



Falling Back & Moving On



With the disappearance of daylight savings time, we have recently “fallen back” to give the sun a one hour head start to greet the day. As we were resetting our clocks at home, Jeni commented, “The rest of the world may be falling back, but TPC is sure moving on!” How right she is. Forward progress during the interim period often happens in fits and starts. For a while it seems like we are marking time. Then a number of things surface at once to remind us of the work that was going on behind the scenes. These words of Jesus are a timely reminder of this truth: “. . . The Kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow” (Mark 4:26-27).

Two major breakthroughs demonstrate how God has been working in our midst, even when all of us may not have noticed: The election of the Pastor Nominating Committee on October 5, and the approval of the Church Mission Study by the Session and the Presbytery on October 23. I know that you will join me in praying for the members of the PNC (Dave Backen, Rebecca Crall, Greg Imus, Del Judy, Cathy Lambeth, Carolyn Locke, Mike Nelson, Marc Olson, and Mike Shiffer, chair), as they work together to seek God’s guidance in calling the next installed pastor of TPC; and in expressing our deep appreciation to the members of the Church Mission Study Task Force (Mike Nelson, chair, Mary Shiffer, writer, and Lori Beymer, Connie Myers, and Herb Zachow) for the outstanding job they did over the past several months. Highlights of the Mission Study will be shared with the congregation at our worship service on Sunday, November 9.

How can we express our heart-felt appreciation for God’s faithfulness to us? One significant way is through our faithful stewardship to the Kingdom of God. Dr. Robert Bohl, a past moderator of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) reminds us that “stewardship begins the moment you and I confess Jesus Christ as Lord. Stewardship is everything we do—how we live out our commitments once we call Christ as Lord. Christian stewardship is simply putting first things first.”

This year, November 23, the Sunday before Thanksgiving, will be stewardship dedication Sunday, when we will be given the opportunity to make our financial pledge to support Christ’s mission and ministry through TPC. As you consider your pledge for next year, may this prayer by Ann Weems speak to you as it has to me:

“O Lord, forgive our fears that so stifle our stewardship.
Forgive our giving in and our giving up instead of giving ourselves to Christ’s mission of love.
Remind us that our hope is in standing up and risking, in taking our stewardship seriously.
Help us to remember, O Lord,
that the stewardship question is not really how much we will give?
The stewardship question is, how will we spend what we have been given?
We pray that it will be faithfully and cheerfully. Amen. (Ann Weems, *Searching for Shalom*).

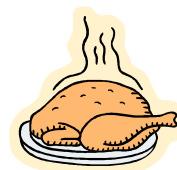
TPC STUDENTS AND LEADERS BELOW AVERAGE

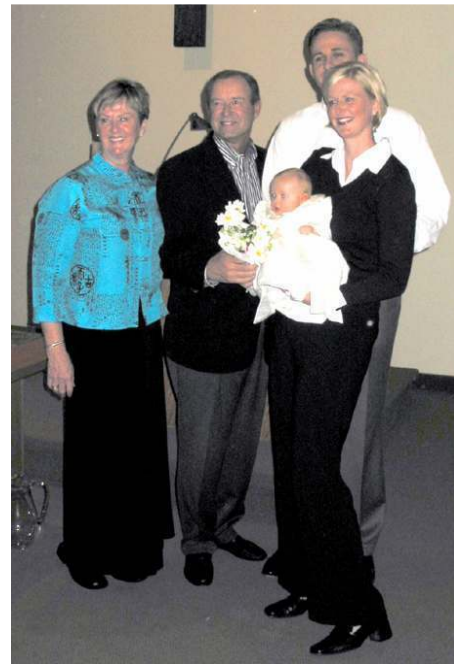
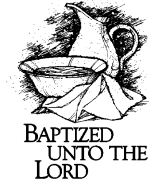

TPC Women's Retreat

This year the annual TPC Women's Retreat took place on the weekend of September 26 - 28. Eighteen women met at Collins Retreat Center outside of Estacada for a wonderful weekend of fellowship, good food and inspirational teaching. The Rev. Catherine Putnam from Salt Lake City was our guest retreat leader. Many of us know Catherine from her occasional visits to TPC in past years, so it was a special weekend to have her with us. The topic for the weekend was "Catch Your Breath!" and after the weekend, we all realized that breathing will never be the same for us! Catherine led five different sessions:

1. From Dustiness To Life - being alert to the breath of God
2. Attentiveness - being wholly available to the present moment.
3. Creativity - taking time to do things in our lives that give us life in the fullest sense. (We took time for a fun art activity in which each woman created her own visual image of breathing or could remind us to stop and breathe deeply!)
4. Breathing in Prayer
5. Creating a space for Breathing - It was a wonderful time and definitely a time we all set aside to connect with God and each other. In this fast paced world of ours, it felt good to put the daily stuff aside and really BREATHE! for a couple days.

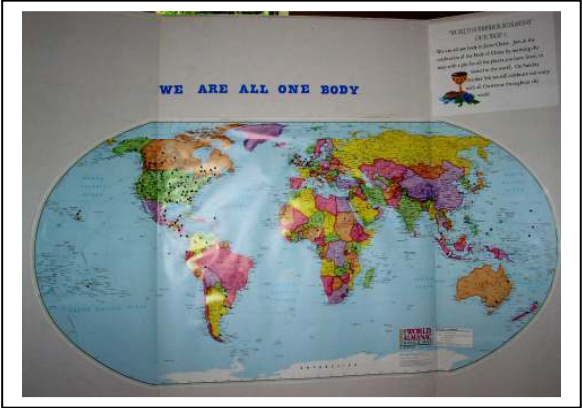

Our pastor nominating committee (PNC) held its first official meeting after church on October 19th. This was the committee's first step on its long path toward recommending a new, permanent pastor to Tualatin Presbyterian Church. On hand to help the group to start this vital journey were Jack Hodges, Presbytery Executive for the Presbytery of the Cascades and Ken Miller from the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry. Ken will be our committee's advisor and liaison with the Presbytery during this process.

The committee's first task will be to receive TPC's mission study from Session and to create a Church Information Form (CIF) based on the church's mission. The CIF serves as TPC's "resume" presenting an accurate picture of our church for pastors who might consider applying to be called as TPC's new minister. The Presbyterian Church has adopted a multi-faceted process for helping churches like ours to call the right pastor to serve its congregation. This process is expected to take 12 to 18 months to complete.

The committee asked Mike Shiffer to serve as its chairman and Cathy Lambeth to be its recording secretary. Other members of the PNC include Dave Backen, Rebecca Crall, Del Judy, Carolyn Locke, Mike Nelson, Marc Olson and Greg Imus.

Make place mat collages for everyone in your family. Use the place mats for Thanksgiving dinner or any other meal.




You will need:
