in his class and actually considered graduating with a double major, in English Literature.

In 1967, Mike and Mary were married at St. John the Apostle Catholic Church in Oregon City. They honeymooned in San Francisco and shared their devotion for a total of 45 days before Mike joined the Army. Mike was off to Vietnam where he used his mathematical skills in Artillery Fire Direction; he helped sight in rounds during combat. Mike was good at it, so good that he had a perfect score during his program testing and was transferred to a training center on the central Vietnam coast. Mike was later transferred to Fort Sill in Oklahoma as an instructor. That was a blessing.

From there it is a blur with stops in Portland and Tacoma at Fort Lewis. Mary was teaching and at one point selling Avon. Larisa and Matthew were born and in 1976 the family returned to Portland.

You would think they would slow down, but that is not their style. Mike started a 22-year career in the financial industry working for Computer Service Bureau in commercial loans where he worked with computer hardware and software. Mary was busy teaching and then went back to PSU to earn her Master's Degree in speech pathology. She worked in different capacities throughout the region focusing her skill sets on assessment and diagnosis. She was well suited to help children with speech, autism and learning disabilities. Both Mike and Mary retired in 2009.

Time to relax? No. Mike and Mary had come across TPC in 1991 and true to their nature, threw themselves into studying, rejoicing, laughing and helping with the duties of the church. Thom Nelson was the pastor and Mike was part of the Pastor Nominating Committee that brought us the Evers-Hoods. Additionally Mike served as the Treasurer during the building expansion, has served as the Administration and Mission Elder and has also served as a Deacon. Mary has been equally active in her roles as Clerk of Session for Pastor Thom, Dick Wiggers and Ken Evers-Hood. She has also served as worship elder and recently as the Art Director bringing beautiful art to the sanctuary. Along the way they have both sung in the choir, provided support to Vacation Bible School and also Tuesday's Treasures. I'm certain they have also provided unnoticed support to others when they needed it most.

They will both be unhappy with me for sharing all of this, but it is important to note that it doesn't stop here. Forget Mike's recent heart valve replacement or Mary's broken foot and the tendonitis in her left forearm. I can't fathom that Mary contracted polio at the age of eight. These two simply refuse to stop.

Mike is a founding member of the School House Pantry which serves between 600 and 700 families each month and is also an Advisor Representative on the Oregon Food Bank Board of Directors. Mike is proud that TPC contributes more volunteers to the food bank than any other faith based group in the area.

Mike and Mary also ran a Boy Scout Program at the Coffee Creek Correctional facility matching

boys with their mothers who were learning parenting skills and how to build families. They ran that program from 2006-2013.

Mary is still active at the prison with the Coffee Creek quilters where she works with women in minimum security to teach them how to make this treasured art form while also learning math and social skills. She often has up to 10 women per class and shares her unique skills to help them overcome any learning disabilities. Mary also has written a novel, *Out of Lonely Places*. It's available at Amazon.com and be sure to ask her about the title.

I'm also happy to report that Mike and Mary *do relax*. They have traveled to Europe, taken four trips to Fiji, shared many trips to Ashland for the Shakespearean Theater, attended many local professional and high school theaters in the area, cheered the Portland Winterhawks whenever possible and are celebrating 46 years of marriage. Did I mention their seven grandchildren?

Yes, theirs is a Lifetime of Giving.

Join Rev. Aric Clark for a three-week conversation about the nature of prayer and discipleship which will challenge common assumptions and encourage an experimental, active approach to Christian living.

May 10 - The Psychology of Ritual: What is happening in our sub-conscious when we pray? Who are we becoming?

May 17 - Countering Our Intuition: How to Praise, Love, and Beg with integrity.

May 24 - Experimental Faith: How to become a Christian practitioner

The material for this course will draw from the book which Aric co-authored *Never Pray Again: Lift Your Head, Unfold Your Hands, and Get to Work*.
