



### A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

The other day one of our members asked me a GREAT question. Question: "I've noticed that some of our members have been preaching at our church. And I'm fine with this, I'm just wondering why it's OK for them to be doing this. I thought pastors normally did this."

And, of course, this person was absolutely correct- normally, pastors are responsible for the preaching of the Word. (Thank goodness it is 'normally' and not 'normal', or I'd probably have to be quiet most of the time... ☺) After all, pastors like myself receive extensive training and are ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.

Well, let me give the official Presbyterian answer first. Our Book of Order states: "For reasons of order the preaching of the Word shall ordinarily be done by a minister of the Word and Sacrament." (W-2.2007)

Of course the key word there is the word 'ordinarily'.

Along with Ministers of the Word and Sacrament, also known as Teaching Elders, the Ruling Elders, the men and women the church are persons "with particular gifts to share in governing and ministry" and should "cultivate their ability to teach the Bible." (G-6.0304) In a Presbyterian Church the Elders are responsible for: "providing for the worship of the people of God, including the preaching of the Word." (G-10.0102) And while ordinarily we look to Ministers of the Word and Sacrament, it is perfectly appropriate in our polity for an Elder with the guidance of their pastor to offer the Word purely preached.

Ok, enough of the 'officialese'. The deeper and better reason for equipping lay members of Christ's body to preach the Word is that I actually believe in the priesthood of ALL believers. I believe the true source of preaching doesn't come from a degree or from an official body conferring authority upon someone- the true source of preaching is the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit that brings the Word to life not only in the preacher's heart, whoever they may be, but also in the congregation hearing them. And the Holy Spirit...well, let me just say that I don't want to be the

guy to decide where the Spirit can and cannot move.

Back in the nineteenth century pastors like me decided that the Spirit could only work with white men with a seminary education. And this was very convenient, as the men who decided this all met those rather lofty qualifications.

While some people agreed with this, and some were angered by it, the most interesting people to me were the ones who simply ignored it. White and African-American women rose up all over these United States in informal gatherings and gave what they called "Testimonies". Here's what a "testimony" looked like: a woman would reach a passage of scripture, and then she would expound on the meaning of this passage of scripture (for sometimes up to an hour or more!) both exploring it from a textual perspective as well as from their personal perspective and always leaving the hearers with a charge based on the claims of the Gospel. That sure sounds like preaching to me. But of course those women would have had to live for a long, long time before they would have seen a church come to recognize that. And what a loss- not for those woman who preached whether people had ears to hear or not; but what a loss for us, for the church.

Paul tells us the church is like a body. And as our bodies require ears, eyes, arms, and feet, I believe our church body requires hearing the Gospel from different perspectives.

Now you know that I love preaching. There is nothing I love more about my vocation or to which I devote more of my time. I consider preaching to be a sacred and high calling worth our greatest efforts, and far too important to restrict to the voices of the few. As Christ's body needs every member to function well, so, too, I believe the church requires many voices.

And when I'm ever personally tempted to dismiss a preacher because of the seminary they attended or the fact they didn't attend one at all, I try to remember that our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ didn't get into Princeton Theological Seminary or even make the cut at his safety school of Harvard Divinity. He was a simple carpenter. And the power of his preaching lay not in his formal education, but in his faithfulness to God's Spirit.

# PEOPLE IN THE NEWS



Let me introduce you to Jean and Dean Wells, who have been members of Tualatin Presbyterian Church since 1985. If you were in church on September 12th you

Jean and Dean live in the Charbonneau District as do other TPC members. They purchased their home in 1977, moved to Charbonneau in 1978, and have lived there ever since. Jean also taught elementary school. She taught many grade levels. She would teach the same grade level for at least three years before she moved to a new level. She taught at Columbia and Wilcox. She taught for 28 years.

Dean loves to golf and currently plays three times a week. Jean creates water color paintings and does wood carving. Paintings she has done hang on her



walls along side paintings created by her artistic son, Allen. Jean also creates wood carvings such as the one pictured on the left, which adorn her shelves and stands. She is very modest about her artistic abilities. Jean and Dean are also both bridge players.

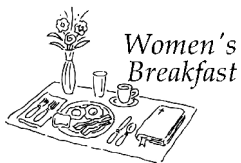
# WHAT'S GOING ON

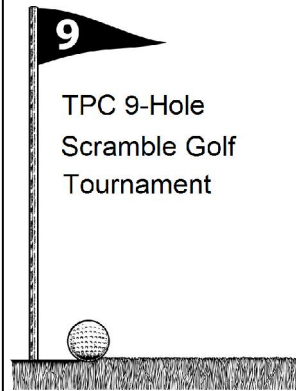

## Preventing the Flu—In Review... Good Health Habits Can Help Stop Germs

Note: The **2010-2011 flu vaccine** will protect against three different flu viruses: an H3N2 virus, an influenza B virus and the H1N1 virus that caused so much illness last season.

The **single best way to prevent seasonal flu is to get vaccinated** each year, but good health habits like covering your cough and washing your hands often can help stop the spread of germs and prevent respiratory illnesses like the flu. There also are flu antiviral drugs that can be used to treat and prevent the flu.

### 1. Avoid close contact.

Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.

### 2. Stay home when you are sick.

If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.

### 3. Cover your mouth & nose.

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. If you do not have a tissue, use the crook of your arm or your sleeve, but do not use your hand. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.

### 4. Clean your hands.

Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. Wash your hands for 15 to 20 seconds with soap and water, or use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.

### 5. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.

Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.

### 6. Practice other good health habits.

Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.
