

BETTY SHELLEY SHOWS TPC A DIFFERENT WAY

Betty Shelley and her husband, Jon, have been leading interested TPC members in a "Reduce Your Waste" class during the month of November. The Adult Edge class at TPC has been studying Eco Theology and Betty's class seemed like a natural extension.

The Shelleys began their journey toward zero waste living in 1992 when they took the Master Recycler class in Portland, Oregon where they live. They also participated in courses like "Exploring Deep Ecology" and "Voluntary Simplicity" through Ecochallenge.org. Betty says "At first, the idea of

voluntary simplicity made me nervous. I thought I would have to give away all my stuff! But it made sense to live a calm life" and so they embraced the concept. Betty had managed a women's clothing shop in her career and noticed that customers would purchase something to feel better about themselves or their circumstances. But in a short while these same customers would be back and do the same thing all over again. She says "it was like they were trying to fill their emptiness with their purchases." Betty did not want to go down that path and became committed to voluntary simplicity and frugality in her own life.

The results are that Betty and Jon have produced just one 32-gallon garbage can of trash per year since 2006. In the class, we learned that Betty and Jon didn't reach that goal by merely recycling; they started limiting what they would bring in to their home. There are many "R's" beyond reducing, reusing, and recycling. One Sunday the class brainstormed a list of other "R's" including repairing, refusing, repurposing, regifting, realigning, returning, rethinking, and reading. For example, we talked about using toilet paper that is made from recycled paper. John Martin brought a package of Charmin whose label tells us that for every tree used, they plant at least 1 more. This TP comes from a sustainable forest and that is also good. We can find products that are better for the planet even if they aren't perfect!

Why is this important, you may ask? Several informative videos (links are listed at the end of this article) were part of the class homework. We learned that we are running up against limits: our planet is a closed-loop system. It is finite. In the past 3 decades, a third of our natural resource space has been lost. The planet has less than 4 percent of its original forests and 40 percent of our waterways are undrinkable. Amazingly, if everyone consumed at the rate that the United States does, we would need 3 to 5 planets.

Another homework assignment was going through our own garbage and cataloguing what was in it. This was very enlightening. We had food scraps, packaging materials, styrofoam and oh, the plastic. In one year, we use 220 pounds per person mostly in packaging materials. Betty introduced us to 5 principles that we can practice: 1) Use what you have (fix things, if possible) 2) Borrow what you need 3) Swap for it 4) Find it in a thrift store and 5) Buy it as a last resort.

All of these ideas really got the class thinking. In our last session, we all took a moment to write down individual pledges that we would carry out in response to all we had learned. Many of us said we would switch to cloth napkins and towels to reduce our use of paper towels. Remembering and using our reusable grocery shopping bags was also on the list. One person who noticed a lot of food waste in their garbage said they were going to try a 3-day planning cycle to lower that. Other thoughts were not running the tap while brushing teeth and not pre-rinsing dishes and also buying things second hand.

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This was quite a learning experience and participants had very positive reactions. Rob Wiesenthal said "I learned that there's a whole lot more that I should be doing, maybe not should, or could, but that I WANT to be doing. It's inspiring." Judy Nix reflected "I thought I was doing a good job. I have a new awareness that I didn't have before. Do I leave the light on when I leave the room?" In a closing email, Betty shared her impression of the class at TPC: "It was the largest group to whom we've given the class and it was very well received. At the final session, Jon and I were both impressed with the pledges they made to change their behaviors moving forward."

On behalf of the TPC attendees, I would like to say thank you to Betty and Jon and note that, after this class, I see my surroundings with very different eyes. It is an adjustment to realize there are so many LITTLE things I can do if I just think about it. Which brings me to one of the most important things Betty suggested. Share with other people what we are doing and why. Share the impacts. Let these ideas go forth and spread - love of Creation is care of Creation!

Stewardship Corner - TPC is a Gift Worth Remembering this Christmas Season Dear TPC friends,

I write this letter in earnest to share hopeful news, and honest news, about our financial outlook. I am so grateful for the many wonderful programs that have sprouted through the generous and adventuring work of our church members and staff. We are doing wonderful things to change the lives of those in need in our community!

There are other changes happening at TPC as well. Many of our members, now having fixed incomes, need to balance living costs or medical needs with their church giving. Members with school-aged children can also be challenged with economic demands. We have been mindful of our expenses, currently underspending our budget by approximately \$11,000. That will not be enough to fill the gap generated from reduced giving. November was a turning point as year-to-date revenue did not exceed our expenses, generating a \$6,800 net operating loss. For the first time in my budget planning role, we could end the year needing to spend some reserves to meet committed expenditures.

These financial challenges will also impact our 2020 Budget. I shared these concerns when I kicked off our 2020 Stewardship Campaign in October. From Session's work with Dr. Corey Schlosser-Hall, we are looking at ways to grow the church and reach out to those who are seeking a church family. We believe TPC offers something unique that many are thirsty for. We hope that you will join our efforts to grow the church!

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FEELING UNDER THE WEATHER? SEE CHART BELOW TO HELP DETERMINE WHAT AILS YOU.

KNOW THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN COLD AND FLU SYMPTOMS

SYMPTOM	COLD	FLU
Fever	Fever is rare with a cold.	Fever is usually present with the flu in up to 80% of all flu cases. A temperature of 100 degrees F or higher for 3 to 4 days is associated with the flu.
Coughing	A hacking, productive (mucus producing) cough is often present with a cold.	A non-productive (non-mucus producing) cough is usually present with the flu (sometimes referred to as dry cough).
Aches	Slight body aches and pains can be part of a cold.	Severe aches and pains are common with the flu.
Stuffy Nose	Stuffy noise is commonly present with a cold and typically resolves within a week.	Stuffy nose is not commonly present with the flu.
Chills	Chills are uncommon with a cold.	60% of people who have the flu experience chills.
Tiredness	Tiredness is fairly mild with a cold.	Tiredness is moderate to severe with the flu.
Sneezing	Sneezing is commonly present with a cold.	Sneezing is not common with the flu.
Sudden Symptoms	Cold symptoms tend to develop over a few days.	The flu has a rapid onset within 3-6 hours. The flu hits hard and includes sudden symptoms like high fever, aches and pains.
Headache	A headache is fairly uncommon with a cold.	A headache is very common with the flu, Present in 80% of flu cases.
Sore Throat	Sore throat is commonly present with a cold.	Sore throat is not commonly present with the flu.
Chest Discomfort	Chest discomfort is mild to moderate with a cold.	Chest discomfort is often severe with the flu.

Remember to stay home if you have the flu until you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of Tylenol or Ibuprofen (of other fever reducers). Thanks to Susan Fee, Parish Nurse, for her help with this chart.
