TAX SAVINGS STRATEGIES FOR END OF YEAR CONSIDERATIONS -GIVING DIRECTED THROUGH AN IRA ACCOUNT

If you are 70 ½ or older and have a traditional IRA, the following example illustrates how you might find it beneficial to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution through your IRA.

Sam and Betty are both 73 years old and they file a joint income tax return. Sam plans to contribute \$3,000 to his church. Changes to federal tax law now entitle Sam and Betty to a \$26,600 standard deduction on their joint federal return. Since this exceeds their itemized deductions (how charitable donations are deducted), they will utilize the federal standard deduction giving up the tax benefit of itemizing and deducting charitable contributions.

Sam has a *traditional* IRA account and his required minimum distribution this year is \$4,000. After consultation with his tax advisor, Sam directs his IRA institutional holder to pay \$3,000 directly from his IRA account to the church. Normally an IRA distribution would be taxable. However, in this instance it is not taxable because of a special law for those 70 ½ or older that allows an offset to taxable IRA income by qualified gift distributions. This will enable Sam and Betty to receive a tax benefit for their charitable gift without itemizing deductions. The charitable distribution will also count toward meeting Sam's annual required minimum distribution.

Always consult with your tax advisor, as well as your institutional holder, to determine whether you would benefit since situations may vary and tax legislation is complex.

ADVENT REFLECTIONS

Home by Another Way, A Christmas Story, Barbara Brown Taylor. This is a beautifully illustrated children's Christmas book. Tells the story of following a special star.

Advent in Narnia Reflections for the Season, Heidi Haverkamp. Uses C.S. Lewis's The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe to have Advent reflection. Very thoughtful readings appropriate for children to adults, even a church Advent study.

Celebrating Abundance Devotions for Advent, Walter Brueggemann. Thoughtful devotions of truth-telling, powerful reflections.

Walking Backwards to Christmas, Stephen Cottrel. Interesting approach if you are tired of the more normal advent readings. This starts after Christ is presented in the Temple and finishes with Isaiah and Moses. Gives new revelations to a well known story.

God is in the Manger: Reflections on Advent and Christmas, Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Writings of the German theologian who was executed by the Nazi's just before the end of World War II.

Christ in the Carol: Thirty-one Devotionals for Christmas and Advent, Christopher and Melodie Lane. For music lovers, this reflects on one carol each day bringing new understandings and information of Advent and Christmas music.

Between Two Worlds: Daily Readings for Advent, Kate Moorehead. Written by a busy Episcopal priest, wife and mother who reflects on what can be set aside and what is important to do in this busy season.

Advent and Christmas: Wisdom from Henri J.M. Nouwen by Judy Bauer (author and compiler) An outstanding writer who challenges and inspires and knows our hearts.

Preparing for Christmas: Daily Meditation for Advent, Richard Rohr. Rohr challenges us to not settle for an "infantile gospel or any infantile Jesus. The word of God to confront, convert and console us, in that order."

Watch for the Light: Readings for Advent and Christmas, compiled by the Plough Publishing House. This outstanding anthology offers a spiritual reading for each day of the holiday season, drawn from numerous inspirational writers including Thomas Aquinas, Meister Eckhart, Martin Luther, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, C.S. Lewis, Thomas Merton, Philip Yancey, Madeleine L'Engle, Henri Nouwen, Kathleen Norris and Annie Dillard This list was compiled by Carolyn Hale.

PEACE AND WONDER: The Sanctuary Advent Appointments

Appointments are all the things that cover the walls, ceiling, communion table, pulpit and anything else in the sanctuary. We don't call them decorations because their purpose is to enhance worship, not merely to look pretty. The theme for this year's Advent is Peace, Wonder, and Hope. Here are the reasons for my choice.

We find ourselves surrounded by division, uncertainty, and violence. The people I talk to say they are stressed, anxious, and exhausted. I wanted to provide a sacred space where all people could find sanctuary (no pun intended) and worship in peace, unity, and hope. I also wanted to help people experience the wonder and mystery of God's grace as we await the coming of the Christ Child.

I chose the two prints of paintings because of their dramatic use of light. "The Nativity" by Pier Maria Bagnadore (Italian, 1550-1627) has two sources of light. The infant Jesus lights the stable so brightly that the shepherds have to hide their eyes. The second source of light is heavenly and shines down from the top of the painting.

In his painting, "The Annunciation" Henry Ossawa Tanner (1859-1937) depicts the angel Gabriel as a being of heavenly light, again, illuminating Mary's dark room. Born in Philadelphia, Tanner was the son of a former slave and an African Methodist Episcopal bishop. He was the first African American painter to gain international acclaim. He lived in Paris most of his adult life to avoid the racism in the United States. He was accepted in French artistic circles.

The two canvas paintings by the TPC art team and the mixed media painting by Nancy Wilcox celebrate our TPC community and the amazing gifts we all share with each other. Monks drew the images to illuminate a manuscript in Spain sometime between 900-1000 C.E. We merely copied. Nancy's inspiration came from a contemporary photo. I think of all that has happened in the world since those monks made those illuminations a thousand years ago, and how Christians lit the Advent candles every year, through war and peace, sickness and health, famine and prosperity. I think of all that has happened in our church since Nancy did her peaceful painting. We are still here united by Christ in one church as we have been for centuries.

We draw from tradition the old purple appointments and candles used for hundreds of year. The purple candles symbolizing hope, faith and peace. We light the single rose candle for Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday in Advent. Gaudete is Latin for rejoice. It is the Joy Candle. "Joy is based on the spiritual knowledge that, while the world in which we live is shrouded in darkness, God has overcome the world." –Henry J.M. Nouwen

Finally we light the white Christ candle on Christmas Eve, a more recent tradition. We remember the coming of the holy infant, the light of the world. "The light shines on in the dark, and the darkness has never mastered it." John 1:5, *The New English Bible*

As for wonder, Bob Paetsch and I wondered all afternoon as we built and installed our new ceiling hangings, if they would instill a sense of wonder in our worshipers and enhance their sense of wonder and mystery of the Incarnation during this holy season. Chris Robertson, Worship Elder

PAM'S HARVEST POTLUCK RECIPE Printed by popular request.

Better than Robert Redford Recipe

Makes 16 servings. Prep: 20 minutes Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes Refrigerate: at least 2 hours or overnight

- 1 C all-purpose flour
- 1 C coarsely chopped walnuts
- 1/2 C (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted
- 1 pkg (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1 C confectioners' sugar
- 1 container (8 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 4 C milk
- 2 boxes (3.4 oz each) instant vanilla pudding
- 2 boxes (3.9 oz each) instant chocolate pudding Chopped nuts, chocolate curls
- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Coat 13X9X2 inch baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.
- 2 In a medium-size bowl, mix flour, walnuts and butter. Pat into prepared dish. Back at 350 for 15 minutes. Cool.
- 3. In a bowl, beat cream cheese and sugar until smooth. Fold in half of the whipped topping. Spread over cooled crust.
- 4. Prepare vanilla pudding using 2 cups of the milk. Spread over cream cheese layer. Prepare chocolate pudding with the remaining 2 cups milk. Spread over the vanilla pudding layer. Spread remaining whipped topping over pudding. Refrigerate at least 2 hours or overnight. Sprinkle with nuts and chocolate curls. Cut into squares.
