A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

The Wonder of Love

The year is 1940. The setting is a small, nearly abandoned town in Burgundy known as Taizé, just a few short miles from the demarcation line dividing German occupied France from the rest of the country in the early years of the war. The sun has set and you've settled into your bed. Then you hear a scratching sound on your door. You go to open it- standing at the door with fear in their eyes is a couple with two small children. The woman holds an infant in her arms. Their clothes are ragged. The children's bony arms tell you they haven't eaten for a long, long time. The man stammers what you had already guessed: "Wir sind Juden". (We are Jews.) You have a choice to make- if you send them away, you are sure they won't last the week. Yet, if you invite them in- you might not last the night. What do you do?

If you are 25 year old Roger Schutz, who would become known to all the world as Brother Roger, you know you really don't have a choice. You know you have to let them in no matter the consequences. Indeed, you know this is why you moved from your native Switzerland to this dangerous corner of the world in the first place- to manifest the light of Christ in a land hidden beneath the shadow of hate and death.

This month I write to celebrate the life of Brother Roger, a man most of you probably have never heard of, but a man who has shaped the worship life of TPC nonetheless. Brother Roger moved to France when everyone else was running out and established an ecumenical community at Taize, helping people escape from Nazi Germany, and welcoming Protestants and Catholics alike to establish a witness in Europe for how the church might live as one body. Taize community is particularly well known for their simple, contemplative hymns such as "In the Lord" and "The Lord is My Light", hymns we often use during the celebration of the Lord's Supper here at TPC. Another noteworthy feature of this community is its popularity with young people. While the churches in Europe continue to die on the vine in ever greater numbers, Brother Roger's honesty, courage, love, and his willingness to engage complex issues of faith and doubt without giving easy answers helped foster a community where as many as 5,000 young people a week

gather from as many as 75 countries. Here are just a few of his remarks given to a group of over 100,000 young adults who gathered in Taize during the Christmas of 1995: "By night, we will go to the spring. Deep within us there sparkles living water where we can quench our thirsts. By night and by day, as we move forward from beginning to new beginning, a whole life is built up. Could the human soul be that, too: the secret heartbeat of happiness almost beyond words? In the presence of physical violence or moral torture a question plagues us: if God is love, where does evil come from? No one can explain the why of evil. In the Gospel, Christ enters into solidarity with the incomprehensible suffering of the innocent; he weeps at the death of someone he loves. Did not Christ come to earth so that every human being might know that he or she is loved? When we can sense hardly anything of God's presence, what good is agonizing over it? It is enough to have the desire to welcome God's love for a flame to be kindled, little by little, in the secret recesses of our being. 'Filled by his love. the heart opens to others.' Animated by the Holy Spirit, this flame of love can be guite faint. And yet it keeps burning. And the Holy Spirit stirs us up and is at work within us, reorienting the depths of our being, preparing us to dare to live lives of forgiveness and reconciliation. And the heart awakens to the wonder of a love."

Sadly, at the age of 90 Brother Roger died on Tuesday, August 16th, after he was murdered during evening prayers by a Romanian woman visiting the community. Whether the woman attacked Brother Roger because of mental illness or whether she was threatened by his constant and steadfast efforts to work for peace, unity, and justice we may never know. What I do know is that we lost a truly great and generous soul this month- a soul that inspires us, a soul that fills us with hope, and a soul whose example continues to urge all of our hearts to be awakened to the wonder of love. The next time you see in your worship bulletin that one of our hymns comes from the Taize communityremember Brother Roger, and remember the amazing way he lived out his faith in Jesus Christ.

What is the Peacemaking Offering?

Tualatin Presbyterian Church will be collecting a special offering called the Peacemaking Offering on World Communion Sunday, October 2, 2005. The Peacemaking Offering is one of four special offerings designated by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The 192nd General Assembly (1980) of the former United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America called for an offering to be received to support peacemaking initiatives and peace education throughout the church. This year 25 percent of the offering received will be retained by TPC, 25 percent will be used by our synod and presbytery, and 50 percent will be used by the General Assembly ministries through Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. There will be more information about the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program as bulletin inserts in the weeks before World Communion Sunday. You also more information get www.pcusa.org/peacemaking. The 25% of the offering retained at TPC will be used to create a Peacemaking award to be given to an individual or group in our congregation or community as recognition of their efforts towards peacemaking. The mission committee is working on the guidelines and process for this special award, so watch for more details in the coming weeks

WISDON REASURE HUNT

In the Bible, Proverbs says to search for wisdom like it was "hidden treasure." Everyone loves a treasure hunt, so invite your family or friends to join you in a search for the wisdom found in Proverbs.

Here's what you'll need:

- 2 sheets of 8-1/2" x11" paper
- 12 pieces of string, yarn or ribbon (12° each)
- pen



Here's how to play:

- 1. Fold each paper in half, in half again, and in half again. You should end up with your paper divided into 8 rectangles.
- 2. Cut out each rectangle.
- 3. Use this list to write the name (Proverbs) and the numbers of a chapter and a verse on each rectangle: Proverbs 2:6 / 3:13 / 3:19 / 4:5 / 4:7 5:1 / 8:11 / 16:16 / 18:4 / 19:8 / 24:3.
- Punch a hole in the comer of each rectangle and tie a piece of string. yarn or ribbon through each hole.
- Choose one person to hide the Proverb tags, tying them to objects inside or outside your house.
- Send everyone to look for the tags.
- 7. After all the tags are found, look up the verses to see why we should treasure wisdom.
- 8. Create your own hunt by searching your Bible for more verses about wisdom.


