TPC Adult Edge Resumes September 9, 2018

After a summer sabbatical, Adult Edge will resume the Sunday after Labor Day, September 9, 2018. If you are unfamiliar with Adult Edge, it is TPC's version of Sunday morning adult education with an innovative vibe. The class is discussion-focused and question-friendly—a safe and thoughtful space to explore contemporary theology, spiritual formation, and social issues. Sometimes taught by Pastor Ken and sometimes facilitated by class volunteers, Adult Edge uses a variety of learning methods—books, DVDs, and lecture—but the real richness comes through shared conversation. Adult Edge meets on Sunday mornings at 8:30 AM, downstairs in the Adult Education room. Childcare is available. All are welcome!

We will spend time on Sunday, the 9th, catching up on what is going on in your lives and hearing about all of our summer adventures. I think I shared once about a tradition in the Unitarian church near where we lived in Fort Worth called the *Ingathering of the Waters*. I found the idea inspiring and would like to try it in Adult Edge. If you still have adventure plans for the rest of the summer, take a small jar or bottle along with you and collect some water—from a lake or river or ocean or the tap of an old friend—and bring it to Adult Edge with you Sunday, September 9. As we check in, we will pour our collected waters into a common bowl and share the source of the water and why it is meaningful to us. If you have already done all your adventuring or forget your water, you can give a verbal version!

We will also watch the trailer for our next study, Reclaiming Jesus, A Confession of Faith in a Time of Crisis. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) met this summer in St. Louis (one of our youth, Robert Belz-Templeman was a Young Adult Advisory Delegate, and Annica Gage, our seminarian, was a Presbyterian Peace Fellowship intern). One of the actions taken by the GA is to enter a period of study to evaluate the possibility of adding two new confessions to our Book of Confessions: "Reclaiming Jesus, A Confession of Faith in a Time of Crisis" and Martin Luther King's "Letter from a Birmingham Jail." We will participate in this period of study by looking at both these documents, beginning with Reclaiming Jesus, Sunday, September 16.

TPC Readers Continue in the Fall of 2018

Although we have been taking a summer break during July and August, two TPC reading groups—the Third Thursday Readers and the Fourth Thursday Readers—have been reading and discussing fiction books with spiritual themes since September 2017. We started off last fall with *Ordinary Grace* by William Kent Krueger and finished up in June with the *Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry* by Rachel Joyce.

Priscilla Hagan graciously opens her home every third and fourth Thursday mornings and deftly facilitates our discussions. Each group meets once a month from 10 to 11:30 AM in Priscilla's home to talk about the book.

Our 2018 discussions have taken us from the fundamental truths of the First Nations People in the Pacific Northwest (*I Heard the Owl Call My Name*), through grief and the power of community (*A Man Called Ove*), to sobering perspectives on historical feminist and abolitionist movements (*The Invention of Wings*), and a contemporary look at skin color in America (*God Help the Child*). It has been richly rewarding to hear each reader's insights and experience a deeper connection with other TPC members.

We will resume reading in September 2018 with Lamb: The Gospel According to Biff by Christopher Moore, a humorous take on Jesus from the perspective of a childhood buddy. Next, we will go back to 1948 and follow the multigenerational story of displaced Palestinian refugees in Mornings in Jenin by Susan Abulhawa. Our November title is Benediction by Kent Haruf, a contemporary look at life and death and the family ties that bind. We will finish up 2018 with a Christmas brunch at Priscilla's to share book suggestions for 2019.

We have room for two more people in the Third Thursday Readers (Dick Wiggers says, "Please won't another man sign up?"); and there is one open slot in the Fourth Thursday group. If you are interested in joining either of these groups, please contact Priscilla Hagan, Laura Spurrell, or Jean Martin. If more people are interested than we have room for right now, we can explore starting up another group—perhaps on a different day or time. Look for sign-up sheets in the Narthex in August and September.

FAMILY PROMISE HAPPENINGS

I am excited to report that we are closing in on 10 committed Host Congregations and we have plenty of Support Congregational volunteers. Our Day Center is slated for modifications in September. The magic number of Host Congregations is 13, allowing each congregation to host just once per quarter. We received a \$12,000 grant from Suburban Door earmarked for our Day Center plus \$5,000 in doors and window products.

Sustainable income is our next big challenge, as we get educated from Family Promise national on grants, campaigns and the like. Several on the FPTV Board and Leadership Team have submitted grants, but we need a serious grant writer to join us. SHARE YOUR AMERICA WITH A HIGH SCHOOL EXCHANGE STUDENT FROM ONE OF 70 COUNTRIES

We are looking for local families to "Share Your America" with a high school exchange student from one of 70 European, South American, Asian, or African countries during the upcoming school year. Sponsored by PAX – Program of Academic Exchange (PAX), these students arrive in the U.S. in August.

PAX students are 15-18 years old, have studied English for at least three years, and are motivated to learn more about the U.S. by attending high school and living with a host family. PAX students are eager to experience American activities—backyard barbecues, birthday celebrations, and holidays—with their host families. They are covered by comprehensive medical insurance and have their own spending money for incidentals.

Volunteer host families provide PAX students with a bed, a quiet place to study, a seat at the dining table, a warm and supportive home environment, and encouragement to engage in everyday American life. With their exchange students, host families experience such activities through fresh eyes while also learning about the exchange student's country and culture. All types of families—single parents, young couples, retirees, and parents with teenagers—are welcome to host.

Founded in 1990, PAX is a not-for-profit educational organization and one of a select few U.S. Department of State designated Exchange Visitor Program's chosen to participate in its prestigious U.S. government-sponsored FLEX and YES programs. Each year, more than 1,100 teenagers visit the U.S. as PAX exchange students.

I greet you in the name of Jesus. I want to tell you that we have a great time in the project*. We learn God's word, we study and we go out at 4:30 in the afternoon. We attend every afternoon on Monday and Tuesday. On Monday we had a program at "Provinvia de Loja School" and I participated with all my classmates. Last week we went on a school tour to Quito and we visited the museum of a place called "La Casa de la Cultura" and we also went to Guallabamba zoo where we saw lions, bears, condor, turtles, wild cat, parrots, ducks, deer, horses, guinea pigs, rabbits, monkeys, frogs, lizards, cougars, among others.
