



A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Dear friends,

The early church thrived because the Holy Spirit enabled them to see their common life as a joy rather than a burden. They understood the deep connection between joy and giving. Here's how the writer of Acts puts it:

“All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food *with glad and generous hearts*, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.” Acts 2:44-46

It's no accident that the writer of Acts connects gladness with generosity. Psychologists today confirm what the early church knew by heart: the act of giving creates deep feelings of joy in our being. In his book *The Happiness Hypothesis* psychologist Jonathan Haidt relies on brain scans and thousands of personal interviews to demonstrate the ways in which giving creates these feelings of joy. He shows giving leads to glad hearts even when we don't feel like being generous. In an interview with Nicholas Kristof of the New York Times Haidt said this: “I interview people who were busy but reluctantly undertook some good cause because (sigh!) it was the right thing to do. Then they found that this ‘sacrifice’ became a huge source of fulfillment and satisfaction.” (The New York Times, Jan. 16th, 2010)

Haidt and his fellow psychologists believe that biology alone offers the reason that generosity leads to joy. They may be right, but I believe the deeper reason is that we are made in the image of God, whose generosity created the abundance of our world, and who, in the person of Jesus Christ, poured out his very life for all. We are made to have glad hearts. We are made for generosity. It's who we are.

In the month of November we will hear two speakers reflect in worship on what giving means in their lives. **After worship on November 4th and November 11th, I will host a financial presentation sharing with you how the session stewarded our funds in 2012 and what we are planning for 2013. November 18th is “pledge Sunday”, and during worship we will celebrate our giving by coming forward in song and dedicating our pledge cards.** During this entire season look for a banner in the Narthex bearing the words: “With glad and generous hearts.” Let this banner remind us both who we are and whose we are as we prayerfully consider our annual financial pledge to Tualatin Presbyterian Church.

In 1982 it was off to Ely, Nevada where Jay became a Postmaster.

A promotion for Jay, led the family to Tualatin, Oregon in 1984. Jay worked with Thom Nelson as part of Tualatin Youth soccer. Thom helped guide them to TPC in 2000. Once here, Jay continued his career as Tualatin's postmaster, retiring in 2003 with over 30 years of Federal Service. Nancy received her masters from Portland State and spent the next 15 years as an elementary school librarian for the Tigard/Tualatin school district, retiring in 2007. The girls grew up, and sadly Jocelyn passed away of cancer in 2002. Jenny lives with her husband, Jason, in Tigard.

So what are they doing now you ask? They tell me retirement life is GREAT. Lots of time on the golf course for Jay, and Nancy keeps herself busy with family, friends, reading, beading, glass fusing and all kinds of crafts. She is one talented lady. Did I mention that Jay likes to golf? He's also a Reiki practitioner. In 2004 the couple took a major trip to Peru, staying with friends and visiting Machu Pichu. They described the trip as simply INCREDIBLE. And in September, they experienced their first ever cruise, to Alaska and are now hooked on cruising, they can't wait to go again. Kirkin' O' the Tartans

On Sunday, October 28, 2012, also known as Reformation Sunday, the congregation of Tualatin Presbyterian Church will celebrate their Scottish heritage. In Scotland in the mid-1700's the English Parliament and monarchy banned wearing tartans or kilts which represented the various families (or clans), playing of bagpipes, singing of Scottish songs, speaking Gaelic, Scottish dancing --but most importantly, forbidding the Scots to worship as they pleased. The Scots were ordered to follow the Order of Worship set by the Church of England. The Scots rebelled.



In our Kirkin' service, we will remember ancient times, as well as past and present family--while asking God's help and blessings in the future. We do not celebrate a Presbyterian division from others who follow the Protestant religion; we celebrate the glory of God in our Church and in our hearts.

October 28 will be the day for all of us to wear a "wee bit of tartan" in remembrance of those who endured such hardship during the early days of the church and, as the early Presbyterians did, ask blessings upon our loved ones. Please find a "wee bit" of tartan (plaid) to wear on that Sunday. If you can't, a "wee bit" will be provided so that you do not feel left out! Kilts would be entirely appropriate for both men and women. Tartan ribbons would be great! You need not be a Scot to wear tartan and most of us could never identify a clan to which our ancestors might have belonged. But--the Scots consider it a great honor when anyone wears their tartan--clan member or not.

On the 28th, I will have a form giving the history and the words for two pieces of "special" music. Dr. Ron Fabbro and the Bell Choir will present.

Our Kirkin' on the 28th will be followed immediately by a "proper" Scottish Morning Tea (tea and desserts) served in the narthex. And, gentlemen . . . tea in Scotland is not reserved for women only . . . it is a family event. Barb Crall, Pam Cameron and Carol Rhodes have graciously offered to organize the tea.

Peacemaking Offering: A hearty "thank you" to all of you who contributed to this offering. Total contributions were \$ 867, which exceeded our average level of support over the last four years. While the majority of the funds will go to the larger organization (Presbytery, Synod, PC (USA)), 25% will be retained by TPC to be used locally at the discretion of the Mission Committee. Your support of this offering is greatly appreciated.

The congregation is blessed with numerous individuals whose culinary skills excel! They bring old time favorites and new concoctions to this annual event which supports the Mission outreach of our church. Author Jane Kirkpatrick to Keynote 2013 Leadership Fair

Noted local author Jane Kirkpatrick will keynote the Cascades Leadership Fair on **Sat, Feb. 28, 2013**, at First Presbyterian Church in Salem. She will address the event theme of "The Power of Story: Your Story, Our Story, THE Story."

Kirkpatrick is the author of 23 historical novels, each of which has a spiritual message, but not a heavy-handed one. One of her original editors, Dudley Delffts, says that she is "miles beyond the genre writers,...especially the Christian writers who often let their faith agenda override their writing agenda." Over 500,000 copies of her books are in print, and another is due out next spring.

The story theme will be woven into the daylong fair, with sessions on journaling, writing a church history, narrative preaching and even setting up a church library. The Leadership Fair is designed for clergy and laity and offers something for those who serve in all sorts of roles in the church—elders, deacons, choir members, teachers, treasurers and clerks, among others.
