Celebrate life events in the safest way this summer

Summer is on the way and some of you may be planning to marry, or celebrate an anniversary, graduation, or other significant event. Celebrating life events in person is something many of us have missed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

With vaccination as a tool for protection, you may be able to start thinking about resuming these celebrations. Once Oregon meets the statewide vaccination target of 70%, many restrictions will be lifted, but hosting the safest event will still require precautions.

Here’s what to keep in mind when planning a summer celebration:

- Outdoor events are generally much safer than indoor events.
- Wearing face coverings slows the spread of COVID-19.
- Limit capacity to allow for spacing between guests.
- Vaccination reduces the spread of COVID-19 and prevents severe illness and hospitalization in most people.

You’ll also need to follow Oregon Health Authority guidance for your event:

Outdoors in public venues like a garden, follow [“Outdoor Entertainment Establishments”](#).

Indoor in public spaces, follow [“Indoor Entertainment Establishments”](#).

In a religious institution such as a temple, mosque, synagogue or church, follow [the guidance](#) for Faith institutions.

Family Promise Giving Day was a huge success raising nearly \$13,000! With our matching grant of \$10,000 from Family Promise national this will give us \$23,000 to put toward our PREVENTION program. THANK YOU for supporting FPTV and our efforts to help keep people in their homes. We couldn't do this without your help.

Below is a story about one family that reflects how Family Promise weekly food delivery is appreciated. Andrea and her 2 young children entered shelter after the death of a relative and subsequent loss of housing. Exhausted, full of grief, and fear, Andrea recounted the years she has experienced cyclical homelessness. Many hardships and challenges throughout the last several years disrupted Andrea's progress towards housing stability for herself and her children. Weekly, our case manager, Leah, would meet with Andrea to work through the steps towards rehousing by resolving barriers and to deliver the weekly food support provided by our volunteers. Andrea would surprise the team with the amount of work she would accomplish in one day. Before we knew it her barriers were addressed and it was time to start the apartment hunt. It was as if nothing was going to stand in her way! One day, Andrea was working with Leah over the phone. Her children could be heard in the background asking 'Mom, who's on the phone, who are you talking with?' in response, Andrea shared "it's the fishy lady." Andrea explained to Leah that the kids excitedly look forward to the weekly food delivery because they always receive a box of goldfish.

LOG COLLEGE PROJECT

Tualatin Presbyterian Church was selected by Princeton Theological Seminary to receive a \$15,000 innovation grant as part of the Log College Project. The Log College Project is a grant for building new ministries that take theology and young people seriously; our design team offered our young people mini-grants. The kids worked from their homes on individual ministries focused on social justice and community needs. These projects helped us enable our young people to experience Christianity in a way that encourages empowerment and resilience during these unprecedented times. The following are short descriptions of the nine individual ministries funded by the Log College Project.



Rachel Maxwell chose to support a black, woman-owned business in Los Angeles, California called, Shon Simon, Co, that manufactures COVID-19 masks and sells them in bulk. She emailed several homeless shelters, health care providers, and resource centers that support underserved families in our local community and offered to donate masks as her Log College project. Six hundred masks were shipped to her house. Rachel divided up the masks and delivered them to the Good Neighbor Center, Love, Inc. and the Virginia Garcia Memorial Health Center. The Virginia Garcia Memorial Health Center sent Rachel a thank you letter for all her support. Rachel continues to follow Shone Simon on Instagram.



Anya Ramos worked with author, public speaker, actress, screenwriter, and former model who left acting and modeling after a long battle with anorexia and bulimia, among other things, Reema Zaman <https://www.reemazaman.com> . Anya met with Reema in January 2021 via Zoom and decided to hire Reema to present her story and co-facilitate an open virtual dialog about anorexia, bulimia and how to offer emotional, social and spiritual support to friends and family members going through this experience. The presentation took place on Sunday, April 18th; it was open to the entire church community. Anya paid Reema \$1,400.00 for her time. She also purchased copies of Reema's memoir, I Am Yours for approximately \$100.00, which Reema signed for the kids who participated in the dialog.



Monica Gibson emailed several homeless shelters in Portland and inquired about their need for art supplies. Several shelters responded with a list of what they could use. Monica chose four small businesses in Portland from which to purchase the art supplies. They are as follows: Scrap, Ecrú Modern Stationer, Collage, and Wallace Books in Sellwood. She made lists of items for purchase, bought, organized and made arrangements to deliver the art supplies to all the homeless shelters on Saturday, May 15th. LeAnn Dolan, owner of ECRU Modern Stationer, sent Monica a heartfelt thank you email for supporting her business. Wallace Books continues to donate adult coloring books to Monica's ministry and Transition Project featured Monica in one of their Instagram posts.



Jackson Allee chose to create a "lawyer trust account" at Marandas Sinlapasai Garcia, LLC to assist individuals seeking immigration legal services. Attorney John Marandas reduced fee consultations (from \$200 to \$150) as well as other legal fees or expenses such as DACA filing fees. Jackson met with John Marandas at his office in Lake Oswego on Friday, April 2nd. John wanted to thank him in-person for supporting immigrants and refugees. Jackson has input regarding how the funds are spent.



Ryleigh Christopherson-Eng commissioned George Fox art student, Nicole Williford, to create a piece of artwork about the importance of Black Lives Matter and climate change. She created a moodboard of images that illustrated her passion for social justice. Art is something that connects with all kinds of people when they are at a loss for words. Nicole made the art piece out of recycled materials. She completed her work of art on May 10th. Ryleigh donated the piece to Princeton Theological Seminary.



Ella Evers-Hood used her culinary gifts and talents to create and prepare a four-course meal for 30+ people living at a homeless shelter during the COVID-19 pandemic. She went through cookbooks looking for the perfect dinner, sides, drinks and dessert recipes. Ella went shopping for ingredients on Wednesday and purchased all new containers, jars, kitchen utensils and reusable shopping bags to make and store her meals; she spent about \$500. On Saturday, May 8th (Ella's birthday weekend) she cooked all day and delivered her no-contact meals to the shelter in the evening. In addition, she decided to give the remainder of her Log College budget to the shelter. It's enough to feed 2 children for a month (2 x \$200.00), provide a meal for a family of 4 (4 x \$25.00), and pay the first month's subsidized rent for a family in the Home Stabilizing Program (\$500.00).



Lauren Ayers volunteers at the Tualatin Valley Family Promise, a non-profit organization that is dedicated to serving families with children who are homeless. As the Family Promise program assists families with finding new homes, the program is unable to offer furnished move-in ready apartments. Community Warehouse partners with Family Promise. They are a local furniture bank that collects donated home goods and works with social service agencies to give away items to people who need them. Families are able to go into the warehouse and "shop" for the items they need to fully furnish their new homes for \$400.00. Community Warehouse will also deliver furniture, and set up beds for kids. Lauren paid for four families to begin their new lives with fully furnished apartments they can call home.

Emma Swanson is making and selling bracelets. She is selling them for \$2.00 apiece for charity. She wants to help kids in her community who are homeless and who need books, food, and toys. She said, "I'm going to cuddle with my Log College money at night and then give it away." Emma made \$500 and chose to donate it to Family Promise.

Special thank you to the Log College Design Team and Sarah Beck, the Director of Family Ministries, who worked with the youth during the life of this three-year grant. It took a lot of work, imagination and dedication. Well done!!!

REFLECTIONS

The first Cedar Waxwing I recall seeing appeared in the cherry tree, right on the property line in our Sherwood backyard. I was gobsmacked. Back then I could not have told you the difference between a Sparrow or Finch, an Anna's or a Rufous. I just knew it was, in my opinion, a medium size bird with some fawn, pale yellow and black colorings with bright red tips on the wings. After they flew I scanned the yard for hours hoping to catch one more glimpse. I remember searching the computer for quite some time trying to identify exactly what that magical creation was called.



Fast forward to now, so many years past that initial sighting, I still get absolutely giddy when I spot the Waxwings, or a species I've yet to meet. A few weeks back after returning from our new birding haunt, I looked out at the feeders and foraging on the ground was such a friend. It was small and looked much like many sparrows that frequent this area. There was one difference that my brain immediately honed in on; it had a rufous-colored head. "Ahhh," I said to myself, "That is a Chipping Sparrow." I grabbed my camera and ever so slowly opened the door hoping to get a picture. That little guy made it quite easy and I had the privilege of taking his portrait several times over a three-day period.

Much like anything in life, we continue to learn about the things we love. We study, research, listen, try and fail, all in an effort to hone a skill or master a passion. It is humbling to have someone ask me about a bird. I am still a rank amateur in my birding community, but I delight in knowing my passion has perhaps ignited an interest in birds and birding to those around me.

One day I told Dave I believe people at TPC may think birding is all I know. That is probably correct. What you may not know is I am passionate about poetry and gardening, baking and politics. Those things might be revealed if we spend some time together and a mutual trust is established. Like the Hummingbirds and Waxwings did for me, my wish is for each of us to find at least one thing that makes us radiate with happiness when it is spoken about. It is a great jumping off point and icebreaker to perhaps even more life-enhancing moments and intimate conversations.
