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PASTOR'S REPORT

March 1 marked my one-year tenure at Tualatin Presbyterian Church. Serving as your interim pastor has been a great joy for me. Heather and I came at the beginning of Lent. We walked toward the cross together, we celebrated the Resurrection together, and from there, we kept walking. Remember the congregational survey? The congregational survey revealed to us that TPC is a place of belonging and unconditional love. 91% of those who participated in the survey agreed that at TPC, we help each other in times of trouble. 65% of our members have been at TPC for more than 10 years. 69% enjoy our worship style. 99% enjoy inspiring sermons and many of us are open to new ideas (85%). This survey has become a helpful tool for the Pastor Nominating Committee as they seek God's guidance in discerning who will be the next installed pastor at TPC. Thanks for taking time to work through all those tedious auestions.

As a congregation, we worked through budgetary challenges, grieved over the loss of dear friends, struggled with the changing



nature of the church, and, along the way, celebrated several birthdays during worship (with the help of a chicken). Over the year, I hope I have demonstrated for you that it's okay to be different and try new approaches in worship. While preaching and offering public prayers is my jam, I'm never opposed to pulling out my guitar and singing an introit or a prayerful song. (Someone once told me that when we sing to God, we pray twice.) On any given Sunday morning, I've been known to light a single candle of remembrance, invite us to engage in a time of silent prayer and, occasionally, I've even orchestrated and spoke the children's sermon while standing on top of a ladder. And when life's difficulties seek to overwhelm both your mind and heart, please ask me to pray for you. Praying for and supporting one another is what makes TPC a place of God's healing love.

While I wish to thank all the TPC congregation for encouraging me to preach, lead, write, and ask hard questions about God and living out our Christian witness, I also want to give thanks for people like Susan Springer, Sarah Beck, Larry Nord, Jennifer Schloming, Evan Paul, Julie Flint and all the sound/video guys (esp. Mike Shiffer and Rick Crall). As I assess the vitality of TPC, your staff, deacons, session, and volunteers are the amazing people who dedicate both their time and energy so that all can experience what it means to live and breathe within a spiritual community.

FAMILY MINISTRIES



The threads of faith, community, and growth intertwine to create a rich narrative of Tualatin Presbyterian Church Family Ministries' journey over the past year. Guided by the dedicated leadership of Family Ministries Elder, Sandy Gurney and Director of Family Ministries, Sarah Beck, Family Ministries our youth programs focus on fostering spiritual development and connection among our diverse congregation. From the heartwarming Sunday mornings with energetic kids to the dynamic youth group activities and engaging camps attended by 12-22 participants, our church has embraced every opportunity to nurture the minds and hearts of our young people. The creativity of our children shines through in their plays, artistic endeavors, and culinary adventures, while field trips to city parks and the beach offer valuable experiences beyond the walls of our sacred space. With initiatives like prepping meals for the Good Neighbor Center, assisting with Family Promise Bingo nights and Starbucks Sundays, the spiritual calendar has been filled with meaningful moments, further enhanced by the collaborative efforts like, reimaging the nursery project led by Rachel Maxwell. As we reflect on a year marked by resilience, connection, and impactful mission projects, we celebrate the collective spirit that makes our church a thriving community of faith and service.

Holistic Wrap-Around Family Ministries

We upheld the TPC legacy by extending our services to students from kindergarten through high school, maintaining regular meetings. Embracing a comprehensive family ministry approach, we involve primary and middle school children in our mission and youth activities, catering to both TPC's families and those transitioning from college and beyond. Our commitment involves mentoring younger kids, providing opportunities for older kids to demonstrate compassion, patience, and care for the younger ones. We pride ourselves on offering a holistic ministry that encompasses the well-being of our young people.

Nursery

The nursery is currently under the dedicated care of the Director of Family Ministries Elder, Sandy Gurney and Sarah Beck. Additionally, we are fortunate to have a team of high school Seniors and college freshman, who graciously help out during Advent and Lent. This year, one of our high school seniors, Rachel Maxwell, has undertaken a transformative project for the church nursery, displaying unwavering dedication. She meticulously drew out and is hand-painting a vibrant mural depicting Jonah and the whale on the walls, actively involving younger kids aged 5-12 from the church in the creative process. Over the summer, Rachel secured an internship at the Architecture Construction Engineering (ACE) scholarship program at the University of Colorado. Drawing on insights gained from her experience, she presented to the Session in the fall of 2023 an innovative plan to revitalize the nursery into a versatile, multipurpose space for kids to grow, learn and play.

Currently, Rachel is leading an intergenerational team comprising church members aged 5 to 80, emphasizing elements of ethnicity, diversity, inclusion, creativity, and safety. Collaborating with Wayne Willis, they designed and constructed a movable stage for younger kids to perform plays. Rachel is overseeing a group of children engaged in painting the wall mural. With an established fundraising committee, she aims to complete the project by the spring of 2024, leaving a lasting impact on our church community.



Worship Participation

On the first Sunday of each month, children are welcome to partake in communion, regardless of their beliefs or uncertainties, as integral members of the church congregation. TPC Family Ministries actively promotes the engagement of children & young individuals, spanning from preschool to college age, in worship activities. Encouraging a sense of community, our middle and high school students have voluntarily chosen to accompany preschool and primary-aged children during the children's message, providing support while they sit before the church congregation on Sunday mornings. This inclusive approach fosters a sense of unity & encouragement across all age groups.



Sunday Mornings

This year, our curriculum featured video resources from Sparkhouse and Godly Play, supplemented by an emphasis on storytelling around an artificial campfire. Recognizing the diverse challenges some children face, such as dyslexia, autism spectrum disorder and anxiety, as well as, varying comfort levels in reading Bible stories aloud, we adopted a more inclusive approach through storytelling and group discussions. Many new children were unfamiliar with the stories, making it important to create an environment that embraces all kids, regardless of their familiarity or understanding within the age group of 5-12.

To foster a supportive atmosphere, high school students played a key role in assisting younger children by answering questions and encouraging critical thinking. We offer the belief that

"everything in the Bible is true, and some of it even happened." Additionally, collaborative group art projects, sewing endeavors, and mission initiatives were undertaken, including crafting rubber band slingshots for the David and Goliath story, creating Valentine's Day cards for children residing at the Family Promise homeless shelter, and offering the choice for kids to memorize the Lord's Prayer for communion on the first Sunday of the month.



During Sunday services, high school students have the option to listen to the sermon upstairs with the congregation or engage downstairs, supporting younger children with their projects. They also volunteer to serve as youth liturgists on the second Sunday of the month, contributing to the overall sense of community and mentorship within our diverse age groups.

Camps

Summer camps operated Monday through Friday, from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, for one week in June, July, and August. These engaging sessions accommodated 12-22 children and featured field trips, art projects, and hands-on sewing machine lessons. Activities included swimming at the local pool, playtime at city parks, visits to a farm, hair braiding, sunbathing on a parachute at the beach, and jumping over waves in the ocean. Pastor Ken, John Whitehurst, and Susan Springer attended the beach trip in August. Our campers also enjoyed ice cream, learned valuable life skills, fostered a sense of playfulness, and formed lasting friendships.



Art camp, which took place Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM for one week during winter and spring breaks, was facilitated by Family Ministries Elder, Sandy Gurney and Director of Family Ministries, Sarah Beck. The curriculum included various creative pursuits, including working with resin, crafting bags and coin purses, constructing messy gingerbread houses, and staging three dozen home-grown plays and talent shows. The goal of art camp was to provide a communal and secure space where younger and older kids could connect, unleash their creativity, and collectively express themselves through art as a form of community and worship.



Youth Activities

The youth from Primary and Middle School had many delightful excursions this year. They gathered at Sandy and Reed Gurney's residence for an enjoyable evening, wearing costumes, and decorating cookies with frosting. Later, they strolled to the Pirates of Pinehurst in Sherwood, where they connected with the Swanson family. Throughout the year, the kids engaged in drop-in days from 9 am to 3 pm on school-free days. Additionally, high school students convened monthly for "Starbuck Sundays" to discuss topics such as the church, God, prayer, current events, social justice, as well as, challenges in their personal lives. They also gathered for a church lock-in for the first time since the pandemic. Twelve kids attended.



Mission Projects

The Family Ministries Elder, Sandy Gurney and Director of Family Ministries, Sarah Beck, teamed up with our young people to prepare meals for families residing at the Good Neighbor Center (GNC) homeless shelter. This initiative replaced the usual monthly youth activities, such as roller-skating and zoo trips. During these adventures, middle and high school students took on mentorship roles, guiding preschool and primary kids in the meal preparation. The menu featured a casserole recipe passed down from the two of the kids' grandmother, while younger kids eagerly participated in tasks like heating up fried chicken and practicing knife skills to cut fruits and vegetables for salads. Once the meals were prepared, everyone enjoyed dinner alongside the shelter's resident families.

Additionally, the middle and high school students volunteered to organize and operate Bingo night at the Family Promise homeless shelter in Tigard. Collaborating with the Mission Committee, they actively participated in the Janus Project and the giving tree initiative for families in need within the school district. The collective effort resulted in the collection of \$1650.00 worth of gift cards to support those in challenging circumstances.



Extracurricular Activities

During the past year, the youth and families of TPC engaged in a variety of extracurricular activities. The students from primary, middle, and high school levels convened on Zoom for connection time every Tuesday and/or Wednesday night. This practice, initiated during the COVID-19 period, persisted as a means for kids living at a distance or who are no longer attending church to stay connected and offer mutual support during a challenging year. Looking ahead, high school seniors and college students plan to sustain this virtual gathering while at college.

In a creative turn of events, many young people took the initiative to acquire sewing skills using machines generously provided by members of the congregation. They also delved into crocheting, crafting purses, bags, wallets, finger-knitting, and tie-dyeing t-shirts and socks. These endeavors not only fostered artistic expression but also strengthened the sense of community within the church. Special thanks to Bob and Diane Paetsch for demonstrating how to construct birdhouses.



The youth participated in the Christmas play, where the three magi were creatively crafted from Styrofoam heads and wigs by Laura Byers. A talented individual, Monica Gibson, sang a solo and played the piano. Several high school students stepped in for their peers who were unable to attend church. Riley Redding delivered a magnificent narration, and Macy James assumed the role of the Christmas sloth MC, representing the new generation.



The youth collaborated with the Buildings and Grounds team to undertake a revitalization project, painting and cleaning the narthex, hallway, and both the front and back doors of the church. The front doors were painted red in observance of Pentecost, Christ's life shed for us and the holy spirit adding a vibrant touch to the church entrance.

Communion is served the first week of each month. On these Sundays, Family Ministries hosts the coffee hour, providing a warm and welcoming atmosphere for fellowship and connection among the church community.

Outside of church, the children supported one another by attending each other's school plays, concerts, and sporting events. Additionally, they actively participated in CPR training at their church, blessing of the animals, and a family ministries panel discussion at a monthly Men's Group meeting.

WORSHIP

During 2023, worship continued its return to a new normal following the Covid pandemic, with gradually increasing numbers for in-person worship. The on-line streaming option born out of pandemic lockdowns is now a permanent alternative for those who prefer to worship from home. Other measures for minimizing the risk of infection were incorporated into the in-person service, with the congregation learning to sign "the peace of Christ be with you" in American Sign Language in lieu of shaking hands. Front-door greeters, who also made their return in 2023, began handing bulletins to those arriving for the service, again in lieu of shaking hands.

Regular Sunday services were held throughout 2023, with Communion as usual on the first Sunday of each month and members of the TPC youth program helping to lead the service on the second Sunday. Because Christmas Eve fell on a Sunday in 2023, three services were held that day, including the regular Sunday morning service; a family service in the afternoon; and an evening candlelight service (with Communion). Robust efforts are under way to encourage more congregants to participate in services as liturgists, greeters, and Communion servers. This was never more needed than on a Sunday with three services! It's been gratifying to see lots of new faces volunteering to help lead worship. A sheet is now available in the Narthex each Sunday for volunteers to sign up.

An essential and revered part of worship, TPC's music program is back in full operation. Pianist Dr. Evan Paul continues to inspire at the piano; Director of Music Jennifer Schloming directs the choir each Sunday and shares her talents at the piano when Evan is absent; and Debbie Ivanov leads the bell choir in its beautiful contributions.

Following the departure of the Rev. Dr. Ken Hood at the end of 2022, TPC welcomed the Rev. Dr. Ken Henry as its interim pastor. With Rev. Henry's guidance, the Session began the process of selecting a Pastor Nominating Committee. Following approval of the committee by the congregation, the PNC began its search for a new, called pastor to serve TPC.

In September the Committee begins planning a Stewardship campaign by issuing pledge cards and by asking people to speak to the Congregation about giving for the next year. After gathering pledges and estimated expenses, the Committee develops a draft budget for the next year to be approved by Session.

2023 in Review:

The Annual Financial Review was done and approved by the Committee in May. The challenge for this year was setting a salary for the interim pastor and in budgeting for 2024 the expenses for the PNC and potential salary for the new Pastor if chosen before the end of the year. With so many unknowns and knowing that we can't keep using the reserves to balance the budget every year, salary increases have been deferred and will be revisited later in the year. Susan Kelchner agreed to join the Committee beginning in 2024.

MISSION

Committee Members:

On-going Activities: Traditional mission activities have developed into an important part of the life of TPC. They help define who we are and where our interests lie. These include the following:

- **Giving Tree** this outreach effort has changed over the years. Formerly, TTSD requested gifts and food baskets for families in the district. The district now requests gift cards from Fred Meyer, Winco or WalMart. A tree decorated with "ornaments" of \$25 and \$50 gift cards stood in the Narthex. All of these "ornaments" were taken and a total of \$1,625 was donated and delivered to TTSD before their Christmas break.
- Janus Project (a.k.a. the "Mitten Tree") provide homeless Portland area youth with winter gloves, scarves, hats and socks and other needed items. Over 610 items were delivered to Janus the week before Thanksgiving.
- Annual Cookie Sale proceeds in 2023 went to Compassion International in support of our sponsored children, Sarah and Estalin (see below) and the Memorial Garden. We are a hungry congregation that loves cookies. A total of \$1,084 was collected through good will offerings and the sale of donated, well decorated cookies.
- Annual Presbyterian Offerings There are 4 denomination-wide offerings that we support each year: One Great Hour of Sharing: World Communion Sunday, Christmas Joy, and Pentecost. Each of these was well supported by the congregation.

Special Activities: In addition to the traditional activities, we also have special or focused interests and efforts. These include:

- **Compassion International:** For the last several years we have committed to the support of two youth Estalin, a boy living in Ecuador; and Sarah, a girl living in Uganda. The annual cost of the program is \$516 per child. In the coming year (June), Sarah will age out of the program. The intent of the committee will be to continue sponsoring two youth, committing the church to \$1,032 annually.
- School House Project: this project provides school supplies for needy children in the Tigard-Tualatin School District (TTSD). This project was accidentally overlooked by the chair of the committee and was missed. In 2024, we will reactivate the project and solicit donations from late July to mid-August, before the start of the school year.
- Youth Involvement: The committee was approached by the Director of Family Ministries who asked for more direct involvement by younger members of the congregation in outreach activities. The youth group assumed responsibility for the Giving Tree project and very capably and actively promoted the effort through pre-service announcements, collection and counting of gift cards and delivering them to TTSD.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

Stephen Ministry continues to be a quiet ministry. It doesn't draw attention to itself. While our numbers have dropped in recent years, our commitment and loyalty to the program have held strong.

Stephen Ministry is a ministry of caring. It's about people caring for people. Life can be challenging. When challenges arise, it's helpful to have someone to talk to. That is what Stephen Ministry is all about.

When someone decides that they would like to have a dedicated listener to help sort things out, they are paired with a Stephen Minister. This is a one on-one relationship. Women are paired with women, men with men. The person seeking help is referred to as the "care receiver." The Stephen Minister is referred to as the "care giver." The care receiver/care giver relationship continues until it comes to a natural conclusion. At that time the care receiver/care giver relationship is formally "closed." Some pairs meet for months, some for years.

Stephen Ministers are not counsellors. They are listeners. They provide support for their care receivers for whatever is going on in the care receiver's life. Stephen Ministers can't fix their care receivers, but they can walk alongside them and provide support.

Ideally, Stephen Ministers and their care receivers meet once a week to talk, but that is not always possible. They meet when they can. And they keep in touch by phone, email or text. All forms of communication are good.

Care receivers can talk about anything with their Stephen Ministers without worrying that what they talk about will be shared with others. All conversations are confidential.

ARCHIVIST

Another source of records of TPC is the monthly newsletters. The last 21 years of our monthly newsletters are readily available on the TPC website at Members > Newsletters.

We are currently developing quite a collection of audio-video records that could also be regarded as part of the TPC archive.

FELLOWSHIP DINNERS

The purpose of this program is to have fun and to encourage and expand fellowship among members of our church family. Randomly formed groups of 7-9 adults share Fellowship Dinners once a month for 4 months, and then the groups are re-shuffled to form new Fellowship Dinner groups.

Almost a third of the participants had been in the program since its beginning. We are finally back on its optimum schedule of starting phases in February, June, and October. There were 35 participants at the start of the winter phase in February of 2024.

Participation is based on a sign-up during the month preceeding each phase. A steering committee meets about once a year to review and revise the program as needed. Thanks to Mary Ortez, Rick & Barb Crall, LaVette Columbo, Pam & Scott Cameron, and Kerry Weaver for serving on this committee. BLOOD DRIVE

For the last thirty-four years TPC has hosted an annual Red Cross Blood drive around the Holiday season and for the last few years has hosted a second drive in the summer. I have happily adopted this program as my contribution to the mission of TPC in the community. So when you see me at the microphone during the announcements portion of the Sunday service most of you know that I am asking for volunteers, donors or cookie bakers for a Red Cross Blood Drive. I have even been referred to as a "vampire". An image that I wear with pride.

In 2023 we had two drives, one drive Jan. 23, 2023. We did well, collecting 23 units. Another one on Aug 23, 2023. We did better, collecting 24 units. We already had our first drive for this year. It was held Jan 24, 2024, where we collected 32 units. We are having our summer drive Aug. 21, 2024 so please help and or donate if you can. We have been blessed with the help of many eager volunteers to work as greeters/registers, escorts, and canteen servers. Many of these volunteers have become regulars who work the drives every year. Some of those are: Pam Cameron, Diane Barry, Candy Ferguson, Jay Wilcox, Lynn Neilson, Bob Carlson, Stacy Mauer, Sue Hayhurst, Neil & Sandy Reiling, not to mention the many cookie bakers that make our canteen the best blood drive canteen west of the Mississippi.

The donors who regularly participate (several from our own congregation and most from the community at large) are to numerous to mention. One thing to note is that the donors are able to schedule their appointments on-line. This makes it easier for me to juggle donor's donation times and for them to see what time slots are available. It also makes it easier for me to see who donated before and who will likely be willing to do it again. They can also complete their health history questions on "Rapid Pass". "Rapid Pass" makes the wait to donate shorter by about 15 minutes. You gotta love technology.

It is well known that giving blood saves lives. (Each unit can save up to three lives). On a personal note, in case you ever wondered, I have donated 176 units of blood over the years. So that you don't have to do the math that's 22 gallons. However, due to the fact that I am now on blood thinners that number will remain forever. I encourage each and every one of you, who is capable, to donate every 56 days if you can. That means that you could squeeze in up to 6 donations per year. Or you could donate Double Red every twelve weeks. The need for blood is constant. The Red Cross always needs more blood and at times they reach a critical point where there isn't enough blood available to fill the needs.

I am proud that TPC has committed to hosting these blood drives for low these many years, and that the Red Cross Blood Drives are a regular component of TPC's mission to the community that I hope will continue for many more years to come.

FAMILY PROMISE

Family Promise equips vulnerable families and individuals to end the cycle of homelessness through a community-based response providing short-term emergency shelter, food, case management, and housing navigation services.

Family Promise now owns their own building, Bridge to Home, making a new chapter in efforts to end family homelessness in our community. Family Promise can now service up to 70 households. Enrichment programs bring children together for crafts and story times, after-school homework help and community events like bingo and movie nights, thanks to all the volunteers. Financial Literacy workshops prepare guests for life beyond our shelter with tools for independence and stability. Volunteers also help with shopping for food, preparing meals, running the food pantry and the clothing pantry. Donations have helped all of these programs to be successful.

In 2023, Family Promise had 452 individuals receive shelter services, 39,320 safe shelter bed nights provided, 77% of households exited shelter to stable housing, 87 days is the average shelter stay, 56 pets stayed in the shelter and 242 children stayed in the shelter.

THANKS to TPC for the thoughtful and generous members who continue to support Family Promise.

PRESBYTERY COMMISSIONERS

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is a connectional church: Tualatin Presbyterian Church connects one level up to the Presbytery of the Cascades, which links to the larger Synod of the Pacific, which joins up with the church-wide General Assembly of the PC(USA). Session elects representatives (called commissioners) to represent their church at presbytery meetings; TPC is entitled to send two voting commissioners to each presbytery meeting. Our pastor is a member of presbytery (rather than the local church) so he is also a voting member.

The Presbytery of the Cascades has been gathering three times a year, in March, June, and November. Historically, meetings moved around the presbytery and met in local churches. However, since Covid prevented in-person meetings starting in March 2020, The Presbytery of the Cascades has been gathering online via Zoom. In 2024, the Presbytery of the Cascades will hold their Spring Stated Meeting on April 19–20, which will return to the in-person format at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Portland.

Presbytery meetings intersperse worship with the conduct of presbytery business. Commissioners hear reports from presbytery commissions such as the Commission on Ministry and the Presbytery Leadership Commission (functions like a local church session), plus a variety of other committees. The presbytery votes on important General Assembly overtures, which can change the PC(USA) constitution.

If you are interested in connecting with the larger Presbyterian church and seeing how our presbytery governs, there is an opportunity for you to serve as a commissioner in 2024. Please contact the church office if you are interested!

MEN'S GROUP

January 2023: Slos Sensei, Louis Slos, from the Tigard Akido Dojo, came to our first meeting of the year to introduce attendees to Kiatsu, a Japanese healthy way of living. Several couples as the result of the presentation signed up for classes at the Dojo. One couple is still attending classes and attendees said they feel significantly better because of what they have learned and practice daily.

February 2023: I was the next guest speaker discussing current Oregon legislation and Court Cases of interest. I am a retired attorney, and a member of the Oregon State Bar.

March 2023: Greg Pickering, Tualatin Chief of Police talked about what kind of crime is most prevalent in Tualatin and how the church can help in making the city a safer place for all of us.

April 2023: Kelly Dickson from Presbytery spoke to us about her efforts studying and finding new ways of doing worship especially related to attracting younger generations to worship.

May 2023: I was the speaker for the May Meeting and the topic was Climate Change. My undergraduate Degree is in Zoology and my Juris Doctorate is from Lewis and Clark Law School the third ranked Law School in the country in Environmental Law. We discussed current studies and events happening now that are indicating impending environmental disasters.

June 2023: Sarah Beck, Sandy Gurney & Jackson Allee were the speakers. They spoke about what TPC's youth group has been doing in 2023. The young people have been helping at the Food Pantry & feeding people at a shelter. They have also been studying about the Presbyterian Church.

July 2023: Chris Wade, Head Chaplain for Washington County, explained the type of ministry he & the other chaplains do.

August 2023: Gina Olson, a member of TPC and involved with Family Promise, gave the attendees a tour of the Bridge to Home facility in Tigard. She also explained the outreach there.

September 2023: John Whitehurst & Andrew Perkins discussed youth outreach worldwide called Compassion International. It is an organization that helps children worldwide, including two that TPC sponsors. John & Andrew each sponsor other children through this organization.

October 2023: Annaleah Jackson, Head of Tualatin Chamber of Commerce, spoke to us on the economic activity in Tualatin & Tigard areas.

November 2023: This meeting was designated to honor veterans. Veterans and others attended and made posters of their or a loved one's service, and shared stories.

In his letters he likes to include creative drawings and asks many questions about what life is like here and about our church activities.

Sarah is now 22 and is preparing to complete her training and graduate from the Compassion program. She has completed her education and is in her final year of vocational training in garment making and construction (fashion & design). Sarah also helps her family plant and harvest crops (sorghum, ground nuts and millet). In her letters she is very appreciative of our support and encouragement to complete her training. She is very spiritual, and she often shares her favorite bible verses with us.

Both children write about how grateful they are to receive our letters and for the love and support they receive from their sponsor church family. We are

really making a difference in their lives!

WEDDING COORDINATOR

The first contact is usually with the church office. The Administrative Assistant checks the calendar and coordinates contact to see if the Pastor, TPC, music director, custodian and wedding coordinator are available on the desired date. The wedding agreement form is completed and reservation deposit remitted. With approval there have been other officiants and non-members use TPC and the wedding coordinator assists them.

Not a "pop-culture" wedding planner or consultant, the role of the TPC wedding coordinator is as a liaison between the wedding party and the Pastor, TPC music director or accompanist, sound technician, the building elder, custodian and any other needed TPC resources during the planning stage, rehearsal and day of the wedding.

The wedding coordinator helps with service cues between the Pastor, pianist/musician and the wedding party during the wedding rehearsal and the wedding. They also assist the day of the wedding as needed from receiving floral deliveries to assisting with other items that may arise. There have been a number of off-site weddings the wedding coordinator has been requested and was happy to assist.

The kitchen and narthex are available for receptions although they are usually held off site due to time constraints and the non-Communion alcohol policy. Families would be responsible for set-up and cleanup if they do want to use the kitchen and narthex area.

TPC FICTION READERS

Thanks to a great idea conceived by Priscilla Hagan and Jean Martin, Tualatin Presbyterian Church launched two adult small groups for fiction lovers and insight seekers in September 2017. In 2023, we celebrated six full years of reading together!

There are two morning reading groups: one meets on second Thursdays, the other meets third Thursdays. Both groups read the same book and meet monthly on Zoom from 10 to 11:30 AM. Priscilla skillfully facilitates discussion of each month's fiction selection.

We began our 2023 reading journey in January with Peter Rock's My Abandonment, a local Portland story about a girl and her father living off the grid in Forest Park. Then we jumped on a wagon in February with an Irish traveler boy in *The Outside Boy* by Jeanine Cummins. March found us in a haunted Minneapolis bookstore in Louise Erdrich's The Sentence, and in April we shuttled between Ethiopia and Boston with two separated conjoined twin sons in *Cutting for Stone* by Abraham Verghese. Next, we enjoyed the quirky tale of a widow and an octopus solving a mystery in *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt. In June, Corban Addison helped us see the dark underside of the international fashion industry in A Harvest of *Thorns*. In July we cheered for Elizabeth Zott in her quest to be taken seriously as a chemist in Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus; and then in August we rooted for three lonely strangers on a Hood River honeybee farm in The Music of Bees by Eileen Garvin. In the fall, we shifted gears to a legal thriller by Stacey Abrams, While Justice Sleeps, and then learned about the importance of preserving ancient Native American practices and family connections in Diane Wilson's The Seed Keeper. We finished up our year of books with an engaging story of a champion racehorse and America's unfinished reckoning with racism in *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks.

In December, both groups donned their festive attire and gathered for virtual table fellowship and a chance to suggest book ideas for 2024. TPC Readers started off January 2024 with Isabel Allende's *The Japanese Lover*, a rich tapestry spanning WW II and Japanese internment to present day San Francisco—a tribute to aging with dignity and the enduring power of love. We announced the full schedule of 2024 book choices at the January meetings and in the February TPC newsletter.

Our group includes approximately 80 members as well as our church's board of deacons. Coordinated by Greg Imus via email at <u>rgregoryimus@gmail.com</u>, we added **139 new prayers** to our prayer list in the past **12 months**. Of these, 73 were cleared to be shared with the wider congregation as possible, while 66 of the prayers were to be kept confidential among the prayer chain members only. During the previous 12-month period, we received 160 prayer requests, of which 59 were cleared to be shared with the whole TPC community.

While we do not necessarily publish prayer requests in the weekly bulletin, many of the nonconfidential personal issues needing prayer are offered up to the congregation via "joys and concerns" during Sunday services. These tend to generate additional prayer support from other members of the congregation.

Prayer needs are often personal with the requestor wishing to maintain confidentiality while also feeling the loving benefit of our prayer chain members raising our prayers to God on their behalf. With the variety of issues and trials people face in their lives, it's often a comfort to know that others are thinking of us and lifting prayers on our behalf. Many people express their gratitude for the prayers sent up on their behalf. So, "thoughts and prayers" is not a just a mere cliché – it's a real thing that is often the best we can do to support and comfort others.
