A NOTE FROM PASTOR KEN

Did you know that people are getting better at...Tetris?

Well, it's true. People are getting better at Tetris, and it's a bit of a puzzle as to why this is. If you haven't played it recently Tetris was a wildly popular a computer game created by Alexay Pajitnov in which differently shaped pieces fall from the top of the screen, and your job is to rotate the pieces so that they fit together to create layers. As you advance in the game the pieces fall faster and faster, until it feels all but impossible to manipulate the shapes fast enough to make them fit.

Now, on the one hand it shouldn't come as a surprise that people are getting better at this game. People have been playing it for thirty years at this point. Generally, people get better at something the longer they work at it. But what's curious is how few people are playing today. Back in the 80's and 90's millions and millions of Tetrisites were being mesmerized by the Russian folk theme song and glowing blocks. Today, only a tiny, tiny number of people are still playing it. And generally one would think that the greatest progress would occur when the greatest number of people are working on the problem.

But according to thought leader John Green in this case people only got better when the pool of players became smaller, and the community of players became more connected. In small, highly connected groups people learned from other. They learned that in the beginning stages for instance you want to create negative space on the right of the screen. But in the later stages when the pieces are falling faster you want to leave gaps in the middle of the screen. And in these small, dense communities they began to see people achieve goals like maxing out the total score or getting past Level 30 once thought impossible. And then, once people saw that these goals were achievable, more and more people put the work in and mastered these goals, too.

Why am I telling you about a video game from the 80's? Because what's true of Tetris is why churches like TPC are so important. In North America midsize congregations like ours are becoming increasingly rare. Current statistics hold that around 90% of churches have 100 or less members, while 90% of people attending churches show up to congregations with 1,500 or more adherents (the technical definition of a megachurch). In other words, the vast majority of churches are tiny, and most of these congregations are struggling just to keep the lights on. But a small number of mega churches have nearly all the people. The main challenge megachurches face is the vast majority of those attending show up on Sunday but make few meaningful connections with others in attendance and are disconnected with the church until the next Sunday. (Obviously, this isn't always true. Many people are highly connected to large membership congregations. I'm referring to statistical realities which don't account for individuals.)

Midsize churches like TPC provide a critical and, increasingly I'm afraid, unique space for people to come together in a space small enough to foster connection but large enough to be self-sustaining. And instead of learning how to manipulate pixels on a screen- people in mid-size congregations practice learning how to be human with one another in the context of faith and hope. In spaces like this we encounter ideas that stretch us. We hear stories from others that touch us in surprising ways and remind us we're not walking alone. And, in what feels like an increasingly polarized time, we can laugh with friends who sometimes hold different views from ours and remember that being part of the body of Christ is more important than how we choose to vote. And, it's a place where you learn new things…like why people are getting better at Tetris. \square

I hope you'll join my family in continuing to support TPC with our time and our treasure, for the true treasure lies in the relationships we make, the lives we help, and the people we love. I continue to be so grateful to serve as your pastor.

FAMILY PROMISE OF TUALATIN

VALLEY is reaching the home stretch to opening our doors. Our current plan is to begin serving homeless families as soon as January 22nd. The most visible evidence of our progress is the incredible upgrades to our day center, a key program component.

The day center is an integral part of our program. Our families will use the day center for their home base from 7 am to 5 pm. They will be supported by a case worker as they research and apply for benefits and resources, identify housing opportunities, conduct job searches, clear-up paperwork or financial issues and move to quickly regain housing and independence. The center provides a stable location for schools to pick-up school aged children. Younger children will receive childcare while their parents work to regain stability for their families. The center also provides showers, laundry facilities, and homework space.

With the efforts of more than 100 volunteers over the last three weeks, the day center has been transformed from a vacant home in disrepair to a revitalized and inviting home base for our guests. Our volunteers shared their skills and energy and contributed more than 1,000 hour of labor. Many of these volunteers were TPC members. As with prior opportunities to support Family Promise, TPC members exceeded all expectations for participation and generosity. I have never felt more gratitude for the opportunity to be a member of TPC where the Christian values of service, compassion, and creativity are exhibited freely. A heartfelt "thank you" is extended from the Family Promise Leadership Team for every talent you have shared, effort you have made, and dollar you have given toward the success of building our program. TPC has played an integral role in building our program and will soon have the opportunity to work directly with homeless children and their families providing them hope and opportunities for a brighter future. May God bless our collective efforts to serve these families.

With the advent of the school district's program of offering 4-year old preschool, the Tualatin Valley Preschool that meets downstairs at TPC is encountering serious financial difficulties. Their requested rent relief was granted and a special session meeting is scheduled after worship on Sunday, December 16th with TVPS to review and evaluate their plans for their future success and survival.

GIVING

END OF YEAR TAX PLANNING TIPS

Charitable givers older than age 70-1/2 with an IRA account may find it beneficial to make a **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)** from an IRA to a favorite charity. Such a distribution is made directly from the IRA to a qualified charity and limited to \$100,000 annually. A **Qualified Charitable Distribution** from an IRA can be counted as part of the required annual minimum distribution and is excluded from taxable income. This is especially advantageous when a taxpayer is taking the standard deduction. With changes to the tax law, fewer taxpayers will be itemizing deductions, the means by which donations to charity are deductible.

Specific IRS regulations can be complex as to the type of eligible IRA and how the direct contribution is made. If you are older than 70-1/2 with an IRA account, consult your tax advisor as well as your IRA institutional holder to determine if you might benefit by donating through your IRA.

Another tax planning tool is to create a **Donor Advised Fund (DAF).** By creating a DAF, a donor can make a large contribution to a fund but distribute those dollars to charitable organizations over multiple years. This allows the donor to still take advantage of the charitable giving itemized deduc-

tion in the first year, then utilize the larger standard deduction in the following years. Contributions to a DAF are irrevocable but provide a variety of tax advantages. The Presbyterian Foundation offers a DAF; consult your tax advisor for additional options.
