A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Dear friends,

When I was a kid the pastor of our church would, in an attempt to keep our attention, ask us to engage the text being preached by circling and underlining various words. He didn't do this all the time, but often enough that you'd better be prepared with a writing utensil of some kind or another. And, as pastors from time immemorial have always concluded that a congregation's failure to laugh at their joke must be due to lack of repetition rather than something lacking in the joke itself, he would repeat the same tired line: "Baptists brings Bibles to church; Presbyterians bring pencils."

Baptists bring Bibles and Presbyterians bring pencils. He was implying that Baptists just read the words of Scripture, but Presbyterians actually thought about them. Now, this is stereotype to be sure- one that in Texas not everyone found to be all that funny. But now a pastor myself, I've come to believe there really may be something to this line- only not the way he meant. I think I'm stating the obvious when I say that in general Presbyterians know what they DON'T believe about the Bible, better than what they do believe. And I'm also bettin' that most of us could probably do a better job listing twelve commercial slogans than if we had to list the twelve tribes of Israel. If Presbyterians bring pencils rather than Bibles to church- I'm not sure if it's because we are just more thoughtful about the text...I think it's that we just aren't that comfortable with it.

I think there are a lot of reasons for this. We definitely don't want to be seen as Bible thumping nut jobs quoting chapter and verse at every little peccadillo. Nor do we want to appear foolish and talk too easily about something we know has a complicated and long history.

But. But, when we cede the Bible only to the crazy sandwich-board wearing guys downtown, when we cede the Bible only to the "experts" who have taken a few classes that should, at the most, give them just enough background to know how much they *don't* know about the riches of Holy Scripture, we give away the most powerful guide to faith and life we have.

Yes, to abuse Scripture, to use it as a weapon is a terrible thing. But to never crack it open at all, to give the Bible away- I wonder if this isn't worse. For to do this is to turn our back on the only family weird enough who could ever possibly know us at our most beautiful and our most broken. For this is what Scripture is- a collection of family stories about our grandfathers and grandmothers who wrestled with the same questions we do, made the same mistakes we continue to make, and encountered God at every step along the way.

So where do we start? Do I recommend that you all just crack open your Bible somewhere and start plowing through genealogies when, let's face it, most of us are more familiar with John, Paul, and Ringo than Matthew, Mark, and Luke? Of course not. For most of us that's just a recipe for failure. Am I just recommending you figure out a way to cram more into your schedules and come to some study on Sunday morning or week night? Hey, for some of you that will work- but for many of us "one more thing" is just the last thing we need.

So here's what I propose. Starting this fall we're going to walk through the Bible as a whole community in a project called Access. (Nicole came up with the name- go Nicole!)

Here's the plan:

- 1) Nicole and I have been working like crazy this summer (and I'm not just talking about the amount of work when I use the word 'crazy' here) to create 20 minute videos introducing every single book of the Bible. I've posted these videos on You Tube at http://www.youtube.com/user/evershoodtpc and you will be able to find a link at our website as well. These videos introduce these books and focus in on THREE stories or texts we think are important to know. So, if you don't have time to read the whole book, please try and at least read the three texts we've picked out.
- 2) I've created outlines with basic notes for every book, and collections of these outlines will be available for anyone and everyone in the Narthex and online. These outlines will also include the three stories on them, and with the outline, it will help you get a sense for their context.
- Every week (with the exception of Advent and Holy Week) I will be preaching through the Bible in order, working from, as much as possible, the three selected stories.
- 4) For more depth I will be leading the adult education hour on Sunday mornings before worship from 9:15 to 10 AM. Every question will be welcome. Every level of Biblical or theological knowledge is welcome.

Personally, I'm so excited about this project. Some of you know I've been working on this for over a year now, and I believe that if you participate, it will deliver on the promise the name implies: you will have greater access into the vast world of Holy Scripture, you will have greater access to a sense of God's presence in your everyday life, and by doing this together, we all will have greater access into how each of us bears God in our own way.

You know, I think my pastor was on to something when he said that Baptists bring Bibles and Presbyterians bring pencils. He was on to something, but he only got it half right. Would it be better to say Baptists AND Presbyterians (and everyone in between) are welcome to bring Bibles AND pencils?

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SENATE PRAYER

I will say I was incredibly impressed with how the Senate conducted itself- I'm not sure what I expected, but I certainly didn't anticipate the kind and incredibly warm reception they gave me. Taking a page from the prophet Joel and from the words of Desmond Tutu, here is the prayer.

A Prayer for the State Senate of Oregon

What are we doing here
And who are these people, O God?
Who are these men and women to face such a painful time
Such a challenging moment?

Each one here made the decision to serve

Long before these lean days, these hard days

Each one here entered into this service

To make a difference, to make life better for the people of this great state

And now they face the season of the locust

The devouring locus, the cutting locust

Eating away at our businesses and our support networks
Eating away at the programs developed by this body over decades
Eating away at the good will forged between branches and parties
Eating away at their hope of finding solutions that will benefit all

Who are these people, O God?

Who are these men and women, these legislators, mere flesh and blood
Who are they to face such a time as this?

Who could be up to such a task?

And yet, isn't the better question, who are they not to be the ones to step up To rise up to this challenge?

Who are they not to be our leaders at this precarious time? For the people have spoken. The people have called them to this place. And the people have entrusted these ones,

These ones with the awesome power of this office

My prayer this day, Holy One, as they face seemingly insurmountable difficulty
May they know they are up to this challenge

And may they know they face this hard day not on their own

But with the hopes and prayers of every Oregonian

(Even the ones who send them nasty notes- for we know these are really just frustrated prayers in disguise.)

And they do this work under your watchful gaze

You who are the one who brings to life impossible possibilities And wrings hope out of hopeless situations

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LEARN CPR—You Can Do It!

Here are some facts and figures from the American Heart Association:

About 80 percent of all out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur in private residential settings, so being trained to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) can mean the difference between life and death for a loved one.

Effective bystander CPR, provided immediately after cardiac arrest, can double a victim's chance of survival.

CPR helps maintain vital blood flow to the heart and brain and increases the amount of time that an electric shock from a defibrillator can be effective.

Approximately 95 percent of sudden cardiac arrest victims die before reaching the hospital.

Death from sudden cardiac arrest is not inevitable. If more people knew CPR, more lives could be saved.

Brain death starts to occur four to six minutes after someone experiences cardiac arrest if no CPR or defibrillation occurs during that time.

If bystander CPR is *not provided*, a sudden cardiac arrest victim's chances of survival fall 7 percent to 10 percent for every minute of delay until defibrillation. Few attempts at resuscitation are successful if CPR and defibrillation are *not* provided within minutes of collapse.

On July 11, nine TPC participants earned CPR and Automated External Defibrillator (AED) certification and 11 more joined the "friends and family" group to learn about CPR and how to operate an AED. They all were able to learn basic principles and practice CPR as well as learn how to apply and operate an AED. Jennifer Stafford, RN, taught the American Heart Association CPR class. She helped everyone understand the importance of providing this potentially life saving technique in a timely manner to someone in need.

TPC is preparing to become a recognized AED site within the Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue area. We are looking at purchasing an AED in the near future. This class was offered to help train people in advance for this new emergency equipment. We hope to offer the class again in the fall. Many thanks go to Karen Jones for organizing and arranging this event.

MISSION COMMITTEE BACKPACKING

The Mission Committee is going be "back-packing" and you are invited to join us on this adventure!

Each year TPC provides school supplies to local school districts for distribution to children and youth in need. This year we have learned that in addition to the usual pencils, paper, scissors, etcetera, there is need for back-packs for youngsters whose parents cannot supply them. This is particularly critical with the increase in the number of homeless children who are attending school.

So, here's where your help will be greatly appreciated. Watch the school ads and pick up a backpack or two for a needy child. These are available in various sizes for children in elementary through high school, and are designed specifically for school use.

Additionally, we will continue gathering school supplies to fill the backpacks and then send any left-over supplies to the schools for distribution as needed. Lists of items needed by students are available in the Narthex in the area designated for the Food Pantry. Please pick up a copy today and help us ensure that no child goes without adequate school supplies. Boxes for the backpacks and supplies are in the same location.
