



Dear friends,

As many of you know, in the last year the Session has been discussing establishing a new part-time pastoral position to better care for our families. The Session shared their thoughts and plans during two congregational meetings, then conducted a mission study, created a job description, and they now have permission from the Committee on Ministry of our Presbytery to formally ask the congregation to approve the formation of an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC), who will work hard to find this new pastor. After sharing this information at the Congregational Conversation held after worship on August 31st, I am pleased to call a Congregational Meeting to ask for this approval on September 28th. In order to include as many people as possible we will hold the meeting directly after worship with no break, and we will bring the coffee and snacks to you.

If the congregation votes to establish this APNC, this is what will happen. The nominating committee will put forward a slate of candidates on which the congregation will vote at yet another Congregational Meeting. When the APNC is formed, they will meet with representatives from the Presbytery to learn about the process. Their first action will be to create a Church Information Form (CIF) that will describe our congregation and the person we are hoping to find. The Session and Presbytery must approve this CIF. After this, the APNC will begin searching for candidates. Names will come to them from a nation-wide computer database, as well as from individuals who are interested and are referred. This research phase is the longest part of this process and should take many months. Finally, when the APNC is able to narrow down their list to three candidates, the APNC will interview these individuals face to face and hear them preach. At this point the APNC will have to make their final choice. After all this, and after the final candidate is approved by the Presbytery, then the congregation will have a chance to meet this person, hear him/her preach, and will then vote on whether to extend a call.

So, it is a long process, but what's fantastic is that it is a thorough process. Every step in this process is clear, and at every turning point along the way the church will be guided by the Presbytery and most importantly by the Holy Spirit. This is part of why it is so cool to be Presbyterian- it's not so much our beliefs that make us distinct; it is our faith that God works through groups and through a well-ordered process.

Now, because this is such a new step for us, the Session is also doing something else I think is really, really smart. Using the job description modeled almost exactly on the one we will use to find an Associate Pastor, the Session, following the

recommendation of a hiring committee, is hiring a Pastoral Resident to work with us in the year ahead.

What the heck is a Pastoral Resident? A Pastoral Resident is a person who has completed their seminary training, but who has not completed the Presbytery process to become ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. The residency model is based on the same one used in the medical world, and assumes that while pastors receive a lot of training in seminary, there is still a lot of practical learning that can only come through experience with a congregation. Like an interim pastor, a resident will walk with us for a season, but will not become a permanent staff member. And like a medical resident, a Pastoral Resident will work in a variety of different areas. Our resident will focus her work in worship and family ministry, but she will also be involved in pastoral care, adult education, and other areas, as needed.

Who is this person? I am excited to announce that the name of our Pastoral Resident is Nicole Reibe. Nicole completed her Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary this last May. She grew up in Longview, and has come back to the area after graduation, and is now currently working on a Masters degree in history at Portland State. In the short term future she hopes to be accepted into a Ph.D. program in Church History. Nicole's background in the church is extensive: a member of First Presbyterian Church in Kelso, Washington, she has experience in a wide variety of different faith traditions from Pentecostal to Roman Catholic. And she has worked with churches both large and small not only in the Northwest, but in New Jersey, and even completed a year long internship with a Reformed church in Switzerland!

You will get a chance to meet Nicole on September 14th, which will be her first Sunday with us. In this next year she will be regular part of the life of TPC, but I don't think there will be anything merely ordinary about her time with us. I'll leave you with a phrase I found particularly meaningful from her statement of faith:

I believe that the gospel includes the good news of Christ's eternal salvation, but also that there is hope for peace in this world.

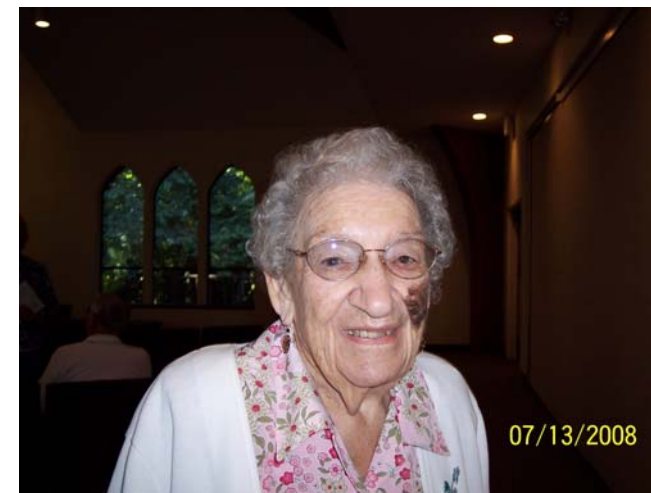

Marian H. Larson
Ninety-three years is a lot of life, but here goes.

I was born in Portland, OR, April 6, 1915. When I was two weeks old, we moved to Lake Grove to a house my father built on Upper Drive right across the street from where the Presbyterian Church stands today. Property was \$10 an acre and lots on the lake were \$50 each. There were five families at that time. The nearest store and post office were down Bryant Hill at the railroad track. Transportation to Portland was by steam train which had to be flagged down at the station. A community house was built, and that was the hub of all activity. Grandpa Rease was the first superintendent of the Sunday School in 1918. Rease Road is named for him. Grandpa's house was located on the second acre east of Rease Road. Both houses are still there today. My sister was born two years later, and we had great fun.

When it was time for my sister and me to start school, we moved to Portland and we attended Fernwood Grade School for 4 years. Then we moved back to Lake Grove and lived in Grandma's house. I graduated in 1929 and went to Lincoln High School in Portland. In 1933, I

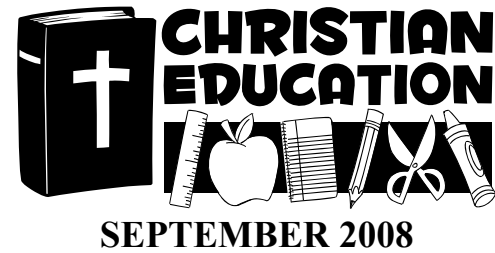
went to Reed College for two years and then went to work at Meier & Frank. I was married in 1936 to Jayrold Pollock and we moved to La Grande for two years. Jerry was transferred to Astoria, then to Klamath Falls for two years, then he lost his job. We went to live in Lake Grove with Grandma who was alone. Our son, Keith, was born in July and we moved to Portland, bought a house in Rose City and attended Rose City Presbyterian Church. A house became available in Lake Grove across from Jerry's folks at Bryant Road and Upper Drive so we bought it and moved. Keith and I attended church at Lake Grove Pres. Church where Jerry and I were married. The first church building was completed in 1932.

In Lake Grove we had a large garden, and kept very busy. Jerry and I were divorced in 1942. He just did not want to be a daddy. I went to work at the Piggly Wiggly store in Oswego, joined the grocery clerks' union, and went on. Grandma took care of Keith. I decided in 1947, during World War II, that I would enter the field of nursing, a life-long dream. I graduated with honors from the Univ. of Portland St. Vincent School of Nursing in May, 1950. I worked at the Oregon State Hospital for two years, at University of Oregon Hospital and the Tuberculosis Hospital for several years and in 1960 went to Dammasch Hospital in Wilsonville as Director of Nursing Services. By that time I had earned a Master of Science degree in nursing education from the U of O. After nine years, I started teaching nursing at Clark College in Vancouver and in Longview, until I retired at age sixty-five. By this time I lived in Tualatin and was a member of Tualatin Presbyterian Church. I am an ordained elder, have sung in the choir, and have served on several committees: outreach, worship and fellowship.

I am indebted deeply to my wonderful deacons, and church friends who bring me to church each Sunday. I love my relationship with you all and especially my relationship with my Heavenly Father.

P.S. I have 3 grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren and 5 great great grandchildren.
