# **STARTING SUNDAY, OCTOBER 31, 10 AM**

We are pleased to announce that Session has approved restarting in-person worship at TPC beginning Sunday, October 31<sup>st</sup>.

- This will be a "soft opening" and there are several things you need to be aware of. First, everyone will be required to wear a mask, fully covering their nose and mouth
  - while inside the church. Masks will be provided if you forget to wear one. Second, we ask that you signup to attend service via the church's website. You can find the link to sign up on the home page of the church website (look for the blue box that says "Registration is requested to attend in person. CLICK here to register"). Or, you can go directly to tpcspirit.org/attend. You will be asked to enter the number of people in your family and their names. You can also call the church office and asked to be signed up.
  - In the event we need to provide contact tracing, when you arrive for service, you will be asked to add your names to an attendance ledger.
  - The seating will be somewhat different. The normal rows of chairs will be spaced further apart, front to back.
  - Family groups can sit together, but disparate groups will need minimally 2 empty chairs between groups.
  - Portions of the service (specifically, the vocal choir) will be pre-recorded to minimize virus transmission.
  - For the same reason, there will be no food or drink in the sanctuary, nor following service in the Narthex.

While everyone is strongly encouraged to be vaccinated, all are welcome to attend.

For those members of the congregation who are unable to attend, the service will be streamed live on the TPC website. Note that service is returning to the regular 10:00 AM time.

We are <u>so</u> looking forward to regathering as a family of faith and hope to see you there and for all the days to come.

### A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN



<sup>8</sup>But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back each of you to your mother's house. May the Lord deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me. <sup>9</sup>The Lord grant that you may find security, each of you in the house of your husband." Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud.<sup>10</sup>They said to her, "No, we will return with you to your people." <sup>11</sup>But Naomi said, "Turn back, my daughters, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands? <sup>12</sup>Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband. Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons, <sup>13</sup>would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying? No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the Lord has turned against me." <sup>14</sup>Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her. <sup>15</sup>So she said, "See, your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sister-in-law."<sup>16</sup>But Ruth said, "Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; Where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Ruth 1:8-16

Dear friends, On our first day back physically, I will preach from the book of Ruth. This story takes place in the chaotic time of the Judges during a famine. No one had food in Israel. So, one family immigrates from Israel to the enemy land of Moab in the east. This wasn't like moving from Oregon to Washington. It would be more like moving to some enemy land...like California. (Or even worse- Texas.) But there, Naomi's husband dies. Her two sons die. And she is now alone- a stranger in a strange land.

What I noticed about the text was how Naomi and her two grieving daughters-in-law had different responses to this catastrophe in their lives. Naomi says she has become bitter. Do you know what it feels like to be bitter- to be constantly frustrated and to feel like nothing is ever going to be right again? Naomi was grieving incredible loss, and she was grieving this in a strange land without her own family from home. Now Orpah, one daughter-in-law, related to this disaster by being reluctant. She kisses Naomi, giving us a sense that she does love her mother-in-law and at least a part of her wants to stay with her. But then, another part of her, maybe one that's fearful, pulls back and decides to play it safe in Moab. After all, this is where she grew up. These are her people. My sense is a part of Orpah just wasn't ready to move on and lean forward into the mess. Anyone (or...everyone) know what that feels like? And finally there's Ruth who just wants to go wherever Naomi goes and jump right into the thick of things. We like to think we'd be like Ruth in this situation, but goodness- she seems to have a lot of energy.

What I love about this story is there is room given for all of these ways of relating to the impossible time they were living in. Sure, without Ruth's willingness to venture forth we wouldn't have the book of Ruth, or King David, or Jesus for that matter. But the author of Ruth does not place Ruth and her response on a pedestal while shaming Naomi and Orpah for their feelings. Naomi's bitterness? Check. This is absolutely a faithful way of being given all that she endured. And your bitterness over this whole COVID thing is, too. Bitter about people not getting vaccines? Bitter about vaccines? Your bitterness is welcome in God's eyes. Orpah's reluctance, her fear- also welcome. We are living in the midst of what folks call The Great Resignation. When work opens back up more people than ever before are saying, "Naw." Many of us just aren't feeling it. And while some of us feel safe returning to the sanctuary, many of us do not. I need you to hear that your reluctance to come back is OK! Not that you need my approval for your decisions- I just want you to know that your feelings aren't just acceptable, but they are blessed in the sight of God. And finally Ruth. Ruth is ready to get moving. And while I love this and welcome this, I also know that Ruth entered into a journey whose twists and turns remained a mystery.

At the beginning of our worship service I have consistently proclaimed: "Whoever you are, (and in COVID) wherever you are, whatever your beliefs, and whatever your doubts- you are welcome in this place." For me those words have never been more true. We still don't know exactly where we're going, but I'm still grateful for the company we're keeping along the way. In Christ, Ken

FAMILY PROMISE OF TUALATIN VALLEY (FPTV) is partnering with WA FamilyPromise County to provide a cold weather shelter for families from November 15, 2021 through March 15, 2022. The county is funding a majority of the project and FPTV is trying to stretch those dollars to go beyond the county's basic expectations to support the families. Half of the families will come from the Family Promise wait list and the other half will be from a WA county homeless family list. This shelter will be one of only three known shelters in the county for families. Gina Olson from TPC is part of the team coordinating an onsite food pantry at the hotel to help meet basic needs. The LDS Humanitarian Food Surplus donated 10,000 food items for this program. Volunteers from TPC helped load, haul and store the food. TPC is generously allowing five pallets of canned items to be stored downstairs, as well. Without these volunteers and storage space, FP would not have been able to take advantage of this one time opportunity to receive all the free food. Volunteers for this project were Megan Swanson, Derrilyn Bayha, Steve Olsen, Doug Steffen, Pam Bowen, Neil Olson, Bradley Olson and Gina Olson. We extend a special thank you to Susan Springer for coordination of this project! Monetary donations from TPC members for Family Promise will be utilized to purchase crockpots for our guests. This will allow the Cold Weather families greater variety with what they can prepare. Without the crockpots they would only have a small microwave and two burner cooktop to prepare meals.

In November FPTV is holding a nonperishable food drive. There will be a posting in the narthex as soon as we know which items are needed. Because of the LDS donation of certain foods, FP will be asking for items that we do not already have stored.

We are currently hosting 15 households, 11 families and 4 adults. A total of 34 households have entered stable housing thus far in 2021. They receive regular check-ins to ensure a successful transition and to offer ongoing support. All 2021 graduates have remained housed. Thank you for your continued support for Family Promise! When this newsletter arrives, TPC will be about to hold its first indoor, in-person, service since March 2020. What a milestone. I remember when Covid-19 was a news story mainly pertaining to China. We were in Ashland in late February for a huge family gathering when our family saw the first effects of what was to become a worldwide pandemic. Our niece was a surrogate for a family in China and due to give birth in just a month. She received a call prior to our family dinner saying that the biological mom was not allowed to fly into our country to receive her soon to arrive baby girl. Subsequently that precious baby stayed with our nephew and his wife for four or five months after her birth. They count that as a gift.

We all have our pandemic stories and memories and they will likely become a part of our Thanksgiving this year. Some will spark smiles upon recollection, while others may draw tears. These past 20 months have been surreal.

Last year, Thanksgiving was virtual for most. This year it looks to be a bit more normal. Still, for many families in the TPC community there will be seats at the table left unfilled.
