

When I Grow Up ... The Rev. Dr. Dick Wiggers

When I grow up, I want to be . . . If you asked me that when I was five years old, I might have said a fireman, a cowboy, or a train engineer. When I was asked before beginning my freshman year at Miami University to choose a major, I filled in the blank under English. A year later, I switched to Business. After graduation from Miami in 1965, I enrolled in the Hotel, Restaurant Management Program at Michigan State University and received a second BA degree. Up until then, the idea of becoming an ordained minister hadn't crossed my mind.

Thirteen years later, after a career in food service management with Stouffer Foods Corporation in Chicago, J. L. Hudson Department Stores in Detroit, and Federated Department Stores in Cincinnati and Dallas, I had a strong sense of call to become a Presbyterian minister. How and why is a story for another day. The week of July 4, 1979, I was enrolled at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia, and taking summer "baby Greek." As someone else quipped at the time, "Apparently God has called you from feeding bodies to feeding souls!"

In 1983, I began my first "call" as the Associate Pastor of Spring Hill Presbyterian Church in Mobile, Alabama. I had seven wonderful years of growing and learning how to be a pastor. In the Spring of 1990, I was asked to become the organizing pastor of Northminister Presbyterian Church in Pensacola, Florida. As someone who grew up land-locked in Southwestern Ohio, I never dreamed that Jeni and I would spend twenty years on the Gulf Coast. We're so glad we did.

In mid-1999, sensing it was time for a change, I began preparing for the next phase of life by taking the required course work to become an interim or transitional pastor. Doing so not only opened doors to serve churches on the "left coast," but brought us closer to our family. At the same time our son, Craig and his family, moved to the USMC base at Camp Pendleton, California, I was called to serve as the Interim Head of Staff Pastor of the Laguna Niguel Presbyterian Church in nearby Orange County. This being my first interim position, I tried to heed the advice given me by a seasoned friend, who when asked said, "Dick, as an interim pastor, your most important job is to love the people!" He was so right.

After two wonderful years with Craig and his family while serving at LNPC, they called their new pastor, and we needed to move on. We hoped and prayed there might be an opportunity close to our older son, Scott and his family in the Portland area. That's when Thom Nelson, after serving 22 years as the first pastor of TPC, felt called to move close to his family in Michigan. The timing was right, which brought Jeni and me to TPC for my second interim position in the fall of 2002. What a joy it was to serve TPC leading up to Ken Hood's beginning his 18 year ministry at TPC in the fall of 2004. This time, Jeni and I were able to stay in our house in Sherwood and simply pivot from Tualatin to Tigard, as we entered the life of Calvin Presbyterian Church (now Rise Church). In the fall of 2006, after they called their next pastor, Jeni and I moved out of state once more — this time for a three year commitment to be the Stated Supply Pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church in Reno, Nevada. In October, 2009, I officially retired, and we moved back "home" to Portland — the only time in our 22 moves we moved back to a place we'd lived before.

Since my official retirement in 2009, I have not given up practicing what I want to be when I grow up. Beginning in 2013, I served half-time as the Parish Associate of First Presbyterian Church in downtown Portland. In August 2015, we came full-circle when Ken Hood and the Session asked me to become the part time Parish Associate for Pastoral Care alongside our good friend, Charlie Brown. What a gift these last 8 years have been. Thank you for allowing me into your lives, for the gift of your friendship, and for loving and supporting Jeni and me when at times we needed you the most.

DR EVAN C. PAUL EXPLAINS HIS MUSIC CHOICES

Hello! Recently I was asked by several congregants if I could provide a bit more information on the music I play at services, so permit me to write on my goals and concepts when planning worship music.

I have always wanted to share music with people that they may not know well. There is so much music out there that few people hear or play, and it is in those neglected spaces that I find some of my favorite works. Over the past few weeks I have focused exclusively on music written by women, because it tends to be such a small part of our classical musical experience. I have enjoyed exploring the piano works of Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel, Clara Wieck Schumann, Cécile Chaminade, Amy Beach, and Germaine Tailleferre, all extraordinary composers whose highly varied and individual music is immensely enjoyable to play.

Finding this music is often not easy—these women have not enjoyed the robust publishing of their male contemporaries, and so editions of their works are more difficult to find. There are fewer resources on their music, making interpreting them a greater challenge. And given that many marginalized composers have been published only recently, many such works are still under copyright and thus it can be costly to access them. But it is for these reasons that celebrating their music seems all the more important.

It is usually in the offertory that I place my most challenging works, because the congregation is sitting still and has the most attention to give. Many of these musical moments may not be what many

might consider traditionally "beautiful," but my hope is that people will consider that and wonder what it is that makes something beautiful to begin with—and is there not also value in things that are "un-beautiful" as well? The Lamentations of Jeremiah are certainly not pleasant in a traditional sense, yet they are still deeply moving; consider, too, the deliberate ugliness of Picasso's Guernica, its distorted shapes a haunting reminder of the ravages of war. We watch movies that we know will make us cry; we deliberately eat foods that are bitter.

I do not believe that music is simply entertaining. It can certainly be that! But all of the elements of a worship service are not merely entertaining: they are motivating, humbling, challenging, and edifying, and I believe that the music we experience should reflect that as well. Not all music is immediately easy to listen to, just as not all verses in the Bible are easy to interpret and understand. There will be moments in services, verses in the readings that can feel unpleasant and can make us uncomfortable, but those moments exist in the context of other, uplifting and reassuring moments: life, including the lives of those in in the Bible, contains both pleasant and unpleasant, good and bad, joyful and sorrowful, and all of these serve a purpose.

As we embark on Advent and the Christmas season, I am turning back toward Baroque music, as I am inclined to do for both Advent and Lent. In the past I have played Bach and Handel during Advent; this year, I am choosing to delve into the works of Domenico Scarlatti, who wrote over 500 single-movement keyboard sonatas. I think that you will enjoy their sparkling, energetic personalities. I know I have a lot of digging ahead of me to find the right ones to play!
